2 MADAM CLERK: Board of Commissioners public
3 meeting, Tuesday, May 1st, 2018. The time is 7:06.
4 Pursuant to the requirements of the Open Public Meeting Act
5 (Chapter 231, Public Law 1975), notice of this meeting was
6 published in the December 14th, 2017 issues of The Nutley
7 Sun, the Herald News, and the Star Ledger. A copy of this
8 notice has been posted on the Nutley Town Hall bulletin
9 board and a copy is on file in the Municipal Clerk's Office.

10 Commissioner Rogers?

11 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Here.

12 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Here.

14 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

15 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Here.

16 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

17 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Here.

18 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

19 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Here.

20 MADAM CLERK: All present.

21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you. Commissioner
22 Petracco?

23 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yes. I have an
24 introduction for the towing tonight, which we decided to
25 split with Nicoletti and Twin Towing. I also have a --

1 that's an introduction. I have an ordinance, public hearing
2 on a handicapped parking spot. And I also have -- authorize
3 to accept funds for emergency management. Authorize to
4 advertise for sealed bids for police and crossing guard
5 uniforms.

6 And click it or ticket, May 21st through June
7 30th. That's all I have. And I need a short executive
8 session.

9 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thanks, Commissioner.
10 Commissioner Evans?

11 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I have a report on -- the
12 annual report on the Sick and Vacation Accrued Liability
13 Year-End 2017 (indiscernible) percent increase
14 (indiscernible) which is in very good standing across.

15 I also have -- it's under Commissioner
16 Announcements, but I have the Determination of the Award for
17 our bond that we just-- that was awarded. (Indiscernible) we
18 were very fortunate to get it at 10 years at a 2.52 percent
19 interest rate, competitive. In fact, it was the lowest rate
20 of the day. So very pleased about that.

21 I have resolutions, a few resolutions. One is a
22 tax exemption for Michael Travers related to a disabled war
23 veteran. And then emergency appropriations for reallocating
24 the introduced budget on increasing the budget for public
25 safety. And a refund of overpayment of taxes. And the last
one is the temporary appropriation because we'll have the

1 debt payment due before we're able to adopt a budget
2 That's all I have.

3 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Rogers?

4 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: I have four health related
5 resolutions to heighten public awareness. That's it.

6 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Tucci?

7 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I have two ordinances -- two
8 resolutions, not ordinances. One proclaiming May 5th as
9 Arbor Day, and the second designating the week of May 1st
10 through May 6th as Elks Youth Week. That's it.

11 MAYOR SCARPELLI: There's a proclamation on the
12 agenda on behalf of the Board of Commissioners for Ruth
13 Bedford's 100th birthday. She's already received the
14 proclamation at her party, but we'll read it into the record
15 today. And I have a resolution for -- to go out for
16 advertise for sealed bids for the 2018 Roadway Improvement
17 Project.

18 That's all I have. Acting Madam Clerk?

19 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Are we going into Closed?
20 Yes. Okay, good.

21 MADAM CLERK: Yes, Mayor. I have minutes of the
22 March 2nd Budget Workshop and also the March 20th Board of
23 Commissioners meeting that we need to vote on.

24 And on communications we have two events. One is
25 for St. Mary's Church. They're applying for a Social Affair

1 permit for their St. Anthony's fest. And Luna Wood Fire
2 Tavern is applying for an Extension of Premises for the
3 Spring Festival on June 14th. And that's all I have.

4 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Counselor?

5 MR. GENITEMPO: I have nothing.

6 MAYOR SCARPELLI: All right. So we need closed
7 executive for --

8 MR. GENITEMPO: Do you just want to talk
9 about Arterial real quick?

10 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Hey, we could -- but anyway, we
11 have that presentation by Arterial last meeting. So just --
12 any discussion or we'll just have them -- have Topology bring
13 them on board?

14 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I was impressed. Who was the
15 other company? I didn't -- I wasn't here --

16 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Urban --

17 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Renew.

18 MAYOR SCARPELLI: -- Renewal.

19 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: That was the one that was
20 more of an engineering.

21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: It was much more engineering.
22 The proposal was very -- it wasn't --

23 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Very hardscape? Yeah.

24 MAYOR SCARPELLI: It didn't meet our needs.

25 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Okay. I have no problem with

1 Arterial. I was impressed.

2 COMMISSIONER EVANS: It did not have a -- the
3 other one did not have a local (indiscernible) -- an
4 appreciation for local environment.

5 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Yeah, they're from South Jersey
6 somewhere.

7 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And most of their work was
8 done out of state.

9 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Okay. Sounds like a plan,
10 gentlemen.

11 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Personnel too. I need --
12 just personnel.

2 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Move it.

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

4 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

5 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

6 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

7 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

8 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

9 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

10 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

11 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

12 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

13 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

14 MADAM CLERK: Thank you, Mayor.

15 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Madam Clerk.

16 We have a proclamation on behalf of the Board of
17 Commissioners that was presented to Mrs. Ruth Bedford the
18 other night for a party, for her 100th birthday. And I want
19 to read the proclamation into the record.

20 Whereas, Ruth G. Bedford, born on April 23, 1918,
21 is celebrating her 100th birthday; and

22 Whereas, Ruth G. Bedford is a lifelong Nutley
23 resident who resides on Highfield Lane, the same street she
24 was born 100 years ago.

25 Whereas, Ruth G. Bedford is a graduate of Nutley

1 High School and Berkeley School of Secretarial Training.
2 Following graduation, she worked at W.T. Grant in New York
3 City from 1957 to 1992 as Secretary to Mr. Grant, the
4 founder of the company; and

5 Whereas, Ruth G. Bedford met her late husband
6 Stanley Bedford, a lawyer and Superior Court of New Jersey
7 Judge through friends in the local and county Young
8 Republicans Club. Stanley was very supportive of Ruth's
9 growing interest in fundraising and helping charitable
10 organizations in Nutley and surrounding communities; and

11 Whereas, Ruth G. Bedford is a prominent member of
12 the Nutley community, hosting many philanthropic events at
13 her home, including the annual "Lollipop Party" and Nutley
14 Family Service Bureau "September Social" which raise funds
15 to benefit residents in the community; and

16 Whereas, Ruth G. Bedford has served on many
17 Boards: The Nutley Family Service Bureau, where she served
18 as President and in 2013 was named Lifetime Trustee, the
19 Nutley Parkside Apartments, Planned Parenthood of
20 Metropolitan New Jersey, and Offender Aid and Restoration of
21 Essex County. She annually contributes to the Nutley
22 Thriving Survivors, Paper Mill Playhouse, and other national
23 charities; and

24 Whereas, Ruth G. Bedford has been recognized for
25 her many contributions to Nutley and its citizens,

1 including: the "Mattia Distinguished Community Service"
2 Award with her husband Stanley, the Nutley Jaycees "Annual
3 Distinguished Service Award for Civic Affairs", the
4 "Montclair-Glen Ridge-Nutley Chapter of the American Red
5 Cross Annual Comradeship" Award, the "Nutley Educational
6 Foundation" Award and the Nutley-Belleville Columbus Day
7 Parade Committee "Community Excellence Award"; and

8 Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Mayor and
9 the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, County
10 of Essex, State of New Jersey that the Township honor and
11 congratulate Ruth G. Bedford on her 100th Birthday;

12 Be it further resolved, that a copy of this
13 proclamation be presented to Ruth G. Bedford.

14 Congratulations, Ruth.

15 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Well deserved. I remember
16 sitting in her living room one day when she told me she was
17 working for Dwight Eisenhower. I mean, could you imagine
18 the history that this great American has a lot to offer the
19 Town and I send her God's blessings.

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I also would like to wish
21 her a very happy birthday. I was unable to attend Wednesday
22 night, only because I had an emergency room visit with my
23 son, who is doing much better, thank God.

24 But I spent a lot of time in Ruth Bedford's house
25 and, you know, talk about a Nutley-ite and what she's done

1 for this community and the history that she knows. It's a
2 blessing that we still have her. And if anybody gets the
3 chance to go chat with her, you know, there's not too many
4 people you could -- to have a talk with that's 100 years old
5 and has all that history of Nutley and our community. Thank
6 you.

7 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Yes. Thank you, Mayor. Well
8 deserved. Happy birthday, Ruth. God bless you.

9 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I apologize for my voice. If
10 you are an allergy sufferer, you know what this season
11 brings. I just wanted to just say very simply I have been
12 very fortunate in my life that I was able to get to know
13 Ruth Bedford. I was thrilled that I was at her birthday
14 party last week. She is a delight to be around. And I
15 can't get over the fact that somebody who is 100 years old
16 is still a teenager at heart.

17 She has all the energy, all the vibrancy. So if
18 you happen to be around and you get a chance to go by
19 Highfield Lane and you see her outside, I know she will
20 welcome you. But happy birthday, Ruth. Many more.

21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Ruth truly is Nutley's
22 matriarch. So we congratulate her again.

23 Reports? Commissioner Evans?

24 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Thank you.

25 I have a report, which is the 2017 year-end report

1 for sick and vacation accrual liability for the Township of
2 Nutley. We're fortunate in that -- in our managing of that
3 liability is we have -- 80 percent of it is fully funded.
4 There is another 20 percent that we will fund over time and
5 we are able to manage that. So there's not a significant
6 future burden on the Township, as you may read in other
7 Towns when somebody retires.

8 Nutley has prepared for that for a very long time.
9 So it's just the annual report of the sick and vacation
10 accrued liability by department.

11 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Bills, Madam Clerk?

12 MADAM CLERK: Yes, Mayor.

13 Bill list for May 1st, 2018. Public affairs,
14 \$94,091.80; Revenue & finance, \$2,604,729.90; Public safety,
15 \$152,491.08; Public works, \$75,542.97; Parks and public
16 property, \$640,044.46. Water utility, \$79,287.27. Total
17 payroll \$827,373.82. For a grand total of \$4,473,561.30.

18 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Move the bills.

19 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Second.

20 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

21 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

22 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

23 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

24 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

25 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

1 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

2 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

3 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

4 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

5 Public comment on agenda items only. Madam Clerk.

6 MADAM CLERK: Yes, Mayor.

7 All persons addressing the Board of Commissioners
8 regarding community concerns should approach the microphone
9 and provide their name and address for the record. Unless
10 further time is granted by the Board, each person shall
11 limit their address to three minutes. All remarks to the
12 Board and its individual members must be addressed to the
13 Mayor. The Mayor may defer citizens' comments to the
14 appropriate member of the Board. Dialogue between citizens
15 and others addressing the Board shall be allowed unless the
16 Mayor or presiding officer, or the majority of the
17 membership of the Board, shall determine that the interest
18 of decorum and/or the expeditious conduct of municipal
19 business are being adversely affected by such dialogue.

20 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody like to address
21 the Board of Commissioners on agenda items only?

22 MR. MOORE: Rory Moore, 462 Chestnut Street.

23 I have one question. It's under public affairs,
24 Mr. Evans, the first page of the bill page, public affairs.
25 The bill page.

1 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes. Did you say public
2 affairs or revenue and finance?

3 MR. MOORE: I'm sorry. Public -- revenue and
4 finance. My apologies. Down towards the bottom, MTAG
5 Customer for Empire. You have two of them. One is for
6 62,000 and another one is for 26. What is that for?

7 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Tax redemption certificates.
8 Tax redemption certificates.

9 MR. MOORE: What's that?

10 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Every years we owe the tax
11 sale. And those certificates are bought by third parties
12 who cover the cost of the taxes due. And when they --

13 MR. MOORE: They buy the houses?

14 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Right, exactly. And when the
15 resident or the owner pays that off, it redeems the
16 certificate. So we're giving the money back.

17 MR. MOORE: Okay. Thank you.

18 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to
19 address the Board of Commissioners on agenda items only?

20 Seeing none, Commissioner announcements.
21 Commissioner Evans, first.

22 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes. I have a notification
23 of determination by statute. And what it relates to is our
24 recent on sale and the Town periodically goes into the
25 market for our bond. Our bond this time around was for

1 \$6,791,000. The interest rate was -- that we were fortunate
2 enough to receive was 2.52 percent. So roughly 2 and a half
3 percent interest and it's a 10 year bond. So if you think
4 about that in terms of a mortgage. It's a 10 year mortgage
5 at 2 and a half percent.

6 Our total debt outstanding for the municipality is
7 \$15,100,000. And our combined interest rates on that debt
8 is between 2 percent and 2.75 percent. We've been managing
9 that very, very carefully. We have a program in place that
10 manages our capital purchases that we need to do to invest
11 in the Town each year, working with the Board.

12 I just wanted to make a note with this is I want
13 -- it's required by statute that we provide the report.
14 It's available to the public. But what's really interesting
15 as well is because of the work that we've been doing as a
16 Board together, working together, we're able to reduce our
17 annual cost of debt service by \$300,000, which is a very
18 substantial amount. And we'll continue to manage our debt
19 service now.

20 To put that in context, \$15 million worth of debt
21 is a small percentage against the Township's borrowing
22 capacity which under statute, we have the ability to borrow
23 \$126 million. And we would never do that. So we manage it.

24 And so what happens is we go into the market
25 periodically to take advantage of the interest rates when

1 the prior bond is expiring. So we maintain it. And what
2 we've been doing is actually been lowering the cost of debt
3 to the Township over the past few years, which has been done
4 by cooperation of this Board.

5 So I wanted to share that. So, Mayor, that's one
6 thing I wanted to do an announcement tonight. The second is
7 a little different. I received some phone calls from
8 residents regarding development fees. And in fact, I met
9 with a resident who actually raised on social media that he
10 reached out to me and basically his comment was, "Don't hold
11 your breath," on being able to meet with me.

12 Well, within 10 minutes of him sending me an e-
13 mail, I was already in contact with him because I saw it.
14 And I met with that individual. And one of the things that
15 I cleared up with him is the notion that Nutley has not been
16 collecting development fees since 2014.

17 We have collected development fees every year.
18 They're called COAH fees. And in 2014, which was
19 represented, it was \$25,991 and change. In 2015, it was
20 \$128,863 and change. In '16, it was \$98,096 and change.
21 And in 2017, it was \$119,801. Every year, we -- when we are
22 able to collect these fees, we will collect those fees. And
23 any thought to the contrary is wrong.

24 So I just wanted to share that. There's other
25 things that I've been noticing that are in error on social

1 media. And I will make announcements periodically to make
2 sure that we are correcting the record with the actual
3 facts.

4 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thanks, Commissioner.
5 Commissioner Tucci?

6 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Yes, Mayor. Thank you.

7 This Saturday, May 5th, which is also Cinco de
8 Mayo, we will be holding our annual fishing contest at the
9 mud hole at 8:30. And at 9:30, we will be holding our
10 living memorial program at Kingsland Park. Thanks,
11 Commissioner.

12 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner?

13 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: You know very rare I make
14 announcements, but I do have a couple tonight. And one of
15 them doesn't include what some people are breathlessly
16 waiting for.

17 All right. First of all, the first announcement
18 is that many -- I'm not going to say many. I'll say about a
19 dozen residents have been in touch with me at my request
20 regarding work efforts done by Public Service Electric and
21 Gas. Some of their properties, their front lawns have not
22 been replaced back to its original form after PS&G did some
23 work.

24 So I talked to PS&G, Everton Scott. Very
25 responsive. I requested e-mails from individuals who live

1 in our Town who feel that their property needs to be a
2 little bit more worked on from PS&G and they're going to do
3 it. So if you know of anyone or if you -- anyone of you
4 here tonight have an issue with that, just e-mail me and
5 I'll get them off to PSE&G and they've made a commitment
6 that they will restore the lawns the way they originally
7 were. That's pretty good. And they're working with us.

8 Secondly, Commissioner Petracco, I understand and
9 I just found this out recently. I don't know if our
10 colleagues know this, that Councilman Kevin Kennedy in
11 Belleville is actually honoring you. You've kept that
12 pretty quiet, you know, I think as a Board member in the
13 Town. Well, you know, naval intelligence, my friend, we
14 know everything.

15 But I understand that some of this honor is -- and
16 a lot of people in Town may not know this, but it is due to
17 the work you've done for veterans very quietly.

18 Commissioner Petracco has Memorial Day, Veterans Day,
19 Thanksgiving, and Christmas, actually has had dinners for
20 veterans. Some of them are homeless vets. He has provided
21 clothing for veterans. And I know you've opened your store
22 once on a holiday to bring veterans in who are alone and who
23 are disabled.

24 So that's part of a list of things that Councilman
25 Kennedy has. So I just want to say that I'm proud of you,

1 especially for our vets. And I know, Commissioner Tucci,
2 you must be really proud because you're sitting right there
3 in Belleville with those fellows.

4 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Yes, I am. So not only is
5 the Commissioner being recognized within our Nutley
6 boundaries, now he's going outside of Nutley for
7 recognition. Congratulations. Well deserved.

8 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Well, that's it, Mayor.

9 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Okay. Thank you, Commissioner.

10 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: You're welcome.

11 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Anything else? No? Exciting
12 day on Saturday for young kids. This also will be Big Truck
13 Day this Saturday in the parking lot behind the Nutley
14 Diner. Anybody that has little kids that want to come out
15 and see the public works vehicles, come on out. Bring your
16 earplugs because it does get a little loud with the air
17 horns. That's it.

18 Ordinance introductions. Commissioner Petracco?

19 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I have ordinance number
20 3384 for an introduction. An ordinance to amend an
21 ordinance codified in the Code of the Township of Nutley,
22 Chapter 673 entitled "Vehicles, impoundment and towing," to
23 add Section entitled "Towing" -- Section 5.

24 I move that this ordinance be passed to a second
25 reading and advertised in the Nutley Sun, together with the

1 notice required by law and that further consideration of
2 said ordinance for final passage by the Board of
3 Commissioners to be held at its second reading on June 7th,
4 2018.

5 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Second.

6 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

7 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

8 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

9 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

10 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

11 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

12 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

13 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

14 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

15 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

16 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Public hearings. Commissioner
17 Petracco?

18 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Ordinance number 3383 is
19 for handicapped parking. An ordinance to amend an ordinance
20 codified in the Code of the Township of Nutley, Chapter 228,
21 entitled Vehicles and Traffic, particularly Article VII
22 (Special zones and areas), Section 29A entitled handicapped
23 parking, to add to the location set forth, which is for 56
24 King Street North, beginning at .220 feet east of St. Mary's
25 Place and also 56 Union Avenue East beginning at a point of

1 115 feet north of Hancock Ave.

2 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody like to be heard
3 on ordinance number 3383?

4 MR. MOORE: Rory Moore, 462 Chestnut Street.

5 Mr. Petracco, who removes those signs when they're
6 finished?

7 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: That's a -- I really don't
8 -- I would think DPW does.

9 MR. MOORE: And if somebody sold their house,
10 moved --

11 MAYOR SCARPELLI: As long as we're notified to
12 take down the sign, we'll take it down.

13 MR. MOORE: Who do you notify?

14 MAYOR SCARPELLI: You have to -- someone would
15 have to notify Public Works that the sign needs to come
16 down.

17 MR. MOORE: Okay.

18 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to be
19 heard on ordinance number 3383?

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Move to close the public
21 hearing.

22 COMMISSIONER ROGRS: Second.

23 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

24 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

25 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

1 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

2 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

3 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

4 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

5 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

6 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

7 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I move the ordinance.

9 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Second.

10 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

11 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

12 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

14 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

15 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

16 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

17 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

18 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

19 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Thank you.

21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Commissioner.

22 Commissioner Rogers, resolutions?

23 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Yes, Mayor. I have four
24 resolutions. 120, 121, 122, 123-18.

25 The first one is to declare the month of May as

1 National Stroke Awareness Month. Now, I'd like to explain
2 just a little bit of why we do these resolutions because
3 when I first took office, I could never figure out why we're
4 doing these. And then it was brought to my attention that
5 we do them for two reasons. One is to heighten public
6 awareness. And two, sometimes if you're going to apply for
7 a grant, they're going to ask did you have a resolution.

8 Now, let's talk about this National Stroke
9 Awareness Month. I'm going to tell you a personal story.
10 One day, I decided to go up to the First Aid Squad. I
11 wasn't feeling very good. You have one of those days,
12 right? They took my blood pressure and man, it was high. I
13 didn't even know it was high. It was so high, when I went
14 to the doctors, he says you're lucky you're still walking.
15 You're lucky you did not have a stroke.

16 Now, I've got to tell you, folks, I didn't feel
17 sick. I didn't feel -- just a little, you know, kind of
18 off. But I learned a lesson. And the lesson was take care
19 of yourself. I wasn't taking care of myself. I was running
20 all over the place, not taking care of myself. And I'm in
21 good health, but apparently I wasn't in the best health.

22 So I would just say that it's something that you'd
23 want to keep an eye on.

24 The second resolution is mental health -- proclaim
25 May 2018 as Mental Health Month. This is a national problem

1 regarding mental health. And we're stepping up in Town, a
2 lot to do with mental health exams. We now have in the
3 Department of Public Affairs, by the way, in part thanks to
4 the help we're getting from the county, we have a former
5 combat veteran in our office who comes here once a week and
6 he sits down with veterans with post-traumatic stress
7 disorder.

8 And I have been told about two weeks ago that --
9 and Commissioner Tucci, you need to know this because you
10 were instrumental in helping this out. He was instrumental
11 in saving a veteran's life, a guy that was ready to kill
12 himself. The guy was on the edge. A Vietnam War vet. It
13 goes to the point of mental health.

14 When we see things -- you know, we hear on the
15 news, you see something, say something. I've added
16 something to that. When you sense something, when your gut
17 is telling you that somebody is not acting right, there's
18 something just not going right, you've got to let somebody
19 know. And that's why we're bringing this to the attention
20 of our Town and it's a national issue.

21 We also have a proclamation regarding melanoma skin
22 cancer and detection and prevention. The Geltrude
23 (indiscernible) is a big foundation now in our Town where
24 they focus in on that. You know, some people -- I've talked
25 to them and I've been to some of his events. I see a little

1 thing on your hand or your head. You know, when we were
2 younger, who cares. You get a little older, you start
3 looking at that stuff and you're wondering wow, is there
4 something. And a lot of times, especially in the summer
5 time, people who go get their skin detected or examined by a
6 doctor, they find out they've got a problem.

7 So it's something that you're going to keep an eye
8 on, especially your children when they're in the sun. And
9 then May 6th through May 12th. By the way, get your eyes
10 examined too, it will help you read. May 6th through May
11 12th. We've got to laugh a little folks, come on. It's
12 like a library or an elevator in here. You ever go on an
13 elevator? Nobody talks to each other. May 6th through May
14 12th, National Nurses Week.

15 One thing, National Nurses Week. Nurses are, and
16 this Town is really -- the backbone, a lot of what we do
17 here. We have a nurse in the family program. We've got
18 great school nurses. And we also have nurses that are going
19 to homes of a lot of people we found out. And let me give
20 you an example.

21 When I went door to door for about a year, I found
22 a lot of our seniors are home alone depressed. A lot of
23 them. I mean, they'd open the door. Remember what I said
24 about the gut? Your gut is there's something wrong here.
25 So you kind of get yourself in the house. Husband died

1 after 60 years. Maybe a pet -- the worst thing in the world
2 is for a senior citizen to have their dog, or cat, their
3 bird whatever die on them. And they get into this
4 depression and they don't want to see or hear anybody.

5 Well, what we do now is we find out who they are
6 and we send a nurse there once a week. I have somebody who
7 calls them up, checks on them a couple times a month. We
8 even do shopping, folks, online for them. They can't get
9 out of the house. We now have a program set up, and our
10 nurses are involved with this, where they can't get out
11 anymore. We go to their house with a laptop computer and do
12 shopping online for them.

13 If you're a mom, you're a dad, grandma, grandpa,
14 whatever, you know a senior citizen in your neighborhood
15 that maybe just needs a visit -- sometimes just a visit.
16 Hey, how are you doing? How are things going? They love
17 it. So that's why it's important that we have these
18 proclamations on our private nurses in our Town.

19 Well, thanks a lot, Mayor.

20 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Do you want to move the
21 resolutions?

22 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: I think I will. I move
23 those resolutions.

24 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

25 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

1 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

2 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

3 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Absolutely, aye.

4 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

5 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

6 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

7 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

8 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

9 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye. Thank you, Commissioner.
10 Commissioner Tucci?

11 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Yes. It's hard following
12 Commissioner Rogers, but I'll do my best.

13 Whereas, in 1949 the legislature set aside the
14 last Friday of April as Arbor Day to promote the planting of
15 trees and to encourage the protection of our forests from
16 fires and pests that destroy the beauty and usefulness of
17 our woodlands; and

18 Whereas, half of New Jersey's total land area is
19 forested or tree covered; and

20 Whereas, trees play an important role in the
21 ecosystem in which we live, and trees reduce the erosion of
22 our precious topsoil caused by wind and water, clean the air
23 that we breathe and the water we drink, produce oxygen,
24 provide habitat for birds and wildlife and reduce heating
25 and cooling costs by moderating temperature; and

1 Whereas, trees are a renewable resource giving us
2 paper for fine literature, wood for homes, fuel for fires,
3 and countless other wood products; and

4 Whereas, trees provide increased property value,
5 enhanced economic viability, and pleasing aesthetic
6 qualities along streets and properties in municipalities;
7 and

8 Whereas, tree planting in yards and farms, in
9 school yards and parks, and along streets and highways
10 creates an enduring heritage for generations that follow;
11 and

12 Whereas, The Township of Nutley has completed its
13 31st year as a member of Tree City USA; and

14 Whereas, I, Commissioner Mauro G. Tucci, Director
15 of Parks and Public Property of the Township of Nutley, do
16 hereby proclaim May 5, 2018 as Arbor Day in the community of
17 Nutley, and urge all citizens to support efforts to protect
18 our trees and woodlands and to support our town's urban
19 forestry program; and

20 Further, I urge all citizens to plant trees to
21 gladden hearts and promote the well-being of present and
22 future generations.

23 I move the resolution.

24 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Second.

25 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

1 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: One thing, Commissioner
2 Tucci, a couple of years ago I was at one of those events.
3 And at that time, I heard it was 300 trees. You've had to
4 exceed that?

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: That's over 300 trees and
6 we've also introduced benches to be dedicated in the honor
7 of folks that have passed and folks that are still living.

8 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: That's great. Thank you. I
9 say yes, yay, aye.

10 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

11 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

12 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

13 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

14 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

15 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

16 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

17 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

18 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Whereas, the members of the
19 Nutley Elks Lodge #1290 host community outreach events
20 throughout the year for the citizens of the community; and

21 Whereas, the members of the Nutley Elks Lodge
22 #1290 host events throughout the year to send special needs
23 youth to Camp Moore, host Christmas Parties, poster
24 contests, Basketball Hoop Shoots, Soccer Shoots, sponsor
25 fishing derbies; and

1 Whereas, the members of the Nutley Elks Lodge
2 #1290 have designated the week of May 1st, through May 6th,
3 2018 as Youth Week; and

4 Now, therefore be it resolved, by the Board of
5 Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, County of Essex,
6 State of New Jersey, that May 1st, 2018 through May 6th,
7 2018 be designated as Youth Week.

8 I proudly move this resolution.

9 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Second.

10 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

11 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

12 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

14 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

15 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

16 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

17 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

21 recognize two members of our Nutley Elks Lodge. Gentlemen,
22 please stand, and thank you for all that you do for our
23 community.

24 That's all I have, Mayor.

25 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Commissioner.

1 Commissioner Evans?

2 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I apologize for my voice.
3 First resolution is number 114-18. This resolution relates
4 to a veteran who was declared fully disabled pursuant to
5 State Statute 54:4-3.30 and that as a result of that, he is
6 exempt from paying property taxes.

7 Now, therefore, be it resolved, by the Board of
8 Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, County of Essex,
9 State of New Jersey, that Michael W. Travers be granted full
10 exemption for the payment of property taxes from April 5,
11 2018 and all subsequent years thereafter on the property
12 identified as 24 Renner Avenue.

5 provided; and

6 Whereas, the total emergency temporary resolutions
7 adopted in the year 2018 pursuant to the provisions of
8 Chapter 96, P.L. 1951, including this resolution, total
9 \$14,342,602;

10 Now, therefore, be it resolved that in accordance
11 with N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-20:

12 1. Emergency appropriations be and the same are
13 hereby made for the total amount of \$40,000.

14 2. That said emergency temporary appropriations
15 will be provided for in the 2018 Budget.

16 The establishment of the A-CAPS is in
17 Public Safety Department in Fire O/E for the amount of
18 \$40,000.

19 So moved.

20 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Second.

4 and

5 Whereas, the use of seat belts in passenger
6 vehicles saved an estimated 14,668 in 2016; and

7 Whereas, regular seat belt use is the single most
8 effective way to reduce fatalities in motor vehicle crashes;

9 Whereas, the use of seat belts is supported by the
10 laws of Nutley, New Jersey;

11 Whereas, May 21st through June 3rd, 2018, has been
12 selected as the national Click It or Ticket mobilization
13 enforcement period;

14 Whereas, across the country law enforcement
15 officers will actively be participating in the mobilization
16 to ensure all motor vehicle occupants are buckled up day and
17 night to reduce the risk of injury and death caused in
18 traffic crashes;

19 Whereas, increased enforcement of seat belt laws
20 coupled with publicity has proven to be an effective method
21 to increase seat belt use rates and decrease fatal crashes;

22 Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of
23 Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, County of Essex,
24 State of New Jersey do hereby proclaim and announce May 21st
25 through June 3rd, 2018, as the Click It or Ticket

1 Mobilization in Nutley, New Jersey, and urge all citizens to
2 always wear your seat belts when driving or riding on our
3 roadways.

4 So again, the date is May 21st to June 3rd.
5 Please make sure you buckle up all the time, but especially
6 in that.

7 I move the resolution.

8 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Second.

21 Be it resolved by the Board of Commissioners of
22 the Township of Nutley, County of Essex, State of New
23 Jersey, that the Township Clerk is hereby authorized to
24 advertise for sealed bids for the 2018 Roadway Improvement
25 Project, in the Township of Nutley, to be received on

1 Wednesday, May 30th, 2018 at 3:00 p.m. prevailing time, at
2 which time they will be opened and read.

3 I move the resolution.

4 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Second.

5 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

6 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

7 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

8 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

9 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

10 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

11 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

12 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

13 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

14 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

15 That concludes the business portion of our
16 meeting. Madam Clerk?

17 MADAM CLERK: Thank you, Mayor.

18 All persons addressing the Board of Commissioners
19 regarding community concerns should approach the microphone
20 and provide their name and address for the record. Unless
21 further time is granted by the Board, each person shall
22 limit their address to five minutes. All remarks to the
23 Board and its individual members must be addressed to the
24 Mayor. The Mayor may defer citizens' comments to the
25 appropriate member of the board. Dialogue between citizens

1 and others addressing the Board shall be allowed unless the
2 Mayor or presiding officer, or the majority of the
3 membership of the Board, shall determine that the interest
4 of decorum and/or the expeditious conduct of municipal
5 business are being adversely affected by such dialogue.

6 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody like to address
7 the Board of Commissioners this evening?

8 MS. BOZZA: I apologize for reading this, but I just .

9 MAYOR SCARPELLI: State your name and address for
10 the record.

11 MS. BOZZA: I'm sorry. Maria Bozza, 209 Highfield
12 Lane.

13 I recently had a not so pleasant conversation with
14 Mr. Holleran (ph) from the Nutley Police Department. We were
15 informed by letter on Thursday that Grace Church, which is
16 across from where I live, was one again holding a motorcycle
17 run, and a walk, and a band, and all that goes with it.
18 It's a serious inconvenience for many reasons, not to
19 mention the disturbance of peace and tranquility in the
20 neighborhood.

21 And last year, I spoke to Mr. Holleran (ph) and he
22 informed me that at time that before issuing a permit in the
23 future, he was going to make amendments and discuss it with
24 them before he issued the permit.

25 When I called him this time, he told me he

1 couldn't -- he couldn't remember ever speaking to anyone
2 before. So I guess my voice, even though I'm a taxpayer,
3 doesn't count in the eyes of the Nutley Police Department.
4 I went on to tell him --

5 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: (Indiscernible).

6 MS. BOZZA: Sorry?

7 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Did you speak to the Chief?

8 MS. BOZZA: I didn't hear you.

9 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: You just -- I heard you
10 say -- did you say Holland?

11 MS. BOZZA: Holleran (ph).

12 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Oh, O'Halloran, okay. I'm
13 sorry.

14 MS. BOZZA: And so anyway, I went on to tell him
15 that the -- many of the motorcycles -- motorcyclists, if you
16 come there, they're not (indiscernible) if you look at them.
17 Maybe they're not, but they give that appearance. And he
18 immediately told me that I was a -- I was prejudiced and if
19 they were black, I would be a racist.

20 So I really resent having a police officer speak
21 to me like that. He twisted my words. And he told me that
22 if I didn't like what he was doing, I was to come to the
23 Commissioners' meeting. So that's why I'm here.

24 He also -- you know, if I were black, or if I were
25 a Muslim, or if I were of another nationality, I don't think

1 he would speak to me like that. I resent his tack and his
2 bullying because I am a taxpayer and he is a public servant.
3 His job as a police officer, I think, is to be a peacemaker,
4 not a troublemaker. He owes me an apology, but I know I
5 will never get that.

6 And I'm not against the charity that the church is
7 running. Don't misunderstand me. I'm against where they
8 hold it. I think there are better places in town they could
9 do this. They could do it in a public parking lot or
10 wherever -- in many other places. And I did tell the
11 minister that when she came to my house.

12 And there are other neighbors that are against it,
13 not only me -- but I'm the only one who's vocal, but they
14 are -- a lot of others are against it as well because it is
15 a grave inconvenience to have your whole street blocked off
16 for the entire day.

17 And Mr. Halloran, his attitude, I think, you're not
18 going to like this very much, but I think it comes from you
19 gentlemen because you set the tone on how your departments
20 behave when people call them or when they come to the
21 Townhall or the police department. And after I've been
22 sitting in this chamber for the last couple of weeks or
23 months, just observing your non-verbal behavior, and I think
24 many of you give me the impression, I could be wrong, but I
25 got the impression that you're annoyed when people question

1 you or question what you're doing. That -- you know, that
2 your body language tells me that you're not really -- you
3 don't care what we say. You know, you listen to us, but
4 you're not really that interested.

5 And I think this is the danger we face when
6 elected officials are here too long, pass the gavel down
7 from father to son, hire their family, their friends, and
8 they think they're -- you know, you're above the law and the
9 Town belongs to you and not the people that you're here to
10 serve.

11 Mr. Halloran is a product of that attitude and I
12 would bet my last penny that there are others in the
13 Townhall that are just like him.

14 And with all due respect, Mr. Mayor, I sent you a
15 letter several months ago and this just reinforces what I
16 think, reprimanding (indiscernible) for being so late in
17 coming to a meeting. It was over an hour and a half. And
18 you went on to ask people in the Townhall who I was.

19 I mean, my name was attached to the letter. Call
20 me on the phone and ask me who I am.

21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Mrs. Bozza, I know who you are. I
22 didn't have to ask anybody who you are.

23 MS. BOZZA: Well, I was told that you went around
24 the Town and asked --

25 MAYOR SCARPELLI: I know who you are. I've known

1 you a long time.

2 MS. BOZZA: I'm sorry?

3 MAYOR SCARPELLI: I've known you and your husband
4 a long time.

5 MS. BOZZA: I know that. And --

6 MAYOR SCARPELLI: So I don't need to ask anybody
7 who you are.

8 MS. BOZZA: And you know, I am a person. I'm a
9 citizen. I'm a taxpayer. And I was just exercising my
10 Constitutional right, which I think I have a right to do to
11 come here and give you my opinion or my whatever. And you
12 know, I hope that there's -- I shouldn't say this, but I
13 know that a lot of people have had things happen to them
14 after they question up here. So I hope that doesn't happen
15 to me.

16 But I just want you to know that I am not against
17 the church having this. I'm just against where they have
18 it. And I think the Town should be a little more in tune
19 with the neighbors. I mean, we do pay taxes. We do have a
20 right -- if I company on that day, I have to have -- they
21 have to park two blocks away because they're having a
22 motorcycle run. Go there and listen to the sound that it
23 makes too.

24 But anyway, I'm just here to give you my opinion.
25 Do with it whatever you like.

1 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Ms. Bozza.

2 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I would like to comment,
3 if you don't mind. I'm over here.

4 First of all, we have a Commission form of
5 Government, so anything with the police, or fire, or the
6 ambulance squad that falls under --

7 MS. BOZZA: You know, it's really hard to hear on
8 those mikes.

9 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yeah, well -- can you hear
10 me now?

11 MS. BOZZA: Yeah.

12 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Okay. So we have a
13 Commission form of Government, I said, so anything with the
14 police department, fire department, or the ambulance squad
15 falls on me. None of these other gentlemen have any say in
16 it or -- so when you come to the -- so first of all, I'd
17 like to say I don't have a problem with you coming to the
18 mike. And I could assure you nothing will be done because
19 you did. You know, that's number one.

20 Number two, I will definitely look into that first
21 thing tomorrow morning. I don't want any of our officers
22 speaking to anybody in that kind of tone or what you're
23 alleging that he did. So you know, we could even go as far
24 as opening up an internal affairs investigation on something
25 like that if you choose to complain.

1 MS. BOZZA: (Indiscernible).

2 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, let me just finish,
3 though. But I take it personal, I have to tell you, when
4 somebody comes up here and says that, you know, we're sitting
5 up here and, you know, I want to answer -- that we don't care
6 or we're annoyed because that's not the case. Because as I
7 have a deli in town, people come in there all day long with
8 issues and I never chase anybody away because I think
9 everybody's voice is important.

10 I think it's all of our Town, not just the five of
11 us that sit up here. And we pay taxes and all of that stuff
12 too, and we have issues in our neighborhoods and we try to
13 fix them. So don't ever feel that you can't reach out to me
14 because I will respond to you immediately if you have an
15 issue with one of the cops.

16 And again, I say allegedly because I want to hear
17 what he has to say about it too. And you know, get to the
18 bottom of it. And I don't pick sides. And cops, and
19 firemen, and public employees make a good dollar here and I
20 have a famous saying. If you want to get paid like a
21 professional, you have to act like a professional. You
22 know, and I don't take kind to somebody talking to you in
23 that tone, again allegedly.

24 MS. BOZZA: He didn't have to agree with me, but he
25 could have said, well, I'll look into it --

1 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yeah, exactly. Exactly.

2 MS. BOZZA: (Indiscernible) racist and a bigot --

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: If you have any problems
4 in the future, and this is my assistant, Sam Carella, please
5 give her your number or your contact. What is the day of the
6 event that you're talking about? You're saying it's a motorcycle
7 run?

8 MS. BOZZA: That's this past Sunday.

9 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Excuse me?

10 MS. BOZZA: It was just this past Sunday.

11 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: It was the past Sunday.

12 And what street was it on?

13 MS. BOZZA: Highfield Lane.

14 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: What?

15 MS. BOZZA: Highfield Lane.

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: On Highfield Lane? On
17 Washington Ave or was this --

18 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Right near the church.

19 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: By the church? It was a
20 church event? Okay.

21 MS. BOZZA: I mean, the whole street from
22 Tennis Place to North Road is blocked off from 9 o'clock
23 in the morning until 4 o'clock in the afternoon. I mean, we
24 can get out of our -- but I have to get somebody to move the
25 barriers. I mean, I don't think it's fair to people -- and

1 they can hold it so many different places. And I told her,
2 what about holding it in Holy Family parking lot or St.
3 Mary's?

4 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And what did she say?

5 MS. BOZZA: She said, well, I don't know if they
6 would be amenable because Holy Family, we don't get along
7 that well or -- what about the Town parking lot or what
8 about a park?

9 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right, right.

10 MS. BOZZA: You know, if you know what the noise of
11 200 motorcycles sounds like.

12 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I've been involved in
13 them, so I do know. I know how loud it could get and --

14 MS. BOZZA: And I don't think it's fair. You know,
15 and it happens every year. And she invites us for a hotdog
16 and that's --

17 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, I think our job as
18 elected officials is to find a happy medium.

19 MS. BOZZA: Right.

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I mean, if we could do it
21 -- maybe team up with Commissioner Tucci, hold it down there
22 and that makes you happy. But I think we -- I want you to
23 leave here knowing that if you call or have a problem, you
24 could walk in my store, you could call the police department
25 and ask for me, I will get back to you. You know, because

1 again, I don't want people -- I don't want anybody,
2 allegedly saying that a police officer or anybody in my
3 department gave them a hard time because I remind them all
4 the time that the citizens of Nutley pay our salaries or
5 their salaries, basically.

6 So if you can, please give Sam Corrella your
7 number and I'll reach out to you tomorrow.

8 MS. BOZZA: Thank you.

9 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Okay, you're very welcome.

10 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Mrs. Bozza. Would
11 anybody else like to address the Board of Commissioners this
12 evening?

13 MR. WALLACE: Good evening. Glen Wallace, 106
14 Hawthorne Avenue. Franklin Avenue between Center
15 Street and Chestnut Street, we have 31 light poles. Some of
16 those light poles have one bulb, some have two. In total,
17 there are approximately 58 light bulbs. 31 of them are out.
18 If you do the math, that's about 70 percent. 70 percent of
19 our street lights between Center and Chestnut are out.

20 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Mr. Wallace, as you know, public
21 service takes care of those. If you have the numbers that
22 are out, we'll certainly take them and report it to public
23 service.

24 MR. WALLACE: I should --

25 MAYOR SCARPELLI: No, I asked if you had the

1 numbers. I didn't ask you to do that. I know you're a
2 retired Nutley Township employee now so --

3 MR. WALLACE: Do I have the numbers for public
4 service?

5 MAYOR SCARPELLI: No, do you have the number of
6 the light poles? If you had the number of the light poles,
7 we'll report them to public service.

8 MR. WALLACE: Why hasn't anybody addressed this?
9 Does anybody not know that 70 percent of the lights on
10 Franklin Avenue, the most busiest section in that
11 area?

12 MAYOR SCARPELLI: I'm not aware of it. The police
13 patrol Franklin Avenue all day long. They haven't reported
14 it. So we'll go check it out tomorrow.

15 MR. WALLACE: I don't think I should have -- I
16 mean, there's a light pole in front of my house that's out.
17 I think I should have to take the number off and call them.
18 But when you have 70 percent of the lights on Franklin
19 Avenue that are out, I think you should -- somebody else
20 (indiscernible).

21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: We'll check it out, Mr. Wallace.
22 Thank you. Would anybody else like to address the Board of
23 Commissioners this evening?

24 MS. RUBINO: Joan Rubino, 48 North Road.

25 At the risk of sounding like a broken record, I

1 would like to know why the citizens of this Town have to
2 wait an hour and a half for a meeting to start. I realize
3 that you have things to discuss, but maybe instead of coming
4 at 6 o'clock, you could come at 5 o'clock.

5 There were some people who left because they
6 couldn't wait any longer. And they told me -- the one woman
7 told me it seemed like you don't want people here. And I've
8 said that in the past and you've (indiscernible that. But
9 this is the perception that people have when they come and
10 see what goes on.

11 I mean, you people fight long and hard to get
12 these jobs. In fact, you start years before the election to
13 work on your election, so it must mean something to you to
14 have these jobs. So why don't you honor the people in this
15 Town who come and want to take part in the public discussion
16 and be on time.

17 I attended Board of Education meetings for over 25
18 years. They never started one minute after 8 o'clock. They
19 had discussions before and if they didn't finish, they went
20 after the meeting and finished their discussions.

21 And I noticed, Mr. Mayor, you're the first one
22 running out of here at the end of the evening, so you must be
23 kind of tired too. I wish you would address this because it
24 is problematic.

25 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Mrs. Rubino, we try to get out

1 here on time. Sometimes there's just circumstances where we
2 have to have a discussion before we continue with the
3 business that we have in front of us.

4 MS. RUBINO: I understand that. My point is start
5 earlier. Instead of keeping the people waiting, I'm curious
6 to know if other towns are experiencing this same thing. I'm
7 going to start calling other Towns to see what time they get
8 started. They must also have the same issues that you have,
9 and yet they seem to be able to start their meetings.

10 And I just feel that it's really -- very
11 inconsiderate of you people. Some people have to leave work
12 early, perhaps, to get here and then when they get here,
13 they have to wait an hour and a half. That's crazy. Thank
14 you.

15 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Mrs. Rubino.

16 Would anybody else like to address the Board of
17 Commissioners this evening?

18 MR. ALESSIO: Good evening. Carmine Alessio, 81
19 East Center Street.

20 Sorry for the appearance. I was in the sewer all
21 day long. I'd like to take Mr. Tucci in the sewer with me
22 tonight. No, seriously, I want to ask him a question.

23 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: (Indiscernible).

24 MR. ALESSIO: I was in the sewer all day.

25 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: That was a joke.

1 MR. ALESSIO: Yeah, it was a joke. I'm trying to
2 be as funny as Mr. Rogers. But laying all the -- not
3 really, I apologize if you didn't get the joke.

4 But anyway, in 2012, we did the Monsignor Owens
5 Project development, okay? And I tried to follow it because
6 I begged to differ with some of the issues that are there.
7 You know, I live on East Center Street which is a
8 neighboring -- right across the street from the park
9 entrance.

10 I followed the correspondence, the letters that
11 were between the Town, and Town attorney, and I'd kind of
12 like to address the initial complaint complaining about
13 certain things like how could this be like this? How could
14 -- certain things have to be corrected.

15 So now it's like let's say six years later and
16 like the entrance across from the Parks Department that
17 leads up to the back parking lot, okay, according to the
18 correspondence is that that entrance is to stay open,
19 period.

20 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: That's not correct, Mr.
21 Alessio. That is absolutely not correct.

22 MR. ALESSIO: Maybe -- that could be your opinion
23 -- paperwork says differently. My paperwork.

24 MR. GENITEMPO: Just one -- no, originally,
25 Commissioner, the first letter from Green Acres, they wanted

1 the gate open. But we explained to them about the vandalism
2 in the park and the need to secure the upper part of the
3 park and the illegal dumping that was going on. And they
4 ended up agreeing with us and advised we could close the
5 gate.

6 So the subsequent letters have all been clear on
7 that issue.

8 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Carmine, let me address that.
9 It's a good point that you bring up. But I do have
10 correspondence not only that Mr. Genitempo sent, talking
11 about access -- ADA access either through the access road on
12 the side of the park, or through the park -- the pathway and
13 the lower portion that comes up through there.

14 And we have correspondence back from Green Acres
15 program, which reads as follows. If you give me one moment,
16 I don't want to take up your time. But it reads, "Be
17 advised and after a review of the revised letter and the
18 photograph of the revised sign by the Bureau of Legal
19 Services and Stewardship within our office, at this time I'm
20 pleased to inform the Township of Nutley that they are now
21 in compliance and no further documentation is needed."

22 We have signage on here where if people need to
23 get up there, all right, because if they can't navigate
24 their way through the lower pathway, they can make a call.
25 Someone is always there.

1 MR. ALESSIO: You're talking about like the
2 handicapped accessible or everybody in general?

3 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: This is about ADA compliance.

4 MR. ALESSIO: Okay. Now --

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: So we are in compliance.

6 MR. ALESSIO: You're going accordingly, okay. But
7 in the beginning, there are numerous non-compliance issues.
8 Then you work on them. You try to make them better. But
9 how do you completely make a 360 --

10 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Let me interrupt you again.
11 Such as? Because I'm not aware of any non-compliance.

12 MR. ALESSIO: Well, the first letter from Amy -- I
13 can't remember Suster (ph) or something like that. You have
14 numerous -- a lot of numerous non-compliance issues. You
15 weren't in compliance with different things. Like there was
16 a cell tower there. It wasn't handicap accessible. Right
17 of way entrance. Different things. It goes on, and on, and
18 on. It was like a.... I'm not here like -- this
19 is like history to me. I don't want to --

20 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Okay. But it's always been
21 accessible.

22 MR. ALESSIO: But in black and white on the
23 correspondence that we just -- I don't want to repeat it,
24 but the date according to when you were to receive grant
25 monies, which there was a deadline on it like four years

1 ago, okay, it just keeps going -- rolling over, and over,
2 and over. We're into like the sixth or seventh year and
3 there's \$150,000 hold back on the monies that the Town of
4 Nutley is to receive because of the issues there on the
5 property.

6 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Okay, let me --

7 MR. ALESSIO: What I'm trying to like do here is
8 kind of explain to you that it's in black and white that the
9 roadways to go up there and it's to remain open. Now, why
10 am I trying to like be stern on this? It's because that
11 roadway is a roadway for people to come and park, maybe on
12 the weekend, quarter to 7:00 in the morning when the
13 softball players come instead of parking on East Center
14 Street, which is very convenient to walk down the stairs.
15 And there are houses there. My house is there. There's a
16 neighbor's house across, my brother is across.

17 And they slam their doors, make noise. That's the
18 reason why I'm up here is to make sure that this right of
19 way that's been there for 60 years, going back there, which
20 I beg to differ about the DPW dumping because I think -- and
21 I don't want to keep repeating that I confronted Frank
22 Cocchiola, like why are you dumping your stuff -- why is
23 everybody always dumping on the dumping, like they said in
24 Saturday Night Fever, John Travolta. Remember that? Why is
25 everybody dumping?

1 He sits there and he says nothing. Now, it's 30
2 years later and with the stroke of a pen, Mr. Scarpelli
3 creates commercial property as a loophole to try to keep
4 that property when initially, my opinion is --

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Okay.

6 MR. ALESSIO: -- that that was property up there
7 for parking for the upper level park for future progress,
8 like today. Everything is real nice, the field is nice.

9 Now, because of that, the gates get closed because
10 I guess it's a manual thing. I discussed the issue with
11 Frank --

12 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: DeMaio?

13 MR. ALESSIO: -- DeMaio. He kindly called me back
14 and he's trying to do his job because he's saying that
15 there's dumping activity and different activity.

16 Now, that's a part of your job. You're making a
17 big (indiscernible) --

18 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Mr. Alessio, if you could wrap
19 it up a little bit.

20 MR. ALESSIO: I'm trying to get my --

21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: I understand. Let's get to the
22 point.

23 MR. ALESSIO: I can continue next week if you
24 want. I'm trying to wrap it up, okay?

25 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Please try to wrap it up.

1 MR. ALESSIO: What's going on here is because of
2 that, the activity is by my house, okay? And because that
3 roadway is being closed, they're cramming on top of the
4 little right of way entrance. Eight cars, parking where
5 there's no parking, parking in front of the -- parking in
6 all of the businesses. And what's -- that totally destroyed
7 our manufacturing district from years ago.

8 Now, we're in the new (indiscernible). The
9 density is much higher, like 10 times more, okay? I try to
10 get out of my driveway. Somebody came down on the wrong
11 side of the road. Went around right there and it slammed
12 into me, which you did say that you were sorry that that
13 happened. But it's not safe. Okay?

14 I make my calls and the people from Green Acres, I
15 don't know what's on the agenda with the attorneys but it
16 seems that they got a sob story that they're dumping. So
17 now they're just going to close that gate when it was
18 initially written in black and white, that was the
19 agreement. You keep the gate open, you get your money.

20 I don't know what's going on behind closed doors,
21 okay? And I don't want to negatively think that there is
22 something, but all of a sudden, now they're going to close
23 the gate.

24 You know what? I'm not going to let them destroy
25 my property. And then I'm going to take somebody else's

1 story the next I come. Hopefully -- there might be one.
2 I'm not going to keep it a secret. And I'm going to have
3 another thing to talk about. But I'm coming here to try to
4 like represent this issue the right way in that it's created
5 a catastrophe where I'm at. They do fly down the hill doing
6 more than 60 miles an hour. And if that little parking area
7 was opened, maybe the kids that played softball on the
8 weekend could go up here.

9 I know because I checked it out, it's like VIP
10 parking. Like you get a -- I've seen people going -- I was
11 watching it Saturday because this was going on, okay? It
12 was closed. People are putting passes in the -- like VIP.
13 How about me? I've been here, my family has been here since
14 the 1920's. I want a VIP parking. If I get jammed up on
15 this thing, I want to be able to go around and --

16 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Mr. Alessio, wrap it up.

17 MR. ALESSIO: That's just being facetious, okay?

18 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I got you.

19 MR. ALESSIO: But is this thing going to stay
20 closed or is it going to stay open? So far, I'm 100 percent
21 sure, through my dealings with Green Acres, that you want
22 some kind of a battle and you're going to close it now,
23 which is going to create a detriment where I'm at and where
24 the kids are across the street.

25 It's like we have a million other activities going

1 on, which I'm going to get to.

2 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Mr. Alessio, can we let
3 Commissioner Tucci address your concern about the gate?

4 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Right. Okay, let me --

5 MR. ALESSIO: But anyway --

6 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Let me answer some of your
7 concerns.

8 MR. ALESSIO: If you would answer it. Thank you
9 for hearing me and, you know, I mean, I come up here
10 unprepared. You know what I mean? I don't have any notes
11 or anything. I'm just trying to -- it's very hard to do
12 what I'm doing.

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Right. And let me begin by
14 saying number one, I'm sorry if anything we do is
15 inconveniencing you. But I need to correct you on a couple
16 of points. Number one, there are no back room deals. There
17 are no VIP cards, all right? We didn't give Green Acres a
18 sob story. We simply laid out to Green Acres what was
19 occurring. All right? The dumping in the dump area where
20 people have dumped for years, and the dumping that occurred
21 in the parking area on the top.

22 We said to them we have an issue here, all right,
23 which for whatever reason you're not accepting, okay? But
24 we do -- we did have an issue and they said okay. This is
25 for ADA compliance, all right, for handicapped folks to

1 drive up on top. Not for VIPs to drive up on top, all
2 right. We encourage most people to park down below, all
3 right? And most do. And where they can, they use the
4 pathway that we installed with the CDBG money to have the
5 access so people can get up that way.

6 If folks need to get in there, all right? We are
7 always ready, willing, and able to open that gate and to let
8 them in there.

9 All right? The parking situation on East Center
10 Street. People have been parking on East Center Street for
11 years. I'm sorry that they're being disrespectful to you
12 and your neighborhood. If we can do anything, and I'll
13 speak with Mr. DeMaio to try and alleviate some of that, we
14 absolutely will. But there are no compliance issues. We
15 are in total compliance.

16 We have correspondence from the State of New
17 Jersey. All right? We're doing everything that we should
18 be doing, Carmine.

19 MR. ALESSIO: Who's to say that they're on the
20 level? I say --

21 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Who's to say who is on the
22 level?

23 MR. ALESSIO: The state with the Town of Nutley.

24 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Well --

25 MR. ALESSIO: Hey, look, if you picked up maybe

1 some of the --

2 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Why would the state not --

3 MR. ALESSIO: Because that's how -- what I know.

4 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: (Indiscernible).

5 MR. ALESSIO: That is my opinion. That's what

6 I --

7 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Okay. Well, listen, everyone
8 is entitled --

9 MR. ALESSIO: How you could go from violation here
10 (indiscernible) you look out your door, you see nothing has
11 been done except --

12 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Right. There is no
13 violation, all right? There is nothing that's untoward --

14 MR. ALESSIO: (Indiscernible).

15 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: -- going on there.

16 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Mr. Alessio, let Commissioner
17 Tucci finish.

18 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I --

19 MR. ALESSIO: But he's wrong. Maybe they're
20 dumping up there --

21 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: No, I have to disagree with
22 you.

23 MR. ALESSIO: They dumped--

24 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I am not wrong. I would be
25 happy to share with you all of the correspondence that we

1 have from the state going back and forth.

2 MR. ALESSIO: I'm not asking for
3 that. I'm asking about the entrance. I don't need to hear
4 about all of this and all of that. I'm asking you about the
5 entrance. In black and white it says from the initial start
6 that it was to be -- stay open.

7 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: And I'm going to tell you for
8 the last time, okay? Because I'm --

9 MR. ALESSIO: (Indiscernible).

10 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: -- for whatever reason,
11 you --

12 MR. ALESSIO: It's closed.

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: You might be hearing me, but
14 you're not understanding me. Okay? It is not to be closed,
15 all right? I'm sorry, it's not to be open at all times.
16 End of story, Carmine. That's the fact. All right?

17 I have no reason, all right, to say anything
18 that's not correct, all right? There is no other reason for
19 us to do that. And the state came and they visited several
20 times, all right, as I'm sure you know. And the state is in
21 agreement with us and they have allowed us to do -- to keep
22 that gate closed because it was, in fact, a problem and it
23 does, in fact, cost the Township money when people dump up
24 there, all right, and when people leave abandoned cars up
25 there --

1 MR. ALESSIO: (Indiscernible).

2 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: -- and tires and everything
3 else. It's not only manpower, but it's also disposal costs.

4 MR. ALESSIO: (Indiscernible).

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: So that's why it's closed.

6 MR. ALESSIO: that's more important than
7 dumping than to have these people use that 30 foot road --

8 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Mr. Alessio, let's give somebody
9 else a chance to address us tonight.

10 MR. ALESSIO: -- (indiscernible).

11 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: There's no (indiscernible)
12 for parking, Carmine.

13 MR. ALESSIO: I don't agree with it and --

14 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Listen, we can agree to
15 disagree.

16 MR. ALESSIO: And the correspondence is completely
17 like (indiscernible) a different -- from lunar Mars. Now
18 it's all changing all of a sudden. Okay? Because they did
19 switch employees and they did -- there's a lot of
20 maneuvering -- political maneuvering going on, okay? But
21 you're not considering the citizens in the town,
22 right, on East Center Street.

23 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Mr. Alessio. Would
24 anybody else like to address the Board of Commissioners this
25 evening?

1 MR. ALESSIO: Okay. You're welcome. Sorry for
2 taking all of the time.

3 MS. ROSSI: Good evening. Tammy Rossi, 28
4 Colonial Terrace.

5 I would just ask the question as a follow up
6 regarding the Board of Commissioners holding a hearing
7 regarding the recommendations from the Planning Board for
8 definition of mixed use and density. Has there been a date
9 set yet for that?

10 MAYOR SCARPELLI: There's no date set for the
11 hearing. We just got the letter from Mr.Kozyra, what
12 day, counselor?

13 MR. GENITEMPO: I think it was Friday.

14 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Friday. So that will be
15 addressed in an upcoming meeting.

16 MS. ROSSI: In the next meeting?

17 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Yes, probably.

18 MS. ROSSI: Okay. Thank you very much.

19 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Okay.

20 MR. MOORE: Rory Moore, 462 Chestnut Street. I'll
21 be brief, Mr. Scarpelli.

22 This evening, Ms. Rabino had asked -- a number of
23 other people did complain as well, that you were back in
24 executive session. I believe your comment was that
25 sometimes you have to be there in order to come out here.

1 To the best of my knowledge, as long as I've been
2 coming, I've never seen where the executive session came out
3 here and disclosed what was discussed in the back.

4 MAYOR SCARPELLI: I didn't disclose what was
5 discussed or -- I'm just saying sometimes we have to meet
6 before we could decide on something here.

7 MR. MOORE: Tonight it was personnel, so that
8 wasn't even going to be discussed here. And I do know --
9 I'm not trying to be nitpicky about it, but there's a lot of
10 times a lot of things (indiscernible) that things are
11 discussed back there for a reason because all five of you
12 are in the same room at the same time. And --

13 MR. GENITEMPO: Mr. Moore, I can unequivocally
14 tell you I do not support that statement. And we abide by
15 the rules in executive session. And I resent the fact that
16 you would say that. And I don't support anything you say
17 because it's only half truths. It's not true.

18 The Commissioners discuss business that we talk
19 about, we put on the record. And you know it because you
20 get the executive session minutes, you just don't want to
21 believe it. But I can't help you with that.

22 MR. MOORE: Well, I'm not asking you --

23 MR. GENITEMPO: Please don't say that I agree with
24 you about anything.

25 MR. MOORE: Okay, yes. Most times, yes. The

1 other Towns that I know of, because I have looked into a few
2 others, they do their meeting before, the day before. And
3 the regular meeting is the next day to eliminate that. And
4 you also -- the other gentleman who was up here talking
5 about the lights. You said that you were going to have
6 somebody go out there tomorrow to check the lights? How are
7 you going to check the lights when the lights are off during
8 the day?

9 MAYOR SCARPELLI: We could have people check it
10 tomorrow night, do you want us to make it a little bit more
11 clear, Mr. Moore?

12 MR. MOORE: No, no -- it's -- yeah, it's good.
13 And one last question, Mr. Evans, I believe the Town Clerk
14 is at a seminar. What's (indiscernible) if I can ask?

15 COMMISSIONER EVANS: She's at the annual Municipal
16 Clerk's Association meeting in Atlantic City.

17 MR. MOORE: And what is that? It's four days,
18 five days?

19 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I think it's three days. Two
20 or three days.

21 MR. MOORE: Okay, thank you.

22 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to
23 address the Board of Commissioners this evening? Seeing
24 none.

25 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Move to adjourn.

1 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Second.

2 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

3 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

4 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

6 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

7 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

8 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

9 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

10 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

11 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

12 Good night, everybody.

13 MADAM CLERK: And the time is 9:32.

14 (Meeting was adjourned)
