COMMISSIONER EVANS: Here.
MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?
COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Here.
MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?
MAYOR SCARPELLI: Here.
MADAM CLERK: All present, Mayor, except for Commissioner Tucci and Commissioner Rogers is going to join us in a little while.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Petracco, what do you have on the agenda tonight?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Let's see. I have an ordinance introduction for May lst will the public hearing. This is for handicapped parking. Then I have a public
hearing to change our TO, I believe that's what that is for. And then $I$ have a couple of resolutions, authorize submission of strategic plan for the Nutley Municipal Alliance grant for fiscal year 2019.

Supporting the 2018 UDrive, UText, UPay, distracted driving crackdown, which I urge everybody to be very aware. Very good, aware that they're out there. Last year on Center street we wrote 68 tickets in one day for pedestrian crossing if you recall.

I see that we have the appointment of Adriana Russo as interim administrator of the court. Why is it interim?

MADAM CLERK: It's for another two years until she gets her certification.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: This says one year term. MADAM CLERK: It's one year. So she -- one year and then one more year. She gets a total of three years. COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Thank you. Okay. I thought she was already in. And then $I$ see the reject all the towing service bids. That needs to be done.

MADAM CLERK: It absolutely needs to be done.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And that's all I have.
MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Evans?
COMMISSIONER EVANS: I have -- for tonight, I just
-- I have five resolutions. Three relate to the temporary budget. Since we haven't been able to have yet the public hearing or been able to adopt, we have to -- under statute, we actually work under a temporary authorization until we get final approvals. So it's three resolutions related to that in and of itself. So the operating budgets, and bond interest and water utility.

And then $I$ have a resolution for DRS Imaging which we set aside funds to begin scanning the records of the Code Enforcement Department which we have to maintain permanently under state statute. So we're awarding a contract to DRS Imaging, who's part of the Union County Cooperative Purchasing System.

And then $I$ have one resolution for tax overcharges.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Very good. Commissioner, I'll give you a couple of seconds to get settled, but --

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Thank you.
MAYOR SCARPELLI: I have an award of a fair and open contract to AJM Contractors, that's for CDBG Roadway that's a grant and it will be Princeton Street, Hunt Place, and Bayard Street.

And then I'll authorize and approve for a raffle for the HSA Fairview of Bloomfield. That's all I have. Commissioner?

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COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Okay. Mayor, I have three resolutions. One to declare April 2018 as oral cancer awareness month. Another one to recognize April as national donate life month. And then recognize April 2nd through the 8th as national public health week. That's all.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thanks, Commissioner. Madam Clerk?

MADAM CLERK: We just have an application for the 99th annual Memorial Day parade, which will be on Monday, May 28th from 10:00 to 1:00 p.m. And we have regular minutes for February 6th. And that's it.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: I'll move it.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco? COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Move the bills.
COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?
COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.
MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.
MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.
MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?
MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.
MADAM CLERK: And that's it for bills, Mayor.
MAYOR SCARPELLI: Public comment on agenda items
only. Madam Clerk.
MADAM CLERK: All persons addressing the Board of Commissioners regarding community concerns should approach the microphone and provide their name and address for the record. Unless further time is granted by the Board, each person shall limit their address to three minutes. All remarks to the Board and its individual members must be addressed to the Mayor. The Mayor may defer citizens' comments to the appropriate member of the Board. Dialogue between citizens and others addressing the Board shall be allowed unless the Mayor or presiding officer, or the majority of the membership of the Board, shall determine that the interest of decorum and/or the expeditious conduct of municipal business are being adversely affected by such dialogue.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody like to address the Board of Commissioners on agenda items only?

MR. MOORE: Rory Moore, 462 Chestnut Street.
Mr. Scarpelli, I have three questions. I'm not sure if you can answer the first one. It's under Mr. Tucci. Princeton posting Solutions, what is that? Do you know? Do we have --

MAYOR SCARPELLI: I cannot answer that, Mr. Moore.
MR. MOORE: (Indiscernible). One question on the back, could you make the distinction to me on your overtime
list between work operations. Is that separate from public works?

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Well, it's paid out of a separate payable account. It's paid out of the water utility.

MR. MOORE: Are they separate employees? That's what I'm trying to find out. Is that a separate -MAYOR SCARPELLI: Well, they're all public works employees, but some are paid out of --

MR. MOORE: But that $I$ understand and the water is being paid out of a separate account.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: It's paid out of the water utility, correct.

MR. MOORE: But are those employees, are they separate? Is it one department versus the other one or are they all the same --

MAYOR SCARPELLI: For the most part, yes. MR. MOORE: It's all the same department? MAYOR SCARPELLI: It's all the public works department. This is the water utility. They get paid out of the water utility. And it is the public works department paid out of the budget of the public works. But they're all Department of Public Works employees.

MR. MOORE: Okay. Thank you. And one last question, Mr. Petracco, your -- 87-18, can I get a copy of
that?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Can you get what?

MR. MOORE: It's an authorization. You just have it down -- listed as a line item here. I'd really like to see that.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: On the bill list?

MR. MOORE: No, it's on the -- on your agenda
items under you -- 87-18, first page at the bottom. Authorization for strategic plan for the Nutley Municipal Alliance grant.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Can you get a copy of that?

MR. MOORE: Yes.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Sure.

MR. MOORE: Thanks a lot.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: You're welcome.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to address the Board of Commissioners on agenda items only?

Seeing none, let's move on to the Board of Commissioner announcements. Any announcements, Commissioners? Good.

Ordinance introductions. Commissioner Petracco?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yes, thank you.

I have ordinance number 3381, an ordinance to amend -- let's see this -- no.

Ordinance number 3383, an ordinance to amend an ordinance codified in the Code of the Township of Nutley, Chapter 228, entitled vehicles and traffic, particularly Article VII (special zones and areas), section 29A entitled handicapped parking to add to the locations set forth.

I move that this ordinance be passed to a second reading and advertised in the Nutley Sun, together with notice required by law and that further consideration of said ordinance for final passage by the Board of Commissioners to be held at its second reading -- what is -what was the second reading?

> MADAM CLERK: May 1st.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: What is it?

MADAM CLERK: May 1st.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: May 1st, 2018.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Second.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.
MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.
MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?
MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.
MAYOR SCARPELLI: Public hearings. Commissioner

Petracco?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yes. I have ordinance number 3381. An ordinance to amend an ordinance codified in the Township of Nutley Code, Chapter 131, entitled establishment and organization of the police department. MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody like to be heard on ordinance number 3381?

MR. MOORE: Rory Moore, 462 Chestnut Street.
Mr. Petracco, this ordinance $I$ believe you're adding one lieutenant, is that correct?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: We are.

MR. MOORE: And the lieutenant that you're adding, will they be promoted from the 13 sergeants you have or do you have -- is there a particular way to promote to a lieutenant?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: It's all through civil service and whoever scored the highest on the test and who's number one, two, or three on that list.

MR. MOORE: But that would be from the sergeants list, I --

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: From the sergeants list, yes.

MR. MOORE: And how -- do you know how current that one is?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I don't know how current
it is.

MR. MOORE: I believe it has to be two years, I'm not sure.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Uh-huh.

MR. MOORE: So we can assume that this lieutenant that's going to be hired here will be hired from the sergeants -- all the sergeants.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: That's the only place they can get hired off of.

MR. MOORE: And what is the reason we're adding one more --

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, I think that with everything that has happened with the schools, you know, and what's going on in the country, that cyber -- a cyber unit is what we're trying to create to scrub through computers and instead of being reactive, be proactive.

And my goal right now is to add that position, have a lieutenant be in charge of it. This way before we have an active shooter or anything else with events and traffic leading up to some type of event, that we can be proactive and take a proactive approach to make sure that there's not any cyber threats out there.

And not that it's a cure-all, Rory, because it's not because things do pass through. But it's just another layer to prevent something from happening, especially when
it comes to the schools.

MR. MOORE: So is this lieutenant going to be computer-bound, technically?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, I think they're going to -- I don't like to say exactly what their role is going to be for multiple safety reasons. However, everybody at the Nutley Police Department and Fire Department, no matter what their title is or their rank, we multitask there.

So will they be sitting in front of a computer all day? I'd like to see that be their specific job and they would be in charge of that team that they're surrounding themselves with.

MR. MOORE: Because I called the State Police, the New Jersey State Police.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I met with them and Commissioner Evans.

MR. MOORE: They remembered you. And I did call Homeland Security because $I$ was curious that you say that you want to have this surveillance, for lack of a better word.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right.
MR. MOORE: And that somebody sitting in front of a computer is not going to catch them. The way it's usually done is through algorithm through (indiscernible), Facebook,

Instagram, somebody else. It's usually run through a computer. That's how you catch them.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, that's exactly what I'm talking about.

MR. MOORE: Because here --
COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Where's the disconnect? Where's the disconnect between you and I on that because that's exactly what $I$--

MR. MOORE: Because it says SRO officer here and you know in the ordinance. That's what confused me about it because if you're going to have somebody -- you've already purchased the feeds and you've already written the algorithms. That's what's going to catch everybody.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And that's the whole purpose of this, Rory. So I would have to look to see exactly what --

MR. MOORE: It says SRO in here. COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right. MR. MOORE: And I'm --

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, that's a special resource officer. So that's not exactly --

MR. MOORE: Well, according to the state Police, an SRO is a physical officer that goes into the schools. COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Hired through the police department.

MR. MOORE: But that -- their thing was they go into the school, SROs.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right.
MR. MOORE: And the other distinction is that if you're going to use the algorithm to find it, which is what everybody else is using, it's totally separate. And that's what $I$ was trying to understand. Because you said that last time that you wanted to use a computer to catch them. But you don't use an $S R O$ to do that.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right.
MR. MOORE: That's a distinction $I$ was trying to make.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I understand.
MR. MOORE: So will we be having a cyber security
team? Is that where this is going to go?
COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: That's the goal that - what I want to do. Like I said, you know, from the last threat and we had a couple threats in Nutley, you know, obviously it was kind of a learning process for me at that time. But after meeting with Homeland Security and the State Police as well, you know, those agencies are great and they have all the resources after something happens. So what I'm trying to do is to put a team together that we can prevent something from happening.
So it's not -- as far as the reaction and to
respond to something like that, $I$ know we have all the tools. We have the $S U$ team in Nutley that are second to none. They have the best outfits as far -- they're best outfitted with equipment and everything. We have the Homeland Security that would respond. But that's always after the fact.

And what I've learned through the state Police division too is they do monitor these computers and, you know, they do the best they can. But they also said to us don't just count on us, you have to take a proactive approach locally with your local police department in order to make sure that you're on top of it as well.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: And may I follow up on that? COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Sure.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Rory, one of the failures that we have found nationally with a lot of these incidents around the country is the lack of sharing information and intelligence on a local level. The $F B I$, the national security agencies do a good job on sharing that information.

In this case, and the Commissioner and I have talked about this at length, you'll get information here now in Nutley that will go into a computer bank, a data bank, and that information is going to be shared with multiple, multiple agencies. That's the output.

The input, other police agencies that have information on a local level will be able to share that with us. So I think it was a -- not $I$ think, I know it is a very good step forward in being proactive. And this is the result of a lot of what we've seen around the country because as the Commissioner said, there's great reactive responses to incidents but we find that there were a lot of red flags around the country that weren't picked up because of the failure to collect and share information.

So that's basically what $I$ believe Commissioner you're really zeroing in on.

MR. MOORE: And it's -- now, you said you're going to build a team. On here, you're building one lieutenant. How many sergeants will follow the lieutenant? How many patrolmen will be assigned to this?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, that's --
MR. MOORE: Because I'm sure this is an infant stage.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, first of all, 1 just looked through here also and I seen that where it says your SRO is -- and also the PYO. You know, this is just an outline of the way the police department is. That doesn't say in no means that we can't create another division of the police department. You know, and that doesn't say that -that would be part of our investigation bureau, which is
already in place. So it would be another leg of it. So don't get confused with the SRO because that has nothing to do with what $I$ want to accomplish by adding this lieutenants position.

MR. MOORE: I'm not confused --
COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And as far -- no, I see what it says in here, but I'm just saying that's kind of standard language of the table of organization in the police department. However, what -- again, what we're trying to create, Rory, is to be proactive. You know, not to have these threats or when we get these threats that we're not responding to there is an active shooter. As far as manpower and who's going to go where, as you know, the chief runs the day to day operations. So this is a policy that I'm putting in effect and I've been talking to the chief and saying this is the direction we want to go in.

Can I tell you, you know, that in the 68 man police department we're going to have 10 people in here? No. We're definitely going to pursue this, you know, and we're going to try to utilize the people that we have, you know, and like I said multi-tasking.

We don't have the luxury in the Nutley Police Department to have anybody sit in front of a computer from you know, whatever their shift is to the end of their shift. Because, as you know, we sometimes only have five patrolmen
on the road, you know, between sick time, vacation time, you know, and all that other stuff. We battle it.

You know, and I don't want to get into the domestic violence, how that ties up four officers, you know two officers for almost eight hours of their shift. I don't want to get into the bail reform today that myself and the Mayor sat through of how that's hindering the police department.

But $I$ can say this, is that what the idea of this is is to prevent things from not only happening at the schools, but happening at our events, and to gather intelligence. You know, that's exactly what this ordinance is for.

You're very welcome.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to be heard on ordinance number 3381?

MS. LANDRY: Penny Landry, 135 Lakeside Drive.
On 3381, (indiscernible) as I recall when the ordinance or resolution was passed providing the police with a three percent raise over the two percent state cap, I do recall it being said that part of the negotiations of that was that we would keep our organizational structure the same. And now I see that we're adding another person. So I'm unsure of what happened to that part of it where we -COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I don't recall ever saying
that --

MS. LANDRY: And so I'd like to finish -COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: -- but I'm sure that you might be able to pull that -MS. LANDRY: I'd like to finish. COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, I'd like to answer that first leg of the question. MS. LANDRY: Well, I would like to finish because if - COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: So I don't ever remember saying that, number one --

MS. LANDRY: (Indiscernible) -COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: -- but if I did -MAYOR SCARPELLI: Ms. Landry, let the Commissioner address --

MS. LANDRY: So I didn't ask a question.
MAYOR SCARPELLI: -- the one thing.
MS. LANDRY: I didn't ask a question. I'd like to finish. This is a hearing on an ordinance and I'd like to finish.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I was just answering --
MS. LANDRY: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: -- your statement.
MS. LANDRY: Thank you.
COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: You're very welcome, Ms.

Landry.

MS. LANDRY: As I understand it, the Board is doing an investigation as to how to deal with school security. Part of this investigation involves how they will handle the enhanced security at each school. They have met with the state Police, Homeland Security, etcetera.

Given that -- what you have said, that part of this new position given that currently have over $\$ 1.6$ million increase in our potential tax levy, I am respectfully asking your Commissioners that you postpone voting on this ordinance to add another high paying position to our police department until the Board of Ed completes their investigation, and that you do this -- if a person needs to be hired, because you said you want to do a team and this is all kind of not totally decided yet, that instead of voting tonight on this ordinance that you collaborate with the Board of Ed with their study and their research and wait until that data comes back. And then decide what is the best thing to do with our police organizational structure as it relates to the study being done by the Board of Ed.

Thank you.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Ms. Landry. Would anybody else like to be heard on ordinance number 3381? Seeing none.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Move to close. COMMISSIONER ROGRS: Second.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.
MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.
COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I move the ordinance.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: I second.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: I vote yes and I just want
to make something clear. You know, we could delay and delay and delay when it comes to public safety, and every single time a law enforcement agency or community delays, some tragedy happens and there is this hue and cry to speed up the process.

This Commissioner sitting next to me has probably lost more sleep over the incidents that have happened around this country. We've been on the phone 2 o'clock in the morning. And my colleagues also have been involved in this. Beating our brains out, trying to find a way, any way, to help prevent a tragedy like we've seen around the country
here in Nutley.

These decisions are not easy. These are complex issues. And my point is this, ladies and gentlemen, is that what is the intent here? Is the intent to just hire a guy to expand the table of organization or is it to give maximum protection to the best of our ability? That's the intent here.

I was a police officer here 38 years. Chief John Holland (ph) and I used to drive around town. And do you know what we used to say to ourselves? How on earth did communities around us throughout New Jersey go to hell in a hand basket? How did that happen?

It happened when local governments decided to cut back on public safety. That was the first stage. It happened when they decided to, yes, pour millions of dollars into be reactive, but not much money into being proactive. When we were proactive, we had community policing. We had cops in the schools. And do you know what those proactive programs did, brought us a tremendous amount of intelligence and information about the drug problem.

But this is much worse. This is much worse. So I support this purely on the basis that it's needed. And I did research. Do you know what the research is I did, folks? I watched Fox and CNN and then I watched all the bloodshed around this country and I just don't want to see
it happen here.

We may not succeed, but what do you always say to me? At least we can put our heads on the pillows at night and maybe 15 years from now when all of us are retired and gone we can say we did the best we could. So I vote yes.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

COMMISSIONER EVANS: 15 years and I probably won't be that old to be gone, but $I$ understand the point.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: (Indiscernible), right, in my memoirs.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: I agree with you. I'll be under a palm tree but $I$ won't be under under the palm tree. Just a point.

Before I vote, and Commissioner Petracco, it's my understanding that yes, that Homeland Security is going to do a review of all seven schools in Nutley, right? I know you were -- you met with --

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: They actually just -- not to interrupt you, but they actually came back and said right now they're only able to do two. So we're working with the Board of Ed and the police department to see how we're going to -- and it's a Board of Ed issue, but we're seeing what we could do to help out as well.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: My -- and my understanding is that they're going to cover all five but there's a staging
to that, right?
COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Hopefully.
COMMISSIONER EVANS: From what I understood. I also understood is like if you look at the Parkland incident, right, that individual that rose to the point where they brought a gun to the school, basically, there were 30 calls to the local police department for that as well as four calls to the FBI around that and nobody took any action, right?

First off, here in Nutley, one person raised a question about a video that seemed to suggest something negative and Nutley Police Department responded and took action. So one of the things that is very clear is that prevention, right, and response is critical to avoiding a major incident.

And there has been incidents around the country where you've had armed officers on campus and those where not on campus. So what's also important to understand is that simply putting a gun on -- in the school isn't going to stop any threat because it's a -- it's actually about having an integrated layer, in effect a net at multiple levels.

The last thing that $I$ understand about this is that you did meet with a state Police from the Homeland Security Department to discuss how this is established at a local level, right, and understanding how this fits into a
local network in place to actually do early identification which leads to -- what we all want to avoid is an event where someone could lose their life.

So not only do I believe we should vote on this, I think it's critical that we vote on this so that we can look at and look at ourselves in the mirror and say we know we're taking every action possible to protect not just our children in the school, but to protect the residents of Nutley and how critical that is.

That's my understanding and that's why $I$ vote yes. COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Thank you.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco? COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I vote yes. And I also just wanted to a make a statement too. You know, sitting up here as the public safety director for -- I guess it's almost 11 years now, right? So you know, although we watch these budgets and we are sympathetic to the taxpayer, as long as I sit here, I will -- I think my job, solely, is to ensure the safety of all the residents and especially our children.

And others make it known that $I$ will never, ever spare any expense to keep our children safe in these schools. And I think that this specific position and what we're trying to accomplish is critical.

And like Commissioner Rogers said, and

Commissioner Evans echoed, is that you know, God forbid if something happens while we're sitting here. And I'll just be very clear, when I'm sitting under that palm tree someday with you guys, you know, and God forbid if something happens in Nutley, I won't have one regret saying that $I$ should have did this or $I$ should have done that when it comes to any safety in the Township of Nutley.

So again, $I$ vote yes. Thank you.

I know that last time when we did this on Center Street, I believe the number -- I don't want to say exactly what the number is in case I'm wrong and $I$ get called out on it, but $I$ want to say that in one day -- in one day, we wrote 68 pedestrian tickets for
crosswalks on Center street alone.

So I urge everybody, the Mayor said in the back be aware that the cops will be out there. We'll have county cops there also. They will be issuing tickets. If you mention my name, it's probably not going to get you out of it.

So please, they are instructed to write tickets for those infractions. It's a big problem in Nutley. It's one of the biggest complaints we get is the pedestrian crossing and the speeding in Town. And it's either my son or daughter got a ticket or my wife/husband whatever got a ticket because they were speeding or they didn't get a ticket and somebody else was speeding or in a crosswalk.

So please know that they're going to be out there. It's really a problem in the state, the country with texting on your phone and all this distracted driver. I remember reading this resolution that the distracting driver with cellphones has surpassed the drunken driving that's in our country. So it's a big problem. Please be aware these next couple weeks. And please practice it. Show some courtesy to your Nutley residents when they are in a crosswalk. That would be great.

MR. MOORE: Rory Moore, 462 Chestnut Street.

Mr. Rogers -- I would like to address Mr. Rogers' comments before. I was very, very -- I was offended by really what you said because you always wait until everybody sits down rather than have a dialogue. But Ms. Penny and I,
separately, researched this extensively. We called the Board of Ed. I spoke to Ms. Glazer. I know pretty much what they're doing and what their (indiscernible) process was.

For you to sit here and denigrate people for standing up, I read this for the state Police. It's an SRO. It's a school resource officer. That's all it is. You've hired a lieutenant. When I called Homeland Security, they said it was a school resource officer. Everything that Mr. Petracco said he wanted to have is computer (indiscernible). It's an algorithm in computer, computer feed, that's all it is. You could have it up and running in less than an hour, and you could find everything out you need to know.
(Indiscernible) that people come up here and just say we don't want another lieutenant. We don't need another lieutenant for this. You need a computer and a geek that knows how to use it, and they run it every hour so we know what's going on. And yes, maybe they'll become part of the network where you're going to share information, but that's not what this ordinance said.

This ordinance hired a lieutenant. If he's going to be hired from the 13 that exists right now, which one has a computer degree? So you're going to put somebody sitting in front of a computer reading it and you think you're going to capture somebody? It doesn't work that way.

So people over here that do stand up and say what
about this and ask questions, don't think for one minute that this wasn't researched. And don't think it's easy to stand up here and say we're questioning the safety of the children. Where did you ever dream of this? My kids went to these schools. I coached these -- the children here. You think that we want to say cheaply, don't hire a lieutenant.

Get a computer. Hire a geek like everybody else does. Homeland Security, they'd have it up in 30 minutes and then you could start to find it. You don't need a lieutenant to do that.

Thank you.
COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I'd like to comment, if I may.

So, Rory, that's really -- I met with Homeland Security and I met with the cyber unit of the State Police and it's not just about hiring a lieutenant or a geek to stay there in the police department and in a half hour you have these feeds and all that stuff. It's a lot more complicated than that.

As far as what the Board of Ed is doing, that's what the Board of Ed does. And I know you know this. Public safety is a -- in this town, is a completely different entity of what the Board of Ed does. If I was in charge of the Board of Ed, I may want to do something
different than they're doing or vice versa. But you know, opinions -- everybody has an opinion. You're entitled to yours. But an $S R O$ is not what I'm looking to put in there. And this person would be doing a lot of different things as far as intelligence, working with the schools. If they do put some kind of security in the schools, you know, intelligence is the biggest thing.

So I don't want you to think that the only thing that this person is going to be doing, or this team is created to do is to stand in a front of a computer because that's not the case. And I know that there's services out there that you can hire and I think that's what you're talking about to come up with threats and all that stuff.

But after meeting with Homeland Security and the State Police, it's really downplaying it that it's -- you know, every half hour you get something. That's just not true.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to address the Board of Commissioners this evening? MR. ALESSIO: Carmine Alessio, 81 E. Center Street. (Indiscernible). I don't feel like partying tonight. COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Okay. Say your piece. MR.ALESSIO: You were talking about distracted drivers.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I was.

MR. ALESSIO: Before on Center street. So you know, I said -- I've got to get my wheels going here and maybe I can make someone see the light.

Now, people do text and do that type of activity but think about the reverse case scenario when someone just trying to use the street, go up Center Street, facilitate the bank, you know get around Town like I try to do. And what's going on is I think we're overdeveloping where all these apartments and all these people.

Now, you talked about Center street how tickets were being issued because of bad activities. But if you think of the flip side of it, like me going up the street and the park -- Mr. Tucci is not here. I wish -- somebody is always missing when $I$ want to confront like my opinion. But you're going up Center street and now they've renovated the little kiddie park to where it's bigger. It's called Frank Cocchiola park, now it's Yanticaw Park. And there's no on-site parking. There's just off -- on-street parking.

Now, I just like (indiscernible)). I got out of my vehicle and I looked around. And I saw that the beautiful oak trees had been taken down. That's one point that I'd like to make. I pretty much know for a fact the park is larger. And on a March day, you figure during the day, there wouldn't be any cars on the street, but it's like a domino effect.

We have Chase Bank. We have Wells Fargo. We have like a four-way -- six-way intersection within 20 feet. The crosswalk is in the middle of way. It's just a bad site.

Now, you're coming down Center street. You have the police decoys trying to do their job. The crosswalk is not even visible. It's half (indiscernible) and worn out. You're going 20 miles an hour and you're trying to get through Town.

I noticed that because of this new park and it's bigger, last summer, there was a catastrophe with out of towners, people in town trying to use that park. Taking their strollers out of the back of their cars, trying to get situated. And they have to cross over to the Yanticaw Park. And we're over there at the flip side again, trying to get through.

And I'm over here trying to respect people -- do I stop? I know when $I$ get out of a car, people are trying to let me go. I've got to hide like 20 feet behind my vehicle so they don't come -- they're so afraid. They're telling me to go, but yet the opposite side -- reverse traffic is flying down. I'm going to listen to the driver stopping to let me go and I'm going to get whacked by the oncoming traffic the other way.

My point here is we have 14 parking spots, 4 on
the right going west, and 10 on the left. Like where are these people going to park? Then -- I look at the Chase Bank that's totally against, in my opinion, the municipal land use act of this mixed use building. We've got 20 units there with offices.

I notice at 10 o'clock, 11 o'clock, 12 o'clock, the street is loaded. Where are all of these people going
to go? They want to take their little kiddies and venture, everybody loves children. How are they going to get across the street without some kind of maybe fatality, like that happening in (indiscernible) a couple years back.

I go there. People talk. One person went through to the doctor's office. Another one I saw (indiscernible) or somebody whacked somebody on the bumper (indiscernible). It's like a catastrophe. Like this is a little town. It's only a three mile radius. We don't want this town to go the way it's going with all these apartments, mixed use on every corner. Like figure something out. We need jobs. We don't need people with little businesses into residential areas and ruin the whole --

MR. GENITEMPO: That's five minutes. Thank you.

MR. ALESSIO: If you keep (indiscernible), you can take my point into consideration with Mr. Tucci or something. Straighten it out.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: What do you think the solution is to the park, Carmen?

MR. ALESSIO: Put parking -- instead of --
COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Park Drive.
MR. ALESSIO: Put a parking lot to facilitate some of these people so they can take their strollers out or do something.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, that's a county park, right? Yeah, that's a --

MR. ALESSIO: How about Booth Park? It's like all trees and a gully. Straighten it out a little bit. I mean, like I don't want to come here. I want to be home eating my dinner and watching T.V.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Mr. Alessio?
MR. ALESSIO: I don't want to come here - I'm forced to come here and then, you know, you threw a curve at me when you started talking about safety. The flip side, people do text. That's terrible, but there are good drivers and they want to get where they're going.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Mr. Alessio, that's a county park and Park Drive, part of that is a county roadway, but we'll take it up with the county and see what we could do about some parking on Park Drive.

MR. ALESSIO: I wasn't aware it's a - - and I do make calls. And $I$ try to like say, hey, look, where are we
going with this? Years ago, very recently, 2010, we Green Acres was involved -- getting funds to the town (indiscernible). Now, it needs to be renovated. Fine, renovate it, but it's bigger. The oak trees are down. Now, we're getting more people coming.

You know, like, I don't know. I was taught how to cross a street. Look both ways. You know, these people, I don't know where they come from.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Let's wrap it up, Mr. Alessio.

MR. ALESSIO: They don't know how to cross - - or they park -- they're going to double park over there, whatever they're going to do, and it's going to be dangerous. And it's not fair to some of us - -

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I think you have a good point.

MR. ALESSIO: Figure something out --

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I think you have a good point and $I$ think we will try to get a hold of the county, Mayor.

MR. ALESSIO: It's a county park, but it's Essex County. It's a mish mash with county, nutley. It's the town's area, you should have some kind of like insight on what's going on. It's creating a detriment in plain English.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Mr. Alessio.
MR. ALESSIO: You're welcome.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to address the Board of Commissioners this evening?

MS. LANDRY: Penny Landry, 135 Lakeside Drive.

In January of 2015, I came before this Board of Commissioners and the first thing I did was thank you for your service, so I'd like to start with that again in 2018. At that time, $I$ was administrator of a page called Nutley Homeowners Community which was changed to Nutley Citizens Community. And there were approximately 350 people who followed the page in January of 2015.

We did kind of a survey to see what the citizens of Nutley would like to present to you as a couple of things they'd like to see in 2015. So the first thing I'd like to say is that -- thank you, because two of those things that were on the list happened. However, there are another 15 that have yet to happen that I'd like to read.

The two that happened since January 2015 are the citizens' request that our Nutley Board of Commissioners allow the citizens of Nutley to pay their municipal bills online on our NutleyNJ.org website. Thank you, Commissioner Evans

The other was to have on demand broadcast of the Board of Commissioners meetings on the NutleyNJ.org website. And I'm unsure of who's in charge of IT now, but thank you for making that happen, that the videos are up on the
website.

Things that have not happened that I'd like to bring before the Board of Commissioners again are have joint meetings with the Board of Ed at least twice a year. Post one town hall meeting per year for citizen input on all issues. Provide reasonably comprehensive minutes for all quasi-judicial boards and have them available no less than 72 hours prior to the next meeting. And someone asked me to add, also record and videotape the quasi-judicial boards which are the Planning and Zoning Board meetings, and also have those available through the Nutley High School and on our cable channels.

Revise our masterplan with input from citizens instead of consultants. Provide an annual report on our masterplan. Use one of our underutilized town buildings as a Nutley Youth Center, because I do care about our youth deeply and $I$ volunteer for a lot of things in our Town concerning our youth.

Enact term limits for all appointed Board members, Planning Board, Zoning Board, Library Board, Rent Levelling Board, (indiscernible). Be more transparent. Listening to feedback from the citizens and act quicker on what you learn. Commit to being even more responsible with our tax dollars by further reducing municipal spending. Use the input of citizens more. Stop hiring consultants.

Reduce taxes by eliminating redundancies and increasing accountability for municipal spending. Work with Essex County and the state to provide better transportation options for our citizens. Find ways to deal with speeding and pedestrian traffic issues. More cops with radar, traffic calming measures, raise fines, etcetera.

Next week, as the administrator of the Nutley Citizen's Community, I'm going to put it out there again as a new survey for the citizens and $I$ would like to report that the page now has 3,590 citizens in Nutley. So I look forward to bringing you the new list. Thank you.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Ms. Landry. Would anybody else like to address the Board of Commissioners this evening?

MS. QUIRK: Terry Quirk, 35 Hampton Place. Spokesperson for the Nutley Parent Advocacy Network. Just two things really quick. I just wanted to thank the police department and Commissioner Petracco in regards to the police -- the escort -- it wasn't really an escort, it was the group that helped us out on our march and we really -or our rally and we really appreciate their support at that time. That was wonderful.

And $I$ just want to say that $I$ really enjoy coming here and hearing how everybody feels in regards to security and all the different facets, and hearing how it applies to
the Board of Education, and our children, and our schools, because this is -- what $I$ hear here is really not something that I'm hearing across the street and I'm concerned about that. Because when $I$ go to meetings there, there seems to be a close knit, not speaking on that Board, and we're not really hearing from those people like we're hearing from you.

And I appreciate it. I always appreciate what people have to say. I don't have to agree with everybody, but it's important that we have a chance to speak our mind and say what we have to say, especially when it comes to something as serious as this.

> So I'm really -- I just see a lot of tension there. I know a couple of weeks ago, Mayor, you came on social media and you said, okay, everybody has to really be nice to one another because we all live in the same town and I understand that, and I respect that, because I live by the Shop Rite, which you know, I meet people in Shop Rite so I have to be nice. I always have to watch what $I$ say.

But the truth of the matter is it is important to respect one another and respect people's feelings, and to know also that the people that are involved in trying to get their ideas across really are based in fear. Their feelings -- they're just as fearful as the other group who wants to have -- there's one group that wants armed security in and
they really want to be proactive on that; and then there's another group that doesn't. And they are just as fearful as the group that -- if you really look at both sides, they're very similar.

So the problem that we're having now is that we're really not hearing from the Board of Education. And $I$ know -- it sounds like I'm tattling, because I will share this with them, but when I came here last time and I was able to hear what you had to say, and $I$ was able to poll you and to say hey, how do you feel about that? That's not the experience $I$ had over there. And it's disheartening, okay?

And I just wanted to share that and thank you for venting, okay? Thank you. Bye bye.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Ms. Quirk. I don't know if $I$ said be nice to each other, but what $I$ did say was to respect each other's opinions. And you know, not to get where you're calling names to each other. I think it's important.

Because as you said, we all want the best for our children, no matter which side of the fence we're on. So would anybody else like to address the Board of Commissioners this evening?

MR. MELILLO: Brett Melillo, 225 Prospect Street. would like to petition for (indiscernible) for a stop sign at Race and Prospect Street where (indiscernible) schools
(indiscernible).

MAYOR SCARPELLI: On Prospect or on -- I mean, there is a stop sign on Race, I believe.

MR. MELILLO: On Prospect.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: On Prospect.

MR. MELILLO: Right. Yeah, we're
recently new to the area, but during the time we've been here, we've had family members come back, park on the street, and almost get hit by cars driving by. My brother-in-law is a detective and my (indiscernible).

MAYOR SCARPELLI: I know Mr. -- Police Officer O'Halloran has been looking at that.

MR. MELILLO: Yes, he has.
MAYOR SCARPELLI: And he's been in contact with engineering and we've actually sent, you know, the results of his traffic study to Pennoni, who are our engineers. But I don't think a four-way stop was contemplated there, but we certainly could pass it on to our engineers to have them look at that based on Officer O'Halloran's study. MR. MELILLO: Right. And I do appreciate that because (indiscernible) speed survey. But again, I think that that (indiscernible) but again, looking at the traffic that comes down that street, it's still a dangerous --

MAYOR SCARPELLI: There's a lot of information
that's generated besides speed from those traffic studies. So Commissioner, do you have anything?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yeah, it's how many cars are passing through. But $I$ have to tell you, I'm a fan of four-way stop signs. I am, and anything to slow down the traffic today. Because, you know, as people are saying, you know, we are growing a little bit here and we have a lot of visitors to our community as well.

So I will reach out to Joe O'Halloran and see what his findings are and what -- I guess we'll work through this together as far as the process with the engineer and what could be done. But $I$ could say that if there's something that could be done, $I$ think the mayor and $I$ are on the same page.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Yeah, there's three E's, right? There's enforcement, engineering, and education. And those are the three things that we can work together to provide.

I grew up in that neighborhood. And when I grew up there, there wasn't a traffic light on Prospect and Center, you know?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right.
MAYOR SCARPELLI: And there some accidents there and $I$ think at least one or two fatalities there, which precipitated the traffic light being installed. So unfortunately, $I$ can remember back before the traffic light
which is --
COMMISSIONER ROGERS: You were there when the horse and buggies came down Prospect Street.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: But, you know, so that was one change that was made over time because of safety concerns. So we'll certainly look at what else can be done.

MR. MELILLO: Sure. Appreciate that. Is there someone I can follow up with you?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yeah. You know what, this is my assistant at the Town, you could exchange numbers and we'll get right on it.

MR. MELILLO: Thank you very much.
MAYOR SCARPELLI: You're welcome. Would anybody else like to address the Board of Commissioners this evening?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Move to adjourn.

MADAM CLERK: I need a second.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah, just before we adjourn, I missed my announcement earlier. I just --

MAYOR SCARPELLI: You lost it. The agenda is over. You lost it.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: I know. It's a problem. It's a problem. Real quick, April is dog and cat license registration month and just a reminder that the letters have been issued to current pet owners regarding renewal of their
license. It's up on the website to remind people who are new with an animal in town, and that the Clerk's office is going to be open late on April 18th, 19th, and 26 th to handle the extra volume. Thank you.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Commissioner. Does anybody else have any announcements?

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Move to adjourn.
COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Second.
MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?
COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.
MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?
COMMISSIONER EVANS: One more thing -- aye.
MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?
COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.
MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?
MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.
MADAM CLERK: And the time is 8:21.
MAYOR SCARPELLI: Take care everybody. (Meeting was adjourned)


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
