Sewer Committee Updates

After a lot of hard work and persistence from those involved, it is exciting to report that the Board of Supervisors has approved the contract for installing sewers in the Highpoint and Fox Lair sections of the Township. Once again, it appears that E|One pumps are going to be recommended for use. Although these systems are advertised as being virtually maintenance free, homeowners may want to ask the representatives about any maintenance that they suggest. To date, we are only aware of one mechanical problem that has occurred within the township regarding the E|One pumps. This problem occurred after a five day power outage which we hope is rare. Residents may want to discuss preventative measures in case of extended outages. Now that the long harsh winter is over, it is a great time to perform maintenance and inspections on your sewer and septic systems. Septic systems need to be monitored to ensure that they work properly throughout their service lives. When septic systems are properly maintained, they effectively reduce or eliminate most human health or environmental threats posed by pollutants in household wastewater. 

Planning Commission News

Subdivision and Land Development:

Audi Dealership, Sketch Plan, 1421 Wilmington Pike. The plan proposes to demolish the existing improvements between Wawa and Mr. Mulch and build a 47,437 sq. ft. Audi dealership. Discussions began on September 11th, 2013 and were last discussed on November 13th, 2013. The current plan proposes only inventory parking to be located in Thornbury Township and the building to be located in Chadds Ford Township. Discussions will continue once Preliminary plans are received.

Crane Tract, Preliminary, Major Subdivision, 105 Stoney Bank Rd.

The plan proposes to subdivide 55 acres into 29 lots (23 lots to the east of Stoney Bank Rd. and four lots to the

west of Stoney Bank Rd.), 27 being residential with two serving as open space. Discussions began on May 8th, 2013 and were last discussed on March 12th, 2014. Discussions will continue once revised plans are received.

Dutcher, Preliminary/Final Minor Subdivision, 64 Westtown Rd. The plan proposes 6 residential lots. The plan was first discussed on July 10th, 2013 and was last discussed on March 12th, 2014. Revised plans were received in late March and the next discussion was planned for the April 9th, 2014 meeting.

Gas Savings Tips

Now that it's summer, many of us will be traveling. Plan to vacation using your car? Here are some helpful gas savings tips from Gasbuddy.com.

Avoid High Speeds

As your speed increases, your aerodynamic drag increases in an exponential fashion. Driving 62 mph (100 km/h) vs. 75 mph (120 km/h) will reduce fuel consumption by about 15%.

Don't Accelerate or Brake Hard

By anticipating the traffic and applying slow steady acceleration and braking, fuel economy may increase by as much as 20%.

Keep Tires Properly Inflated

Keep tire air pressure at the level recommended by your vehicle manufacturer. A single tire under inflated by 2 PSI, increases fuel consumption by 1%.

Use A/C Sparingly

When the air conditioner is on it puts extra load on the engine forcing more fuel to be used (by about 20%). The defrost position on most vehicles also uses the air conditioner.

Keep Windows Closed

Windows open, especially at highway speeds, increase drag and result in decreased fuel economy of up to 10%.

Use Cruise Control

Maintaining a constant speed over long distances saves gas.

Avoid Heavy Loads

Remove the sand bags from your trunk in the spring and pack lightly for long trips.

Avoid Long Idles

If you anticipate being stopped for more than one minute, shut off the car. Restarting the car uses less fuel than letting it idle for this time.

Service Vehicle Regularly

Proper maintenance avoids poor fuel economy related to dirty air filters, old spark plugs or low fluid levels.

Try to Purchase a Fuel Efficient Vehicle

When buying a new vehicle examine the vehicle's rated fuel efficiency. Usually choosing a small vehicle with a manual transmission will provide you with great fuel economy.

PROPER HANDLING OF GRASS CLIPPINGS

Sweep or blow grass clippings back on to your lawn.



Clippings that fall on your driveway and sidewalks are more likely to wash into storm drains. Storm drains lead directly to creeks and streams; they are

not treated. When grass clippings and yard debris wash into the natural waterways they decompose into nitrogen. Excess nitrogen is not good for water ecosystems. By keeping your grass clippings on your lawn, you are returning that needed nitrogen back to your soil.



Grass clippings are washed away into streams, lakes and eventually oceans. The unnatural levels of nitrogen in the water systems create dead zones

that are depleted of oxygen and suffocate marine life. Dead zones form because nitrogen is a food for algae. The algae consume the nitrogen and the abundance of food causes an algae population bloom. Unfortunately, algae also consume copious amounts of oxygen and the depleted oxygen supply leads to a dead zone; a zone where most marine life cannot survive. Help do your part: Sweep or blow grass clippings back onto the lawn. It is healthy for your soil and for our environment.



Pennsylvania Hodgepodge

To follow are some interesting tidbits of Pennsylvania information for you.

- Pennsylvania consists of more than 45,000 square miles divided into 67 counties. Delaware County formed in 1789 was named for the Delaware River and can claim the first permanent settlement in Pennsylvania by Europeans.
- Pennsylvania settled in 1643. Philadelphia was our state capital during the Revolutionary War and York was the first capital of the United States.
- The Pennsylvania Constitution is the foundation of our state government. Our first constitution was adopted in 1776 and was a framework for the U.S. Constitution, which did not take effect until 1789. The Declaration of Rights of the Pennsylvania Constitution predates and was a model for the Bill of Rights of the United States Constitution.
- During colonial times Pennsylvania was the middle colony of the original 13 colonies. It held the colonies together like a “keystone” in a window or arch. Thus our nickname Keystone State.
- Important Documents written in Pennsylvania include The Constitution of the United States, The American Declaration of Independence and Lincoln’s Gettysburg Address.
- State “Stuff.” State Motto: Virtue, Liberty and Independence, State Flower: Mountain Laurel, State Tree: Hemlock, State Bird: Ruffed Grouse, State Animal: Whitetail Deer, State Insect: Firefly, State Fish: Brook Trout, State Dog: Great Dane, Counties with NO traffic lights: Forest County and Perry County, and Christmas Tree Capital of the World: Indiana County.
- Pennsylvania firsts: Hospital, Library, Zoo, Newspaper, Nations Capitol, all motion-picture theatre, television broadcast, radio broadcast, educational public-television station, paper mill, druggist, locomotive for railroad use, high-speed multilane highway (the Pennsylvania Turnpike), Banana Split, Electronic computer built, commercial use of computer, cable television, educational public television station, government low-interest, long term business financing program.
