2 MADAM CLERK: Board of Commissioners public
3 meeting, Tuesday, April 3rd, 2018. The time is 7:05.
4 Pursuant to the requirements of the Open Public Meeting Act
5 (Chapter 231, Public Law 1975), notice of this meeting was
6 published in the December 14th, 2017 issues of The Nutley
7 Sun, the Herald News, and the Star Ledger. A copy of this
8 notice has been posted on the Nutley Town Hall bulletin
9 board and a copy is on file in the Municipal Clerk's Office.

10 Commissioner Rogers is going to join us in a
11 little while. Commissioner Tucci is absent/excused.

12 Commissioner Evans?

13 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Here.

14 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

15 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Here.

16 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

17 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Here.

18 MADAM CLERK: All present, Mayor, except for
19 Commissioner Tucci and Commissioner Rogers is going to join
20 us in a little while.

21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Petracco, what do
22 you have on the agenda tonight?

23 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Let's see. I have an
24 ordinance introduction for May 1st will the public hearing.
25 This is for handicapped parking. Then I have a public

1 hearing to change our TO, I believe that's what that is for.
2 And then I have a couple of resolutions, authorize
3 submission of strategic plan for the Nutley Municipal
4 Alliance grant for fiscal year 2019.

5 Supporting the 2018 UDrive, UText, UPay,
6 distracted driving crackdown, which I urge everybody to be
7 very aware. Very good, aware that they're out there. Last
8 year on Center Street we wrote 68 tickets in one day for
9 pedestrian crossing if you recall.

10 I see that we have the appointment of Adriana
11 Russo as interim administrator of the Court. Why is it
12 interim?

13 MADAM CLERK: It's for another two years until she
14 gets her certification.

15 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: This says one year term.

16 MADAM CLERK: It's one year. So she -- one year
17 and then one more year. She gets a total of three years.

18 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Thank you. Okay. I
19 thought she was already in. And then I see the reject all
20 the towing service bids. That needs to be done.

21 MADAM CLERK: It absolutely needs to be
22 done.

23 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And that's all I have.

24 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Evans?

25 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I have -- for tonight, I just

1 -- I have five resolutions. Three relate to the temporary
2 budget. Since we haven't been able to have yet the public
3 hearing or been able to adopt, we have to -- under statute,
4 we actually work under a temporary authorization until we
5 get final approvals. So it's three resolutions related to
6 that in and of itself. So the operating budgets, and bond
7 interest and water utility.

8 And then I have a resolution for DRS Imaging which
9 we set aside funds to begin scanning the records of the Code
10 Enforcement Department which we have to maintain permanently
11 under state statute. So we're awarding a contract to DRS
12 Imaging, who's part of the Union County Cooperative
13 Purchasing System.

14 And then I have one resolution for tax
15 overcharges.

16 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Very good. Commissioner, I'll
17 give you a couple of seconds to get settled, but --

18 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Thank you.

19 MAYOR SCARPELLI: I have an award of a fair and
20 open contract to AJM Contractors, that's for CDBG Roadway
21 that's a grant and it will be Princeton Street, Hunt Place,
22 and Bayard Street.

23 And then I'll authorize and approve for a raffle
24 for the HSA Fairview of Bloomfield. That's all I have.
25 Commissioner?

1 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Okay. Mayor, I have three
2 resolutions. One to declare April 2018 as oral cancer
3 awareness month. Another one to recognize April as national
4 donate life month. And then recognize April 2nd through the
5 8th as national public health week. That's all.

6 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thanks, Commissioner. Madam
7 Clerk?

8 MADAM CLERK: We just have an application for the
9 99th annual Memorial Day parade, which will be on Monday,
10 May 28th from 10:00 to 1:00 p.m. And we have regular
11 minutes for February 6th. And that's it.

12 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Just a reminder that next year
13 will be the 100th Memorial Day parade. So I don't know if
14 anybody else has -- in the country as 100 Memorial Day
15 parade, but that's a long time to be doing a Memorial Day
16 parade.

17 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: We should try to get some
18 photos of some of the ones from -- that are really old. I
19 wonder if we could find some of them. Tommy, you're in
20 charge of that.

21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: I actually think there's a video
22 online from -- there's a video online from like the '60s or

10 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

11 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

12 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

13 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

14 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

15 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

16 Communications?

17 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Joseph P. Scarpelli has
18 submitted an event application to hold the 99th Annual
19 Memorial Day Parade on Monday, May 28th, 2018 from 10:00 AM
20 to 1:00 PM starting at the Nutley Park Oval.

21 MAYOR SCARPELLI: I'll move it.

22 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

23 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

24 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

25 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

1 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

2 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

4 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

5 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

6 MADAM CLERK: And that's it for communications.

7 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Bills?

8 MADAM CLERK: Bill list for April 3, 2018. Public
9 affairs, \$109,384.99; Revenue & finance, \$3,449,235.96;
10 Public safety, \$465,979.23; Public works, \$56,761.72; Parks
11 and public property, \$56,449.53. Water utility,
12 \$124,464.27. Total payroll \$843,796.04. For a grand total
13 of \$5,106,071.74.

14 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Move the bills.

15 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Second.

16 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

17 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

18 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

19 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

20 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

21 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

22 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

23 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

24 MADAM CLERK: And that's it for bills, Mayor.

25 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Public comment on agenda items

1 only. Madam Clerk.

2 MADAM CLERK: All persons addressing the Board of
3 Commissioners regarding community concerns should approach
4 the microphone and provide their name and address for the
5 record. Unless further time is granted by the Board, each
6 person shall limit their address to three minutes. All
7 remarks to the Board and its individual members must be
8 addressed to the Mayor. The Mayor may defer citizens'
9 comments to the appropriate member of the Board. Dialogue
10 between citizens and others addressing the Board shall be
11 allowed unless the Mayor or presiding officer, or the
12 majority of the membership of the Board, shall determine
13 that the interest of decorum and/or the expeditious conduct
14 of municipal business are being adversely affected by such
15 dialogue.

16 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody like to address
17 the Board of Commissioners on agenda items only?

18 MR. MOORE: Rory Moore, 462 Chestnut Street.

19 Mr. Scarpelli, I have three questions. I'm not
20 sure if you can answer the first one. It's under Mr. Tucci.
21 Princeton posting Solutions, what is that? Do you
22 know? Do we have --

23 MAYOR SCARPELLI: I cannot answer that, Mr. Moore.

24 MR. MOORE: (Indiscernible). One question on the
25 back, could you make the distinction to me on your overtime

1 list between work operations. Is that separate
2 from public works?

3 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Well, it's paid out of a
4 separate payable account. It's paid out of the water
5 utility.

6 MR. MOORE: Are they separate employees? That's
7 what I'm trying to find out. Is that a separate --

8 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Well, they're all public works
9 employees, but some are paid out of --

10 MR. MOORE: But that I understand and the water is
11 being paid out of a separate account.

12 MAYOR SCARPELLI: It's paid out of the water
13 utility, correct.

14 MR. MOORE: But are those employees, are they
15 separate? Is it one department versus the other one or are
16 they all the same --

17 MAYOR SCARPELLI: For the most part, yes.

18 MR. MOORE: It's all the same department?

19 MAYOR SCARPELLI: It's all the public works
20 department. This is the water utility. They get paid out
21 of the water utility. And it is the public works department
22 paid out of the budget of the public works. But they're all
23 Department of Public Works employees.

24 MR. MOORE: Okay. Thank you. And one last
25 question, Mr. Petracco, your -- 87-18, can I get a copy of

1 that?

2 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Can you get what?

3 MR. MOORE: It's an authorization. You just have
4 it down -- listed as a line item here. I'd really like to
5 see that.

6 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: On the bill list?

7 MR. MOORE: No, it's on the -- on your agenda
8 items under you -- 87-18, first page at the bottom.
9 Authorization for strategic plan for the Nutley Municipal
10 Alliance grant.

11 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Can you get a copy of
12 that?

13 MR. MOORE: Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Sure.

15 MR. MOORE: Thanks a lot.

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: You're welcome.

17 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to
18 address the Board of Commissioners on agenda items only?

19 Seeing none, let's move on to the Board of
20 Commissioner announcements. Any announcements,
21 Commissioners? Good.

22 Ordinance introductions. Commissioner Petracco?

23 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yes, thank you.

24 I have ordinance number 3381, an ordinance to
25 amend -- let's see this -- no.

1 Ordinance number 3383, an ordinance to amend an
2 ordinance codified in the Code of the Township of Nutley,
3 Chapter 228, entitled vehicles and traffic, particularly
4 Article VII (special zones and areas), Section 29A entitled
5 handicapped parking to add to the locations set forth.

6 I move that this ordinance be passed to a second
7 reading and advertised in the Nutley Sun, together with
8 notice required by law and that further consideration of
9 said ordinance for final passage by the Board of
10 Commissioners to be held at its second reading -- what is --
11 what was the second reading?

12 MADAM CLERK: May 1st.

13 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: What is it?

14 MADAM CLERK: May 1st.

15 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: May 1st, 2018.

16 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Second.

17 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

18 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

19 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

20 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

21 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

22 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

23 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

24 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

25 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Public hearings. Commissioner

1 Petracco?

2 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yes. I have ordinance
3 number 3381. An ordinance to amend an ordinance codified in
4 the Township of Nutley Code, Chapter 131, entitled
5 establishment and organization of the police department.

6 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody like to be heard
7 on ordinance number 3381?

8 MR. MOORE: Rory Moore, 462 Chestnut Street.

9 Mr. Petracco, this ordinance I believe you're
10 adding one lieutenant, is that correct?

11 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: We are.

12 MR. MOORE: And the lieutenant that you're adding,
13 will they be promoted from the 13 sergeants you have or do
14 you have -- is there a particular way to promote to a
15 lieutenant?

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: It's all through civil
17 service and whoever scored the highest on the test and who's
18 number one, two, or three on that list.

19 MR. MOORE: But that would be from the sergeants
20 list, I --

21 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: From the sergeants list,
22 yes.

23 MR. MOORE: And how -- do you know how current
24 that one is?

25 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I don't know how current

1 it is.

2 MR. MOORE: I believe it has to be two years, I'm
3 not sure.

4 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Uh-huh.

5 MR. MOORE: So we can assume that this lieutenant
6 that's going to be hired here will be hired from the
7 sergeants -- all the sergeants.

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: That's the only place they
9 can get hired off of.

10 MR. MOORE: And what is the reason we're adding
11 one more --

12 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, I think that with
13 everything that has happened with the schools, you know, and
14 what's going on in the country, that cyber -- a cyber unit
15 is what we're trying to create to scrub through computers
16 and instead of being reactive, be proactive.

17 And my goal right now is to add that position,
18 have a lieutenant be in charge of it. This way before we
19 have an active shooter or anything else with events and
20 traffic leading up to some type of event, that we can be
21 proactive and take a proactive approach to make sure that
22 there's not any cyber threats out there.

23 And not that it's a cure-all, Rory, because it's
24 not because things do pass through. But it's just another
25 layer to prevent something from happening, especially when

1 it comes to the schools.

2 MR. MOORE: So is this lieutenant going to be
3 computer-bound, technically?

4 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, I think they're
5 going to -- I don't like to say exactly what their role is
6 going to be for multiple safety reasons. However, everybody
7 at the Nutley Police Department and Fire Department, no
8 matter what their title is or their rank, we multitask
9 there.

10 So will they be sitting in front of a computer all
11 day? I'd like to see that be their specific job and they
12 would be in charge of that team that they're surrounding
13 themselves with.

14 MR. MOORE: Because I called the State Police, the
15 New Jersey State Police.

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I met with them and
17 Commissioner Evans.

18 MR. MOORE: They remembered you. And I did call
19 Homeland Security because I was curious that you say that
20 you want to have this surveillance, for lack of a better
21 word.

22 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right.

23 MR. MOORE: And that somebody sitting in front of
24 a computer is not going to catch them. The way it's usually
25 done is through algorithm through (indiscernible), Facebook,

1 Instagram, somebody else. It's usually run through a
2 computer. That's how you catch them.

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, that's exactly what
4 I'm talking about.

5 MR. MOORE: Because here --

6 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Where's the disconnect?
7 Where's the disconnect between you and I on that because
8 that's exactly what I --

9 MR. MOORE: Because it says SRO officer here and
10 you know in the ordinance. That's what confused me about it
11 because if you're going to have somebody -- you've already
12 purchased the feeds and you've already written the
13 algorithms. That's what's going to catch everybody.

14 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And that's the whole
15 purpose of this, Rory. So I would have to look to see
16 exactly what --

17 MR. MOORE: It says SRO in here.

18 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right.

19 MR. MOORE: And I'm --

20 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, that's a special
21 resource officer. So that's not exactly --

22 MR. MOORE: Well, according to the State Police,
23 an SRO is a physical officer that goes into the schools.

24 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Hired through the police
25 department.

1 MR. MOORE: But that -- their thing was they go
2 into the school, SROs.

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right.

4 MR. MOORE: And the other distinction is that if
5 you're going to use the algorithm to find it, which is what
6 everybody else is using, it's totally separate. And that's
7 what I was trying to understand. Because you said that last
8 time that you wanted to use a computer to catch them.
9 But you don't use an SRO to do that.

10 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right.

11 MR. MOORE: That's a distinction I was trying to
12 make.

13 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I understand.

14 MR. MOORE: So will we be having a cyber security
15 team? Is that where this is going to go?

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: That's the goal that --
17 what I want to do. Like I said, you know, from the last
18 threat and we had a couple threats in Nutley, you know,
19 obviously it was kind of a learning process for me at that
20 time. But after meeting with Homeland Security and the
21 State Police as well, you know, those agencies are great and
22 they have all the resources after something happens. So
23 what I'm trying to do is to put a team together that we can
24 prevent something from happening.

25 So it's not -- as far as the reaction and to

1 respond to something like that, I know we have all the
2 tools. We have the SU team in Nutley that are second to
3 none. They have the best outfits as far -- they're best
4 outfitted with equipment and everything. We have the
5 Homeland Security that would respond. But that's always
6 after the fact.

7 And what I've learned through the State Police
8 division too is they do monitor these computers and, you
9 know, they do the best they can. But they also said to us
10 don't just count on us, you have to take a proactive
11 approach locally with your local police department in order
12 to make sure that you're on top of it as well.

13 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: And may I follow up on that?

14 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Sure.

15 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Rory, one of the failures
16 that we have found nationally with a lot of these incidents
17 around the country is the lack of sharing information and
18 intelligence on a local level. The FBI, the national
19 security agencies do a good job on sharing that
20 information.

21 In this case, and the Commissioner and I have
22 talked about this at length, you'll get information here now
23 in Nutley that will go into a computer bank, a data bank,
24 and that information is going to be shared with multiple,
25 multiple agencies. That's the output.

1 The input, other police agencies that have
2 information on a local level will be able to share that with
3 us. So I think it was a -- not I think, I know it is a very
4 good step forward in being proactive. And this is the
5 result of a lot of what we've seen around the country
6 because as the Commissioner said, there's great reactive
7 responses to incidents but we find that there were a lot of
8 red flags around the country that weren't picked up because
9 of the failure to collect and share information.

10 So that's basically what I believe Commissioner
11 you're really zeroing in on.

12 MR. MOORE: And it's -- now, you said you're going
13 to build a team. On here, you're building one lieutenant.
14 How many sergeants will follow the lieutenant? How many
15 patrolmen will be assigned to this?

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, that's --

17 MR. MOORE: Because I'm sure this is an infant
18 stage.

19 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, first of all, I just
20 looked through here also and I seen that where it says your
21 SRO is -- and also the PYO. You know, this is just an
22 outline of the way the police department is. That doesn't
23 say in no means that we can't create another division of the
24 police department. You know, and that doesn't say that --
25 that would be part of our investigation bureau, which is

1 already in place. So it would be another leg of it.

2 So don't get confused with the SRO because that
3 has nothing to do with what I want to accomplish by adding
4 this lieutenants position.

5 MR. MOORE: I'm not confused --

6 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: And as far -- no, I see
7 what it says in here, but I'm just saying that's kind of
8 standard language of the table of organization in the police
9 department. However, what -- again, what we're trying to
10 create, Rory, is to be proactive. You know, not to have
11 these threats or when we get these threats that we're not
12 responding to there is an active shooter. As far as
13 manpower and who's going to go where, as you know, the chief
14 runs the day to day operations. So this is a policy that
15 I'm putting in effect and I've been talking to the chief and
16 saying this is the direction we want to go in.

17 Can I tell you, you know, that in the 68 man
18 police department we're going to have 10 people in here?
19 No. We're definitely going to pursue this, you know, and
20 we're going to try to utilize the people that we have, you
21 know, and like I said multi-tasking.

22 We don't have the luxury in the Nutley Police
23 Department to have anybody sit in front of a computer from
24 you know, whatever their shift is to the end of their shift.
25 Because, as you know, we sometimes only have five patrolmen

1 on the road, you know, between sick time, vacation time, you
2 know, and all that other stuff. We battle it.

3 You know, and I don't want to get into the
4 domestic violence, how that ties up four officers, you know
5 two officers for almost eight hours of their shift. I don't
6 want to get into the bail reform today that myself and the
7 Mayor sat through of how that's hindering the police
8 department.

9 But I can say this, is that what the idea of this
10 is is to prevent things from not only happening at the
11 schools, but happening at our events, and to gather
12 intelligence. You know, that's exactly what this ordinance
13 is for.

14 You're very welcome.

15 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to be
16 heard on ordinance number 3381?

17 MS. LANDRY: Penny Landry, 135 Lakeside Drive.

18 On 3381, (indiscernible) as I recall when the
19 ordinance or resolution was passed providing the police with
20 a three percent raise over the two percent state cap, I do
21 recall it being said that part of the negotiations of that
22 was that we would keep our organizational structure the
23 same. And now I see that we're adding another person. So
24 I'm unsure of what happened to that part of it where we --

25 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I don't recall ever saying

1 that --

2 MS. LANDRY: And so I'd like to finish --

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: -- but I'm sure that you
4 might be able to pull that --

5 MS. LANDRY: I'd like to finish.

6 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, I'd like to answer
7 that first leg of the question.

8 MS. LANDRY: Well, I would like to finish because
9 if --

10 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: So I don't ever remember
11 saying that, number one --

12 MS. LANDRY: (Indiscernible) --

13 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: -- but if I did --

14 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Ms. Landry, let the Commissioner
15 address --

16 MS. LANDRY: So I didn't ask a question.

17 MAYOR SCARPELLI: -- the one thing.

18 MS. LANDRY: I didn't ask a question. I'd like to
19 finish. This is a hearing on an ordinance and I'd like to
20 finish.

21 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I was just answering --

22 MS. LANDRY: Thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: -- your statement.

24 MS. LANDRY: Thank you.

25 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: You're very welcome, Ms.

1 Landry.

2 MS. LANDRY: As I understand it, the Board is
3 doing an investigation as to how to deal with school
4 security. Part of this investigation involves how they will
5 handle the enhanced security at each school. They have met
6 with the State Police, Homeland Security, etcetera.

7 Given that -- what you have said, that part of
8 this new position given that currently have over \$1.6
9 million increase in our potential tax levy, I am
10 respectfully asking your Commissioners that you postpone
11 voting on this ordinance to add another high paying position
12 to our police department until the Board of Ed completes
13 their investigation, and that you do this -- if a person
14 needs to be hired, because you said you want to do a team
15 and this is all kind of not totally decided yet, that
16 instead of voting tonight on this ordinance that you
17 collaborate with the Board of Ed with their study and their
18 research and wait until that data comes back. And then
19 decide what is the best thing to do with our police
20 organizational structure as it relates to the study being
21 done by the Board of Ed.

22 Thank you.

23 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Ms. Landry. Would
24 anybody else like to be heard on ordinance number 3381?
25 Seeing none.

1 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Move to close.

2 COMMISSIONER ROGRS: Second.

3 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

4 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

5 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

6 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

7 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

9 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

10 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

11 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I move the ordinance.

12 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: I second.

13 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

14 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: I vote yes and I just want
15 to make something clear. You know, we could delay and delay
16 and delay when it comes to public safety, and every single
17 time a law enforcement agency or community delays, some
18 tragedy happens and there is this hue and cry to
19 speed up the process.

20 This Commissioner sitting next to me has probably
21 lost more sleep over the incidents that have happened around
22 this country. We've been on the phone 2 o'clock in the
23 morning. And my colleagues also have been involved in this.
24 Beating our brains out, trying to find a way, any way, to
25 help prevent a tragedy like we've seen around the country

1 here in Nutley.

2 These decisions are not easy. These are complex
3 issues. And my point is this, ladies and gentlemen, is that
4 what is the intent here? Is the intent to just hire a guy
5 to expand the table of organization or is it to give maximum
6 protection to the best of our ability? That's the intent
7 here.

8 I was a police officer here 38 years. Chief John
9 Holland (ph) and I used to drive around town. And do you
10 know what we used to say to ourselves? How on earth did
11 communities around us throughout New Jersey go to hell in a
12 hand basket? How did that happen?

13 It happened when local governments decided to cut
14 back on public safety. That was the first stage. It
15 happened when they decided to, yes, pour millions of dollars
16 into be reactive, but not much money into being proactive.
17 When we were proactive, we had community policing. We had
18 cops in the schools. And do you know what those proactive
19 programs did, brought us a tremendous amount of intelligence
20 and information about the drug problem.

21 But this is much worse. This is much worse. So I
22 support this purely on the basis that it's needed. And I
23 did research. Do you know what the research is I did,
24 folks? I watched Fox and CNN and then I watched all the
25 bloodshed around this country and I just don't want to see

1 it happen here.

2 We may not succeed, but what do you always say to
3 me? At least we can put our heads on the pillows at night
4 and maybe 15 years from now when all of us are retired and
5 gone we can say we did the best we could. So I vote yes.

6 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

7 COMMISSIONER EVANS: 15 years and I probably won't
8 be that old to be gone, but I understand the point.

9 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: (Indiscernible), right, in
10 my memoirs.

11 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I agree with you. I'll be
12 under a palm tree but I won't be under under the palm tree.
13 Just a point.

14 Before I vote, and Commissioner Petracco, it's my
15 understanding that yes, that Homeland Security is going to
16 do a review of all seven schools in Nutley, right? I know
17 you were -- you met with --

18 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: They actually just -- not
19 to interrupt you, but they actually came back and said right
20 now they're only able to do two. So we're working with the
21 Board of Ed and the police department to see how we're going
22 to -- and it's a Board of Ed issue, but we're seeing what we
23 could do to help out as well.

24 COMMISSIONER EVANS: My -- and my understanding is
25 that they're going to cover all five but there's a staging

1 to that, right?

2 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Hopefully.

3 COMMISSIONER EVANS: From what I understood. I
4 also understood is like if you look at the Parkland
5 incident, right, that individual that rose to the point
6 where they brought a gun to the school, basically, there
7 were 30 calls to the local police department for that as
8 well as four calls to the FBI around that and nobody took
9 any action, right?

10 First off, here in Nutley, one person raised a
11 question about a video that seemed to suggest something
12 negative and Nutley Police Department responded and took
13 action. So one of the things that is very clear is that
14 prevention, right, and response is critical to avoiding a
15 major incident.

16 And there has been incidents around the country
17 where you've had armed officers on campus and those where
18 not on campus. So what's also important to understand is
19 that simply putting a gun on -- in the school isn't going to
20 stop any threat because it's a -- it's actually about having
21 an integrated layer, in effect a net at multiple levels.

22 The last thing that I understand about this is
23 that you did meet with a State Police from the Homeland
24 Security Department to discuss how this is established at a
25 local level, right, and understanding how this fits into a

1 local network in place to actually do early identification
2 which leads to -- what we all want to avoid is an event
3 where someone could lose their life.

4 So not only do I believe we should vote on this, I
5 think it's critical that we vote on this so that we can look
6 at and look at ourselves in the mirror and say we know we're
7 taking every action possible to protect not just our
8 children in the school, but to protect the residents of
9 Nutley and how critical that is.

10 That's my understanding and that's why I vote yes.

11 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Thank you.

12 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

13 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I vote yes. And I also
14 just wanted to a make a statement too. You know, sitting up
15 here as the public safety director for -- I guess it's
16 almost 11 years now, right? So you know, although we watch
17 these budgets and we are sympathetic to the taxpayer, as
18 long as I sit here, I will -- I think my job, solely, is to
19 ensure the safety of all the residents and especially our
20 children.

21 And others make it known that I will never, ever
22 spare any expense to keep our children safe in these
23 schools. And I think that this specific position and what
24 we're trying to accomplish is critical.

25 And like Commissioner Rogers said, and

1 Commissioner Evans echoed, is that you know, God forbid if
2 something happens while we're sitting here. And I'll just
3 be very clear, when I'm sitting under that palm tree someday
4 with you guys, you know, and God forbid if something happens
5 in Nutley, I won't have one regret saying that I should have
6 did this or I should have done that when it comes to any
7 safety in the Township of Nutley.

8 So again, I vote yes. Thank you.

9 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

10 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

11 Commissioner Rogers, resolutions?

6 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

7 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

11 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: And resolution 94-18.

12 Recognizing April 2nd through April 8th as National Public
13 Health week. Healthiest Nation 2030: Changing Our Future
14 Together. So moved.

17 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

21 Using an electronic scanning capability improves
22 our retrieval ability, but also we just don't have the
23 capacity to store the amount of documents that are involved
24 here. So moved.

13 the 21st, 2018.

14 Whereas, distracted driving is a serious, life-
15 threatening practice that is preventable; and

16 Whereas, distracted driving can result in injuries
17 and deaths to all road users; and

18 Whereas, distracted driving occurs when drivers
19 divert their attention away from the task of driving to
20 focus on another activity instead; and

21 Whereas, in 2015 alone distracted driving-related
22 crashes resulted in 3,477 deaths and 391,000 injuries on our
23 nation's roads; and

24 Whereas, in New Jersey distracted driving was
25 listed as a contributing circumstance in nearly 750,000

1 crashes between 2011-2015; and

2 Whereas, the State of New Jersey will participate
3 in the nationwide Distracted Driving 2018 Crackdown from
4 April 1st through the 21st, 2018 in an effort to raise
5 awareness and decrease driver distraction through a
6 combination of enforcement and education; and

7 Whereas, the national slogan for the campaign is
8 UDrive. UText. UPay; and

9 Whereas, a reduction in distracted driving in New
10 Jersey will save lives on our roadways;

11 Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of
12 Commissioners, the Township of Nutley declares its support
13 for the Distracted Driving 2018 Crackdown both locally and
14 nationally from April 1st through 21st, 2018 and pledges to
15 increase awareness of the dangers of distracted driving.

16 And I'd just like -- before I move this, I'd just
17 like to thank Mr. Kelly in the back for all of the work that
18 you do with the kids on this stuff. Give him a round of
19 applause.

20 I know I visited Nutley High School not too long
21 ago and it really is a big problem. I know that last time
22 when we did this on Center Street, I believe the number -- I
23 don't want to say exactly what the number is in case I'm
24 wrong and I get called out on it, but I want to say that in
25 one day -- in one day, we wrote 68 pedestrian tickets for

1 crosswalks on Center Street alone.

2 So I urge everybody, the Mayor said in the back be
3 aware that the cops will be out there. We'll have county
4 cops there also. They will be issuing tickets. If you
5 mention my name, it's probably not going to get you out of
6 it.

7 So please, they are instructed to write tickets
8 for those infractions. It's a big problem in Nutley. It's
9 one of the biggest complaints we get is the pedestrian
10 crossing and the speeding in Town. And it's either my son
11 or daughter got a ticket or my wife/husband whatever got a
12 ticket because they were speeding or they didn't get a
13 ticket and somebody else was speeding or in a crosswalk.

14 So please know that they're going to be out there.
15 It's really a problem in the state, the country with texting
16 on your phone and all this distracted driver. I remember
17 reading this resolution that the distracting driver with
18 cellphones has surpassed the drunken driving that's in our
19 country. So it's a big problem. Please be aware these next
20 couple weeks. And please practice it. Show some courtesy
21 to your Nutley residents when they are in a crosswalk. That
22 would be great.

19 Contractors not to exceed \$235,674.30 and that the Mayor and
20 Township Clerk are hereby authorized to enter into and sign
21 said contract for the Township of Nutley. I move the
22 resolution.

23 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Second.

24 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

25 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

1 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

2 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

3 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

4 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

5 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

6 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

7 Whereas, raffle applications have been received
8 from the following organizations;

9 HSA Fairview of Bloomfield, License No. 16-18, On-
10 Premise 50/50 Cash Raffle; and

11 License No. 17-18, On-Premise Merchandise Raffle
12 to be held Friday, May 4th, 2018; and

13 Whereas, the applications have been reviewed and
14 approved by the Municipal Clerk and the Police Department;

15 Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of
16 Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, County of Essex,
17 State of New Jersey that the aforementioned licenses are
18 approved and the Municipal Clerk is authorized to issue the
19 raffle licenses.

20 I move the resolution.

21 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Second.

22 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

23 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

24 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

25 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

1 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

2 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

3 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

4 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

5 That concludes the business portion of our
6 meeting. Madam Clerk?

7 MADAM CLERK: Yes, Mayor.

8 All persons addressing the Board of Commissioners
9 regarding community concerns should approach the microphone
10 and provide their name and address for the record. Unless
11 further time is granted by the Board, each person shall
12 limit their address to three minutes. All remarks to the
13 Board and its individual members must be addressed to the
14 Mayor. The Mayor may defer citizens' comments to the
15 appropriate member of the board. Dialogue between citizens
16 and others addressing the Board shall be allowed unless the
17 Mayor or presiding officer, or the majority of the
18 membership of the Board, shall determine that the interest
19 of decorum and/or the expeditious conduct of municipal
20 business are being adversely affected by such dialogue.

21 MR. MOORE: Rory Moore, 462 Chestnut Street.

22 Mr. Rogers -- I would like to address Mr. Rogers'
23 comments before. I was very, very -- I was offended by
24 really what you said because you always wait until everybody
25 sits down rather than have a dialogue. But Ms. Penny and I,

1 separately, researched this extensively. We called the Board
2 of Ed. I spoke to Ms. Glazer. I know pretty much what
3 they're doing and what their (indiscernible) process was.

4 For you to sit here and denigrate people for
5 standing up, I read this for the State Police. It's an SRO.
6 It's a school resource officer. That's all it is. You've
7 hired a lieutenant. When I called Homeland Security, they
8 said it was a school resource officer. Everything that Mr.
9 Petracco said he wanted to have is computer (indiscernible).
10 It's an algorithm in computer, computer feed, that's all it
11 is. You could have it up and running in less than an hour,
12 and you could find everything out you need to know.

13 (Indiscernible) that people come up here and just
14 say we don't want another lieutenant. We don't need another
15 lieutenant for this. You need a computer and a geek that
16 knows how to use it, and they run it every hour so we know
17 what's going on. And yes, maybe they'll become part of the
18 network where you're going to share information, but that's
19 not what this ordinance said.

20 This ordinance hired a lieutenant. If he's going
21 to be hired from the 13 that exists right now, which one has
22 a computer degree? So you're going to put somebody sitting
23 in front of a computer reading it and you think you're going
24 to capture somebody? It doesn't work that way.

25 So people over here that do stand up and say what

1 about this and ask questions, don't think for one minute
2 that this wasn't researched. And don't think it's easy to
3 stand up here and say we're questioning the safety of the
4 children. Where did you ever dream of this? My kids went
5 to these schools. I coached these -- the children here.
6 You think that we want to say cheaply, don't hire a
7 lieutenant.

8 Get a computer. Hire a geek like
9 everybody else does. Homeland Security, they'd have it up
10 in 30 minutes and then you could start to find it. You
11 don't need a lieutenant to do that.

12 Thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I'd like to comment, if I
14 may.

15 So, Rory, that's really -- I met with Homeland
16 Security and I met with the cyber unit of the State Police
17 and it's not just about hiring a lieutenant or a geek to
18 stay there in the police department and in a half hour you
19 have these feeds and all that stuff. It's a lot more
20 complicated than that.

21 As far as what the Board of Ed is doing, that's
22 what the Board of Ed does. And I know you know this.
23 Public safety is a -- in this town, is a completely
24 different entity of what the Board of Ed does. If I was in
25 charge of the Board of Ed, I may want to do something

1 different than they're doing or vice versa. But you know,
2 opinions -- everybody has an opinion. You're entitled to
3 yours. But an SRO is not what I'm looking to put in there.
4 And this person would be doing a lot of different things as
5 far as intelligence, working with the schools. If they do
6 put some kind of security in the schools, you know,
7 intelligence is the biggest thing.

8 So I don't want you to think that the only thing
9 that this person is going to be doing, or this team is
10 created to do is to stand in a front of a computer because
11 that's not the case. And I know that there's services out
12 there that you can hire and I think that's what you're
13 talking about to come up with threats and all that stuff.

14 But after meeting with Homeland Security and the
15 State Police, it's really downplaying it that it's -- you
16 know, every half hour you get something. That's just not
17 true.

18 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to
19 address the Board of Commissioners this evening?

20 MR. ALESSIO: Carmine Alessio, 81 E. Center Street.
21 (Indiscernible). I don't feel like partying tonight.

22 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Okay. Say your piece.

23 MR. ALESSIO: You were talking about distracted
24 drivers.

25 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I was.

1 MR. ALESSIO: Before on Center Street. So you
2 know, I said -- I've got to get my wheels going here and
3 maybe I can make someone see the light.

4 Now, people do text and do that type of activity
5 but think about the reverse case scenario when someone just
6 trying to use the street, go up Center Street, facilitate
7 the bank, you know get around Town like I try to do. And
8 what's going on is I think we're overdeveloping where all
9 these apartments and all these people.

10 Now, you talked about Center Street how tickets
11 were being issued because of bad activities. But if you
12 think of the flip side of it, like me going up the street
13 and the park -- Mr. Tucci is not here. I wish -- somebody
14 is always missing when I want to confront like my opinion.
15 But you're going up Center Street and now they've renovated
16 the little kiddie park to where it's bigger. It's called
17 Frank Cocchiola park, now it's Yanticaw Park. And there's no
18 on-site parking. There's just off -- on-street parking.

19 Now, I just like (indiscernible)). I got out of my
20 vehicle and I looked around. And I saw that the beautiful
21 oak trees had been taken down. That's one point that I'd
22 like to make. I pretty much know for a fact the park is
23 larger. And on a March day, you figure during the day,
24 there wouldn't be any cars on the street, but it's like a
25 domino effect.

1 We have Chase Bank. We have Wells Fargo. We have
2 like a four-way -- six-way intersection within 20 feet. The
3 crosswalk is in the middle of way. It's just a
4 bad site.

5 Now, you're coming down Center Street. You have
6 the police decoys trying to do their job. The crosswalk is
7 not even visible. It's half (indiscernible) and worn out.
8 You're going 20 miles an hour and you're trying to get
9 through Town.

10 I noticed that because of this new park and it's
11 bigger, last summer, there was a catastrophe with out of
12 towners, people in town trying to use that park. Taking
13 their strollers out of the back of their cars, trying to get
14 situated. And they have to cross over to the Yanticaw Park.
15 And we're over there at the flip side again, trying to get
16 through.

17 And I'm over here trying to respect people -- do I
18 stop? I know when I get out of a car, people are trying to
19 let me go. I've got to hide like 20 feet behind my vehicle
20 so they don't come -- they're so afraid. They're telling me
21 to go, but yet the opposite side -- reverse traffic is flying
22 down. I'm going to listen to the driver stopping to let me
23 go and I'm going to get whacked by the oncoming traffic the
24 other way.

25 My point here is we have 14 parking spots, 4 on

1 the right going west, and 10 on the left. Like where are
2 these people going to park? Then -- I look at the Chase
3 Bank that's totally against, in my opinion, the municipal
4 land use act of this mixed use building. We've got
5 20 units there with offices.

6 I notice at 10 o'clock, 11 o'clock, 12 o'clock,
7 the street is loaded. Where are all of these people going
8 to go? They want to take their little kiddies and
9 venture, everybody loves children. How are they
10 going to get across the street without some kind of maybe
11 fatality, like that happening in (indiscernible) a couple
12 years back.

13 I go there. People talk. One person went through
14 to the doctor's office. Another one I saw (indiscernible)
15 or somebody whacked somebody on the bumper (indiscernible).
16 It's like a catastrophe. Like this is a little town. It's
17 only a three mile radius. We don't want this town to go the
18 way it's going with all these apartments, mixed use on every
19 corner. Like figure something out. We need jobs. We don't
20 need people with little businesses into residential
21 areas and ruin the whole --

22 MR. GENITEMPO: That's five minutes. Thank you.

23 MR. ALESSIO: If you keep (indiscernible), you can
24 take my point into consideration with Mr. Tucci or
25 something. Straighten it out.

1 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: What do you think the
2 solution is to the park, Carmen?

3 MR. ALESSIO: Put parking -- instead of --

4 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Park Drive.

5 MR. ALESSIO: Put a parking lot to facilitate some
6 of these people so they can take their strollers out or do
7 something.

8 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Well, that's a county
9 park, right? Yeah, that's a --

10 MR. ALESSIO: How about Booth Park? It's like all
11 trees and a gully. Straighten it out a little bit. I mean,
12 like I don't want to come here. I want to be home eating my
13 dinner and watching T.V.

14 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Mr. Alessio?

15 MR. ALESSIO: I don't want to come here -- I'm
16 forced to come here and then, you know, you threw a curve at
17 me when you started talking about safety. The flip side,
18 people do text. That's terrible, but there are good drivers
19 and they want to get where they're going.

20 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Mr. Alessio, that's a county
21 park and Park Drive, part of that is a county roadway, but
22 we'll take it up with the county and see what we could do
23 about some parking on Park Drive.

24 MR. ALESSIO: I wasn't aware it's a -- and I do
25 make calls. And I try to like say, hey, look, where are we

1 going with this? Years ago, very recently, 2010, we
2 Green Acres was involved -- getting funds to the town
3 (indiscernible). Now, it needs to be renovated. Fine,
4 renovate it, but it's bigger. The oak trees are down. Now,
5 we're getting more people coming.

6 You know, like, I don't know. I was taught how to
7 cross a street. Look both ways. You know, these people, I
8 don't know where they come from.

9 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Let's wrap it up, Mr. Alessio.

10 MR. ALESSIO: They don't know how to cross -- or
11 they park -- they're going to double park over there,
12 whatever they're going to do, and it's going to be dangerous.
13 And it's not fair to some of us --

14 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I think you have a good
15 point.

16 MR. ALESSIO: Figure something out --

17 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I think you have a good
18 point and I think we will try to get a hold of the county,
19 Mayor.

20 MR. ALESSIO: It's a county park, but it's Essex
21 County. It's a mish mash with county, nutley. It's the
22 town's area, you should have some kind of like insight on
23 what's going on. It's creating a detriment in plain English.

24 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Mr. Alessio.

25 MR. ALESSIO: You're welcome.

1 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Would anybody else like to
2 address the Board of Commissioners this evening?

3 MS. LANDRY: Penny Landry, 135 Lakeside Drive.

4 In January of 2015, I came before this Board of
5 Commissioners and the first thing I did was thank you for
6 your service, so I'd like to start with that again in 2018.
7 At that time, I was administrator of a page called Nutley
8 Homeowners Community which was changed to Nutley Citizens
9 Community. And there were approximately 350 people who
10 followed the page in January of 2015.

11 We did kind of a survey to see what the citizens
12 of Nutley would like to present to you as a couple of things
13 they'd like to see in 2015. So the first thing I'd like to
14 say is that -- thank you, because two of those things that
15 were on the list happened. However, there are another 15
16 that have yet to happen that I'd like to read.

17 The two that happened since January 2015 are the
18 citizens' request that our Nutley Board of Commissioners
19 allow the citizens of Nutley to pay their municipal bills
20 online on our NutleyNJ.org website. Thank you, Commissioner
21 Evans.

22 The other was to have on demand broadcast of the
23 Board of Commissioners meetings on the NutleyNJ.org website.
24 And I'm unsure of who's in charge of IT now, but thank you
25 for making that happen, that the videos are up on the

1 website.

2 Things that have not happened that I'd like to
3 bring before the Board of Commissioners again are have joint
4 meetings with the Board of Ed at least twice a year. Post
5 one town hall meeting per year for citizen input on all
6 issues. Provide reasonably comprehensive minutes for all
7 quasi-judicial boards and have them available no less than
8 72 hours prior to the next meeting. And someone asked me to
9 add, also record and videotape the quasi-judicial boards
10 which are the Planning and Zoning Board meetings, and also
11 have those available through the Nutley High School and on
12 our cable channels.

13 Revise our masterplan with input from citizens
14 instead of consultants. Provide an annual report on our
15 masterplan. Use one of our underutilized town buildings as
16 a Nutley Youth Center, because I do care about our youth
17 deeply and I volunteer for a lot of things in our Town
18 concerning our youth.

19 Enact term limits for all appointed Board members,
20 Planning Board, Zoning Board, Library Board, Rent Levelling
21 Board, (indiscernible). Be more transparent. Listening to
22 feedback from the citizens and act quicker on what you
23 learn. Commit to being even more responsible with our tax
24 dollars by further reducing municipal spending. Use the
25 input of citizens more. Stop hiring consultants.

1 Reduce taxes by eliminating redundancies and
2 increasing accountability for municipal spending. Work with
3 Essex County and the state to provide better transportation
4 options for our citizens. Find ways to deal with speeding
5 and pedestrian traffic issues. More cops with radar,
6 traffic calming measures, raise fines, etcetera.

7 Next week, as the administrator of the Nutley
8 Citizen's Community, I'm going to put it out there again as
9 a new survey for the citizens and I would like to report
10 that the page now has 3,590 citizens in Nutley. So I look
11 forward to bringing you the new list. Thank you.

12 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Ms. Landry. Would
13 anybody else like to address the Board of Commissioners this
14 evening?

15 MS. QUIRK: Terry Quirk, 35 Hampton Place.
16 Spokesperson for the Nutley Parent Advocacy Network. Just
17 two things really quick. I just wanted to thank the police
18 department and Commissioner Petracco in regards to the
19 police -- the escort -- it wasn't really an escort, it was
20 the group that helped us out on our march and we really --
21 or our rally and we really appreciate their support at that
22 time. That was wonderful.

23 And I just want to say that I really enjoy coming
24 here and hearing how everybody feels in regards to security
25 and all the different facets, and hearing how it applies to

1 the Board of Education, and our children, and our schools,
2 because this is -- what I hear here is really not something
3 that I'm hearing across the street and I'm concerned about
4 that. Because when I go to meetings there, there seems to
5 be a close knit, not speaking on that Board, and we're not
6 really hearing from those people like we're hearing from
7 you.

8 And I appreciate it. I always appreciate what
9 people have to say. I don't have to agree with everybody,
10 but it's important that we have a chance to speak our mind
11 and say what we have to say, especially when it comes to
12 something as serious as this.

13 So I'm really -- I just see a lot of tension
14 there. I know a couple of weeks ago, Mayor, you came on
15 social media and you said, okay, everybody has to really be
16 nice to one another because we all live in the same town and
17 I understand that, and I respect that, because I live by the
18 Shop Rite, which you know, I meet people in Shop Rite so I
19 have to be nice. I always have to watch what I say.

20 But the truth of the matter is it is important to
21 respect one another and respect people's feelings, and to
22 know also that the people that are involved in trying to get
23 their ideas across really are based in fear. Their feelings
24 -- they're just as fearful as the other group who wants to
25 have -- there's one group that wants armed security in and

1 they really want to be proactive on that; and then there's
2 another group that doesn't. And they are just as fearful as
3 the group that -- if you really look at both sides, they're
4 very similar.

5 So the problem that we're having now is that we're
6 really not hearing from the Board of Education. And I know
7 -- it sounds like I'm tattling, because I will share this
8 with them, but when I came here last time and I was able to
9 hear what you had to say, and I was able to poll you and to
10 say hey, how do you feel about that? That's not the
11 experience I had over there. And it's disheartening, okay?

12 And I just wanted to share that and thank you for
13 venting, okay? Thank you. Bye bye.

14 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Ms. Quirk. I don't
15 know if I said be nice to each other, but what I did say was
16 to respect each other's opinions. And you know, not to get
17 where you're calling names to each other. I think it's
18 important.

19 Because as you said, we all want the best for our
20 children, no matter which side of the fence we're on. So
21 would anybody else like to address the Board of
22 Commissioners this evening?

23 MR. MELILLO: Brett Melillo, 225 Prospect Street. I
24 would like to petition for (indiscernible) for a stop sign at
25 Race and Prospect Street where (indiscernible) schools

1 (indiscernible).

2 MAYOR SCARPELLI: On Prospect or on -- I mean,
3 there is a stop sign on Race, I believe.

4 MR. MELILLO: On Prospect.

5 MAYOR SCARPELLI: On Prospect.

6 MR. MELILLO: Right. Yeah, we're
7 recently new to the area, but during the time we've been
8 here, we've had family members come back, park on the
9 street, and almost get hit by cars driving by. My brother-
10 in-law is a detective and my (indiscernible).

11 MAYOR SCARPELLI: I know Mr. -- Police Officer
12 O'Halloran has been looking at that.

13 MR. MELILLO: Yes, he has.

14 MAYOR SCARPELLI: And he's been in contact with
15 engineering and we've actually sent, you know, the results
16 of his traffic study to Pennoni, who are our engineers.
17 But I don't think a four-way stop was contemplated there, but
18 we certainly could pass it on to our engineers to have them
19 look at that based on Officer O'Halloran's study.

20 MR. MELILLO: Right. And I do appreciate that
21 because (indiscernible) speed survey. But again, I think
22 that that (indiscernible) but again, looking at the traffic
23 that comes down that street, it's still a
24 dangerous --

25 MAYOR SCARPELLI: There's a lot of information

1 that's generated besides speed from those traffic studies.

2 So Commissioner, do you have anything?

3 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yeah, it's how many cars
4 are passing through. But I have to tell you, I'm a fan of
5 four-way stop signs. I am, and anything to slow down the
6 traffic today. Because, you know, as people are saying, you
7 know, we are growing a little bit here and we have a lot of
8 visitors to our community as well.

9 So I will reach out to Joe O'Halloran and see what
10 his findings are and what -- I guess we'll work through this
11 together as far as the process with the engineer and what
12 could be done. But I could say that if there's something
13 that could be done, I think the mayor and I are on the same
14 page.

15 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Yeah, there's three E's, right?
16 There's enforcement, engineering, and education. And those
17 are the three things that we can work together to provide.

18 I grew up in that neighborhood. And when I grew
19 up there, there wasn't a traffic light on Prospect and
20 Center, you know?

21 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Right.

22 MAYOR SCARPELLI: And there some accidents there
23 and I think at least one or two fatalities there, which
24 precipitated the traffic light being installed. So
25 unfortunately, I can remember back before the traffic light

1 which is --

2 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: You were there when the
3 horse and buggies came down Prospect Street.

4 MAYOR SCARPELLI: But, you know, so that was one
5 change that was made over time because of safety concerns.
6 So we'll certainly look at what else can be done.

7 MR. MELILLO: Sure. Appreciate that. Is there
8 someone I can follow up with you?

9 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yeah. You know what, this
10 is my assistant at the Town, you could exchange numbers and
11 we'll get right on it.

12 MR. MELILLO: Thank you very much.

13 MAYOR SCARPELLI: You're welcome. Would anybody
14 else like to address the Board of Commissioners this
15 evening?

16 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Move to adjourn.

17 MADAM CLERK: I need a second.

18 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah, just before we adjourn,
19 I missed my announcement earlier. I just --

20 MAYOR SCARPELLI: You lost it. The agenda is
21 over. You lost it.

22 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I know. It's a problem.
23 It's a problem. Real quick, April is dog and cat license
24 registration month and just a reminder that the letters have
25 been issued to current pet owners regarding renewal of their

1 license. It's up on the website to remind people who are
2 new with an animal in town, and that the Clerk's office is
3 going to be open late on April 18th, 19th, and 26th to
4 handle the extra volume. Thank you.

5 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Commissioner. Does
6 anybody else have any announcements?

7 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Move to adjourn.

8 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Second.

9 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

10 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

11 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

12 COMMISSIONER EVANS: One more thing -- aye.

13 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco?

14 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Aye.

15 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Scarpelli?

16 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Aye.

17 MADAM CLERK: And the time is 8:21.

18 MAYOR SCARPELLI: Take care everybody.

19 (Meeting was adjourned)

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
