MAYOR PETRACCO: Okay. Before we start can we just have a moment of silence for the troops that are serving abroad?

Thank you. Madame Clerk.

MADAM CLERK: Tuesday, December 17th, 2013. Pursuant to the requirements of the Open Public Meeting Law, Chapter 231 Public Laws 1975, notice of this meeting was published in the December 13th, 2012 issues of the Nutley Sun, the Star Ledger, and the Herald News. COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Here.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Here.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Here.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Scarpelli?

MR. SCARPELLI: Here.

MADAM CLERK: Mayor Petracco?

6 WHEREAS, The Nutley Raider Marching Band, as well
7 as the Drill Team, are comprised of talented and dedicated
8 students from all four high schools, with a total of 68
9 students in each group; and

10 WHEREAS, The Nutley Raider Marching Band continues
11 the long-standing tradition of promoting Raider pride by
12 providing unwavering support and encouragement to fans and
13 players throughout the year, as well as excelling in the
14 competitive performance arena;

15 NOW THEREFORE BE IT PROCLAIMED, that the Board of
16 Commissioners, in the Township of Nutley, in the County of
17 Essex, join with the citizens of Nutley in recognizing and
18 congratulating The Nutley Raider Marching Band, Drill Team
19 and their Directors, and the students on their outstanding
20 accomplishments throughout the 2012 -- strike that -- 2013
21 season.

22 So moved.

23 MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you.

24 MADAM CLERK: That's a proclamation so I will not
25 be doing the roll call, gentlemen.

1 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Mr. Riley, would you come
2 forward.

3 (Applause)

4 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: The second proclamation is
5 kind of a first of its kind. And it directly involves
6 students of Nutley High School directly involved in our
7 Veterans' Day, which is kind of (indiscernible).

8 WHEREAS, Nutley High School Patriot Club began in
9 the fall of 2013 under the direction Mr. Jarrett D. Vick;
10 and

11 WHEREAS, the purpose of the Nutley High School
12 Patriot Club is to enable students to promote the patriotic
13 spirit of the Nutley High School community and to honor and
14 assist members of the U.S. armed forces and veterans; and

15 WHEREAS, the Nutley High School Patriot Club
16 sponsored a Veterans' Day program on Monday, November 11,
17 2013, in the Nutley High School Auditorium to honor and
18 recognize our local veterans; and

19 WHEREAS, the program included performances by the
20 Nutley High School Chamber Singers, Nutley High School Jazz
21 Band, bagpipes, multimedia presentations, color guard; and

22 WHEREAS, this is something really neat, there were
23 240 people in attendance including 70 veterans, who were
24 recognized and presented with a certificate and a small
25 gift;

1 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT PROCLAIMED, by the Board of
2 Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, County of Essex
3 that Nutley High School Patriot Club members -- there's not
4 too many of them so we're going to name them and I believe
5 they're here tonight -- Chris Palmer, Tyler Ross, Ryan
6 McGlone, Brian Devine, Nick Miller, John Conca,
7 Gabe Fortella, Rob Melio, Matt Genitempo, Evan Keating,
8 Frank Malanga, Mike Buckley, Brandon Costa, Aston Mercado,
9 Joe Iorio, Sydney Casale, Tommy O'Mara, Christopher Palma,
10 and Mike Foster, along with Director Jarrett D. Vick, be
11 recognized and congratulated for their outstanding efforts
12 in acknowledging and honoring our Nutley Veterans, and
13 perpetuating the pride and dignity they so rightfully
14 deserve.

15 Thank you very much, Mr. Vick.

16 (Applause)

17 (Three minute pause while students are recognized
18 and congratulated.)

19 MAYOR PETRACCO: Whenever we do proclamations like
20 this, we usually give everyone a chance to leave, because
21 most people don't want to stay. But before you guys go, I
22 have something to say and I'm sure some of the other
23 commissioners might.

24 Last night with Commissioner Rogers, who invited
25 me to the middle school last night to hear the band perform,

1 I have to tell you, you know, I'm pretty much a sports guy,
2 I must admit. I was never so proud to be part of Nutley in
3 my life because you guys rock it as you say. And it was --
4 I really thought it was a bunch of professionals up there.
5 So, Mr. Riley, to you, your staff, to the parents who
6 dedicate their time, un -- when I say unbelievable to see
7 what these kids have put together, it's tremendous and it
8 really, really, like I said last night, it makes Nutley very
9 proud.

10 Unfortunately, last night, our mic that Steve and
11 I were using I don't think was working, Steve. And when I
12 went back to one of the parents, he said, you know, Al, we
13 couldn't hear a word you said. And I said, usually those
14 are our best speeches. So tonight I'm sure you could hear
15 us. And as far as Mr. Vick back there with the veterans and
16 the kids, most of the families we know and I'll tell you,
17 talk about making veterans feel special and, you know,
18 Jarret D. Vick as they say, you know, you travel and --
19 abroad with these kids and being a role model, you learn
20 what Nutley is all about, inspiration and you know, I'm sure
21 the Board of Commissioners thank you as well. So thank all
22 of you.

23 (Applause)

24 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: But by the way both
25 groups, your both groups, all of you are going to be getting

1 copies of the proclamation because I know some people are
2 Xeroxing them. But we've got them all made and you're going
3 to get them.

4 But just having been a band parent and a color
5 guard parent, I know the hard work that goes in to the
6 performances and to the competition. So congratulations.
7 And for our Patriot Club, it's, you know, we hear a lot of
8 negative about our young people. But it's still nice to see
9 the positive. Thank you.

10 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: I'll add comments of
11 congratulations and I'd add that too often we're focused in
12 on the challenges that we have and we don't talk enough
13 about Nutley pride. And you guys are just doing, you know,
14 great to uplift everyone's spirits at a time of great need.
15 We've been at war for a long time. There's a lot of
16 challenges and a lot of new veterans as new challenges
17 associated (inaudible) Great to see that you have rallied
18 and begun to (inaudible). Very proud of you and (inaudible)
19 ramp up Nutley pride on that side. On the band side, Nutley
20 pride, my God, back -- I graduated 1973 (inaudible)

21 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: I'm not going to be as
22 long winded as my colleagues this evening --

23 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: Thank you. Thank
24 you. Thank you.

25 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: -- I just want to say

1 -- you're welcome and he's a lot older than I am.

2 Congratulations and thank you for all you do. We're very
3 proud.

4 MAYOR PETRACCO: Okay. With that being said, if
5 you guys do not want to stay for the rest of the meeting,
6 we'll take a little short recess and you guys can get up and
7 go.

8 They're even quiet when they leave. They're so
9 well mannered.

10 MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you. Okay. Madam Clerk, I
11 guess we will move to minutes.

12 MADAM CLERK: We have no minutes this evening,
13 Mayor.

14 MAYOR PETRACCO: Okay. Communications and
15 correspondence, none. I see we have some reports from
16 Commissioner Tucci.

17 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Yes, I have a report for
18 November of the Shade Tree Department. That's it.

19 MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you. Okay. We'll move on

6 MR. SCARPELLI: Aye.

7 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Petracco?

8 MAYOR PETRACCO: Aye.

9 MADAM CLERK: Thank you, Mayor.

10 MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you. And we have ordinance
11 introductions. Commissioner Evans.

12 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Thank you. Read by its title
13 but it would add that time is comprehensive update to our
14 sign ordinance. And it is 700. It -- I just want to
15 acknowledge that on all the work of the commissioners to
16 contribute to this as well as the members of the Planning
17 Board (indiscernible) and actually reviewed this. It was --
18 these modifications reflect a lot of input from business
19 owners in different areas that we needed it (inaudible), a
20 long time in coming.

21 So (inaudible) Ordinance 3274, an ordinance to
22 amend an ordinance codified in the Code of the Township of
23 Nutley, Chapter 700, entitled Zoning, particularly Article
24 III, Terminology and Articles Seven, Sign -- excuse me, 12.

25 I move that this ordinance be passed to a second

1 reading and advertised in the Nutley Sun together with the
2 notice required by law and that further consideration of
3 said ordinance for final passage by the Board of
4 Commissioners be held at its second reading on January 21,
5 2014.

6 So move.

7 UNIDENTIFIED COMMISSIONER: Second.

8 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

9 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

10 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

11 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

12 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

13 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

14 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Scarpelli?

15 MR. SCARPELLI: Aye.

18 And I had an introduction on Ordinance No. 3275
19 that we're going to pull tonight. So now we have Ordinance,
20 Public Hearings, Commissioner Evans again.

21 MADAM CLERK: Mayor, it's actually your public
22 hearing.

23 MAYOR PETRACCO: Ordinance No. 3267?

24 MADAM CLERK: Yes.

25 MAYOR PETRACCO: Okay. An ordinance to amend an

1 ordinance an ordinance codified in the Code of the Township
2 of Nutley, Chapter 228, entitled Vehicles and Traffic,
3 particularly Article 2, Parking on Certain Streets, Section
4 11, Parking Time Limited to amend the location set there
5 forth on. This is Harrison Street, north side from the
6 hours of 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. school days, one hour of
7 parking from Prospect Street to Bloomfield Avenue.

8 Is there anyone here this evening that would like
9 to comment on Ordinance No. 3267? Seeing no one, I move to
10 close the public portion of the meeting.

11 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Public Hearing. Second.

12 MAYOR PETRACCO: I'm sorry. Public hearing. We
13 can't do that yet. Yes. Wishful thinking though.

14 MADAM CLERK: I need a second, please.

15 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I seconded.

16 MADAM CLERK: Okay. Seconded by
17 Commissioner Tucci.

18 Commissioner Rogers?

19 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

20 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

21 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

22 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

23 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

24 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Scarpelli?

25 MR. SCARPELLI: Aye.

1 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Petracco?

2 MAYOR PETRACCO: Aye.

3 I move the ordinance.

4 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Second.

5 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

6 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

7 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

8 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

9 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

10 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

11 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Scarpelli?

12 MR. SCARPELLI: Aye.

13 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Petracco?

14 MAYOR PETRACCO: Aye.

15 Thank you. Okay. Commissioner Evans.

16 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes, I have an ordinance for
17 public hearing tonight which was a modification of our
18 capital plan for the year to purchase software from Edmunds
19 Associates which would be an improvement to the treasury
20 software capability that will just improve our efficiency
21 and our ability to progressively move to accepting credit
22 cards and allowing for a greater (inaudible).

23 MAYOR PETRACCO: Anyone here this evening that
24 would like to comment on Ordinance No. 3273? No one? Oh,
25 would you like to comment, ma'am?

1 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: We have to close the public
2 hearing?

3 MAYOR PETRACCO: We have someone that would like
4 to comment.

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Oh, we have a comment.

6 MADAM CLERK: We have a --

7 MAYOR PETRACCO: Why don't you lower the
8 (indiscernible)? Please speak your name and address.

9 MS. LANDRY: Penny Landry, 135 Lakeside Drive.
10 It's -- your submitting a modification? Could you tell me
11 what the modification is?

12 COMMISSIONER EVANS: It's for the -- to add to the
13 -- our capital ordinance, the spending to purchase software
14 that will improve our treasury function capability. We
15 normally submit our capital in the beginning of the year,
16 but we're now doing this as an amendment to that this year
17 now.

18 MS. LANDRY: And is there a dollar figure to the
19 --

20 COMMISSIONER EVANS: \$55,000.

21 MS. LANDRY: \$55,000 additional to what you talked
22 about last time?

23 COMMISSIONER EVANS: No, it's the same. We just
24 -- we introduced it, now we're just having the public
25 hearing on it.

1 MS. LANDRY: Okay. Great.

2 MAYOR PETRACCO: (Indiscernible)

3 MS. LANDRY: So it'll be 55,000 for the software
4 that will allow the citizens of Nutley to be able to pay
5 their taxes online instead of driving here during the day to
6 pay them?

7 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Well, they could drive if
8 they want to.

9 MS. LANDRY: We want to have a green Nutley
10 according to the Planning Commission and one of the goals of
11 the Planning Commission is to reduce driving in Nutley,
12 though --

13 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I wish them luck with that.

14 MS. LANDRY: You did what, sir? I'm sorry.
15 You're inaudible.

16 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I wish them luck in reducing
17 driving in Nutley (inaudible).

18 MS. LANDRY: I'm sorry. I'm not hearing you.

19 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I wish them luck in reducing
20 driving in Nutley as part of their broader green -- going
21 green plan. All for itself, one of the attributes of it
22 will allow us to provide a merchant provider service as it's
23 called to allow for credit card use. The main function of
24 it is to upgrade my treasury function software which will
25 allow us to have more efficient service.

1 MS. LANDRY: And to clarify, part of that will be
2 merchant services for payment of taxes online?

3 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes.

4 MS. LANDRY: And when do you anticipate this
5 service being available to the taxpayers?

6 COMMISSIONER EVANS: If not by May, the August
7 quarter will be a taxpayers for paying taxes. We do have a
8 recreation account which is through the parks and recreation
9 department and I expect that we would actually bring it to
10 them first to make sure that we have the system working
11 properly because it's a smaller -- a smaller impact on my
12 department. So first would be the recreation account and
13 then probably if I get it all on time -- in time for May,
14 I'll get it there in May.

15 MS. LANDRY: Okay. Can you explain the Parks and
16 Recs component of this software?

17 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I don't -- it's not -- it --
18 Parks and Rec has recreation account software and a function
19 that they would like to do for children who --

20 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Let me -- let me explain
21 this.

22 MS. LANDRY: Okay.

23 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: We have registration online
24 right now.

25 MS. LANDRY: Okay.

1 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: So folks don't have to drive
2 down to the Parks Department because people are busy working
3 --

4 MS. LANDRY: Thank you, Commissioner.

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: -- and part of the green
6 component as you've already stated, all right, we used to do
7 it through PayPal, but we have an upgraded system. All
8 right. Part of this system actually we push them into this
9 system.

10 MS. LANDRY: Okay.

11 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: All right. So it's so that
12 our residents can in fact register their children for all of
13 our activities or anything that we're sponsoring online.

14 MS. LANDRY: Okay. Which I'm totally for, but I
15 think that maybe we ought to revise it and since you already
16 have a PayPal system, put the system for the greater number
17 of people who will use it, which would be the taxpayers.
18 Put that system in first.

19 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Well, it's actually a double
20 hit, Penny. Because it's not --

21 MS. LANDRY: Oh, it happens at the same time?

22 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Yeah.

23 MS. LANDRY: Okay. Well he said --

24 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: And once it goes into effect
25 it --

1 MS. LANDRY: -- he had to do Parks and Recs first.

2 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: -- it'll serve both of our
3 needs.

4 MS. LANDRY: Okay. Because I thought you said you
5 had to do Parks and Recs first, Commissioner Evans.

6 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes, I do.

7 MS. LANDRY: Oh, okay. Well, and Commissioner
8 Tucci says it can happen at the same time. So I just make a
9 recommendation --

10 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I don't know the timing of
11 it. I'm not that -- I'm not that particular in the
12 techniques of a lot of these electronics. I do know that
13 our folks have been waiting a while, all right. And we --

14 MS. LANDRY: Okay.

15 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: -- need this -- we need this
16 component so that we can get back online, all right. And
17 our people are not inconvenienced and have to drive down to
18 actually hand us a check.

19 MS. LANDRY: You're thinking by August this will
20 be in place, sir, just to clarify?

21 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Or sooner. My hope is
22 sooner.

23 MS. LANDRY: You'll see? Okay. All right. I'll
24 check back with you. Thanks.

25 MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you. Is there anyone else

1 that would like to comment on Ordinance No. 3273? Seeing no
2 one, we need a motion.

3 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes.

4 MAYOR PETRACCO: (Indiscernible)

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Second.

7 of Nutley entitled Rent Controls, Section 532-14: When
8 Effective Termination of Provisions.

9 Is there anyone here this evening that would like
10 to address the Board on Ordinance No. 3272? Seeing no one,
11 I move that the public portion -- I'm sorry -- the public
12 hearing --

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Is closed.

6 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

7 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

8 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Scarpelli?

9 MR. SCARPELLI: Aye.

10 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Petracco?

11 MAYOR PETRACCO: Aye. Thank you.

12 Okay. This is a resolution, one of mine.

13 WHEREAS, on December 17th, 2013 a Memorandum of

14 Agreement was reached between the Township of Nutley and the

15 Nutley FMBA Local 44 and Local 44A;

16 WHEREAS, the Township of Nutley desires to enter

17 into a four-year contract with FMBA Local 44 and Local 44A

18 in accordance with the terms and conditions outlined in the

19 Memorandum of Agreement;

20 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of

21 Commissioners, Township of Nutley, County of Essex, State of

22 New Jersey, that the Township of Nutley be and hereby is

23 authorized to enter into a contract with the FMBA Local 44

24 and Local 44A in accordance with the terms and conditions

25 set forth in the Memorandum of Agreement signed on December

1 17th, 2013 and in the form approved by counsel.

2 I move the resolution.

3 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Second.

8 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I think early --

10 COMMISSIONER EVANS: -- yeah, we're hoping that
11 early January (inaudible) holidays coming up it's going to
12 be slower. But the purpose is to try to move quickly and
13 try to work closely with Clifton and with Roche (inaudible)
14 purpose the property as quickly as possible.

3 The first thing I wanted to do is say Merry
4 Christmas and Happy Holidays, everybody. Hope it's
5 wonderful.

6 MAYOR PETRACCO: Likewise.

7 MS. LANDRY: Trying to get used to the snow thing.

8 I also have a couple of people I want to
9 acknowledge. The people who work in (indiscernible) the
10 technical assistants, Antoinette DeBlassio -- I may get some
11 of these names wrong -- Tracy Peters and Bridgette Riley,
12 those are easy, and then Mr. Dave Barry. Even though I was
13 unable to get started on my project before the snow came, I
14 wanted to acknowledge those people for the work that they
15 did in trying to help me out.

16 I also want to acknowledge Melany and Evelyn who
17 have been -- Evelyn Rosario who has been amazing. And
18 then, of course, the voice, the friendly voice of Nutley,
19 Sharon. So I appreciate all you guys trying to help me out
20 -- figure out how all this works.

21 I had the opportunity years ago to study with a
22 gentleman named Dr. W. Edwards Deming and some of you may
23 know him as the father of total quality control or
24 statistical process control. He was hired by Ford to help
25 them transform and it was a great experience. And what he

1 always said was 85 percent of the time problems that we face
2 in businesses, in government, families, whatever, it's the
3 process and not the people.

4 And I think the people who work in Nutley and for
5 Nutley are amazing people. And I think that, you know, from
6 a military kind of perspective, they're the front line and
7 they take the brunt of people's frustrations and challenges.
8 And as commissioners, they're your front line. And your
9 role and in my consulting with businesses for leaders,
10 whatever, is to make sure that your people have the
11 processes and systems in place that they need to efficiently
12 and effectively serve the townspeople so that they aren't
13 always getting beat up. Because it's processes; it's not
14 people. People are good. Everybody goes to work wanting to
15 do a great job. You just need the processes and the systems
16 to allow them to do that.

17 So last meeting, I asked Commissioner Evans to be
18 personally accountable for making some systems and process
19 changes in the permit department so that other citizens who
20 want to bring tax dollars into the community don't have to
21 wait seven weeks to do it. Well, now it's going to turn
22 into more like a lot of weeks because of the snow because
23 and my people who were out of work who were waiting to do
24 this project, the electrician, the plumber, the contractor,
25 the cement guy, all then take on other work because the

1 normal process is three weeks. However, for some reason
2 mine fell through the cracks and it took seven.

3 But I just want to make sure the crack is fixed so
4 that the next person who wants to, you know, improve their
5 property which would improve the tax value or the whatever,
6 not that I'm looking forward to that part, but I am looking
7 forward to my new/old building.

8 So I don't know how I do this because it said to
9 address you --

10 MAYOR PETRACCO: Uh-huh.

11 MS. LANDRYe -- but I would like for Commissioner
12 Evans to kind of give a report.

13 MAYOR PETRACCO: Sure. Sure.

14 MS. LANDRY: About what has been changed in the
15 Department. Because last time he said he was going to make
16 sure Mr. Barry did it and I asked him to be personally
17 responsible because everybody I've talked to loves Mr. Barry
18 and he's great and he called me and he was --

19 MAYOR PETRACCOe Ms., we could -- we can direct
20 the question to Commissioner Evans. But before we do that.
21 I can just tell you that I've been on this Board for the
22 last six years and, you know, not only Commissioner Evans,
23 but all the commissioners are very accountable for what they
24 do. So when they say they're going to do something, I could
25 promise you that they will. But I'll give Commissioner

1 Evans the floor.

2 MS. LANDRY: Thank you, sir.

3 MAYOR PETRACCO: You're very welcome.

4 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And so your question is?

5 MS. LANDRY: What specific changes to the process
6 of permit submittal have been made in the Code Enforcement
7 Department since you said you would be personally
8 accountable for making some changes?

9 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I have not received them yet.
10 Under state statute, the construction official is
11 administratively responsible for establishing procedures for
12 the Construction Department. I've advised him that I wanted
13 to see processes improved and I'm waiting for him to respond
14 to me.

15 MS. LANDRY: Have you, yourself, made any
16 recommendations as to improvement processes to support your
17 staff?

18 COMMISSIONER EVANS: That's an interesting
19 question. Because under state statute if I was to do that,
20 I would be unduly providing political influence to a
21 department that is controlled by state statute and protected
22 by it.

23 MS. LANDRY: Okay. So you lead that Department
24 but you have no influence on it?

25 COMMISSIONER EVANS: By state statute, I have

1 limited responsibility when it comes to those procedures.
2 It is that person's responsibility to do that by law.

3 MS. LANDRY: And can you explain those limited
4 responsibilities?

5 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I have the overall executive,
6 judicial, administrative and operating responsibilities of
7 the Department to make sure that I have resources there that
8 can do the job. I have to make sure that I give him the
9 authority that he needs and the space that he needs to do
10 his job.

11 MS. LANDRY: And so you say that the people within
12 your Department have the authority to do what needs to be
13 done to improve?

14 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Absolutely.

15 MS. LANDRY: Okay. And -- and in --

16 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And by the way, the
17 construction official not only has the authority by me, he
18 has it by state law.

19 MS. LANDRY: But I think Mr. Barry's the zoning
20 official.

21 COMMISSIONER EVANS: That's correct.

22 MS. LANDRY: Okay. Who's the construction
23 official?

24 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Pat Intendola (phonetic).

25 MS. LANDRY: Pat who?

1 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Intendola.

2 MS. LANDRY: So I should call Mr. Pat and see --

3 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Sure.

4 MS. LANDRY: Okay. All right. Great. I think
5 that's it unless you want me to address my other issue now
6 and state my name and address?

7 MAYOR PETRACCO: Well --

8 MS. LANDRY: Or sit down and then get back up?

9 MAYOR PETRACCO: No, no, no, no, no, no. Please
10 -- go ahead. What's your other issue?

11 MS. LANDRY: Oh, okay. I didn't know the process
12 for sending communications, so apparently I got it in too
13 late because it wasn't in the minutes. So I'll just read it
14 now, if that's okay. Is that okay, sir?

15 MAYOR PETRACCO: Yes. Yes, ma'am.

16 MS. LANDRY: Okay. A formal request is submitted
17 by Penny Landry, 135 Lakeside Drive to revise and amend the
18 current system for providing -- for providing meeting
19 minutes for all Nutley Boards and Committees on the
20 designated space on the NutleyNewJersey.Org website.

21 And I have specific recommendations. Within one
22 week or five working days of all meetings, the audio file of
23 the minutes is uploaded to the minutes section of the
24 website designated for each meeting.

25 When the outside company contracted for minute

1 transcription returns the pdf document, because I was able
2 to get a couple of pdfs off of there, off the website today.
3 And then I sent a question about it and then they all
4 disappeared. So there must have been a technical glitch.
5 But thank goodness, I have a copy.

6 So right before I left to come here --

7 MAYOR PETRACCO: Uh-huh.

8 MS. LANDRY: -- I checked for the planning
9 commission meetings because they're Board minutes which
10 they've never put any up. But for the -- this Board the
11 minutes were up there. The last ones were -- I think I have
12 it right here, April 25th. So apparently what's happening
13 is whoever this company is that the minutes are sent out to,
14 they're kind of backlogged. So they haven't sent back any
15 minutes since April 25th, 2013.

16 Part of the recommendation would be to get a new
17 company contract and somebody who can get it done a little
18 quicker so that they're on the website. But then when I
19 went back to recheck something, all the minutes were gone
20 off the website.

21 But I have copies if you all need them to re-put
22 them back up there.

23 MAYOR PETRACCO: Well, I think we could -- we'll
24 look into that. We'll go through our --

25 MS. LANDRY: Okay. I have -- I have them here. I

1 need to read something out of one of them anyway.

2 Okay. So the rest of it is when the outside
3 company contracted for minute transcription returns the pdf
4 document of the minutes to the town clerk, the audio file is
5 to be replaced with the minutes, okay, so that people have
6 it right after the meeting and not have to wait six months
7 to get them and/or drive down here to get a copy or a CD or
8 whatever.

9 An alternative recommendation is that if the town
10 charter does not allow for audio minutes to be posted on the
11 website, that the responsible commissioners will investigate
12 alternative transcription services that can provide meeting
13 minutes in a timely manner to the citizens of Nutley.

14 This recommendation is made to support the Nutley
15 planning action steps re: the greening of Nutley. Timely
16 posting of minutes will decrease the number of calls and
17 therefore the workload on the staff to the town clerk and
18 other staff members and trips made to the office to pick up
19 printed copies of minutes.

20 It is requested that this communication be read
21 into the Board -- the next Board of Communications (sic)
22 meeting -- sorry.

23 MAYOR PETRACCO: But Ms. -- where did you get that
24 from? What?

25 MS. LANDRY: I wrote it.

1 MAYOR PETRACCO: You read it off the internet off
2 our minutes? I don't understand the document that you're
3 reading from.

4 MS. LANDRY: It was a communication that I sent in
5 to be put on the agenda today. However, on the agenda it
6 says there were no communications.

7 MAYOR PETRACCO: It's not required to be on it.
8 There's no -- no action required by the Board of
9 Commissioners.

10 MS. LANDRY: Okay. Well, I'm just reading it
11 because I'm making a recommendation to you guys.

12 MAYOR PETRACCO: That's fine. And that's the
13 appropriate forum to do it.

14 MS. LANDRY: I'm easy to -- okay. All right. So
15 while we're on the minutes thing. Can I bring this up now
16 or do I need to say my name again?

17 MAYOR PETRACCO: No, you could hand them to the
18 clerk.

19 MS. LANDRY: Okay. So I just have a question.
20 This mic seems to work pretty well. That page -- starting
21 on page 9 of the minutes April 25th, 2013 which was a public
22 meeting, every single line of the minutes where a number --
23 a budget number is discussed is marked inaudible. I can
24 bring it up there if you want to see.

25 So I just have a -- Commissioner Evans spoke at

1 that meeting and if it's okay, I'd like to just read and
2 maybe he can fill in the blanks for me.

3 MAYOR PETRACCO: What's the date of the meeting?

4 MS. LANDRY: April 25th, that's the last one that
5 was on the website. You okay with that?

6 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I'll do my best.

7 MS. LANDRY: Huh?

8 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I'll do my best.

9 MS. LANDRY: Okay. I know, my memory's kind of
10 going too. Okay. Commissioner Evans says, "I ask that
11 because we don't want to achieve that, by saying we want to
12 achieve it or the apartment we does that, we (inaudible)e
13 Then it says, just that point of clarification I question
14 Ray and anyone trying to quote an average tax increase
15 because there's so much volatility in the base. It's very
16 hard to find an average. To say I'm going to find an
17 average in Nutley and say this person's on average
18 (inaudible) value of 314 (inaudible)e"

19 "It's very hard to go find any taxpayers that
20 actually fit that fit so what we intend to do is provide
21 with the tax bills coming out a simple calculation that
22 every taxpayer can calculate change in their taxes over a
23 year. They can determine what their adjust (inaudible) to
24 do that if there is any further follow up or inquiry you
25 have to have, we're better equipped to talk about actual

1 adjustment or to make up averages.e'

2 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I can respond to that.

3 MS. LANDRY: And then there is (inaudible),
4 (inaudible), let me just finish, please?

5 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Sure.

6 MS. LANDRY: "We're trying to avoid that. So if
7 anyone presses you on (inaudible for 50 seconds), let's work
8 on the transparency (inaudible) your actual taxes are.e'

9 And then, Mayor Petracco, you say thank you,
10 because there's a whole bunch of inaudibles. Can you
11 explain that to me?

12 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes, I can.

13 MS. LANDRY: Okay. Good. I'm ready.

14 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Did you receive your tax bill
15 for the fall, this fourth quarter?

16 MS. LANDRY: Uh-huh.

17 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And in that tax bill there
18 was a letter?

19 MS. LANDRY: Oh, no, sir. I don't want -- I don't
20 want that explained.

21 COMMISSIONER EVANS: That's what that refers to.

22 MS. LANDRY: No, no. What I want explained is why
23 there are so many inaudibles in the minutes.

24 MADAM CLERK: You have to speak into the
25 microphone, directly into the microphone or it's not going

1 to pick up. That is why it's inaudible.

2 MS. LANDRY: Well, my question is during this
3 meeting there are 60 pages, okay. Only I don't print a lot
4 of stuff so I only printed a couple. During the entire time
5 that Mr. -- forgot his name -- who was that guy's name, the
6 budget guy?

7 COMMISSIONER EVANS: That's me.

8 MS. LANDRY: Oh, no, you're a budget guy. There
9 was another budget guy at this meeting. Roger, is that his
10 name? No. Commissioner Evans discussed the assess value
11 volatility. Ray. Okay. So Ray --

12 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Ray Serranelli (phonetic),
13 he's our independent auditor.

14 MS. LANDRY: Yeah. He was inaudible for 15 pages.
15 It appears to me that somebody would have asked Ray to speak
16 into the mic. Does anybody recall asking Ray to speak
17 clearly so that of the 15 pages of him addressing the
18 commissioners every single line has inaudible in it.

19 MAYOR PETRACCO: Well the only thing that I can
20 answer your question about is that we don't have the device
21 in front of us to let us know if it's audible or not
22 audible. So alls I can say tonight to you is that we can
23 look into the problem and we could try to correct it and see
24 what the shortcomings of that is.

25 MS. LANDRY: And to Evelyn's, you know, I've been

1 to two meetings and every time someone is not speaking into
2 the mic, she asks them to do it. She does a phenomenal job.

3 MAYOR PETRACCO: Right. Well --

4 MS. LANDRY: And she does it repeatedly and she's
5 excellent at what she does --

6 MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you.

7 MS. LANDRY: -- because she's done it four or five
8 times tonight.

9 MAYOR PETRACCO: Okay. We'll look into that.

10 MS. LANDRY: So I would just like --

11 MAYOR PETRACCO: We'll look into that.

12 MS. LANDRY: -- this to be on the agenda and I
13 would like the minutes for this meeting re-sent to the
14 company responsible for transcription and posted to the
15 website.

16 I'm also requesting that the town do a much better
17 job of timely posting of minutes for all boards and
18 commissions to the website so that the people, the taxpaying
19 citizens of this community can be informed and have the
20 information that they need to serve themselves and their
21 families. And that is my request, Mayor Petracco. And I
22 would like you to be as the mayor, per se, that you would be
23 personally accountable for making that happen, if that's
24 okay.

25 MAYOR PETRACCO: I would -- what I will do is I

1 will look into it. I'll see what the shortfalls are, why
2 they weren't audible. I always like speaking loudly into my
3 mic.

4 MS. LANDRY: Yeah, you do. You do a great job.

5 MAYOR PETRACCO: Because I don't -- just to
6 clarify a point. We want these meeting to be audible
7 because not only does it protect the residents, but it does
8 protect us as well. This way no one can say we said this,
9 we didn't say that, all that stuff. So I could assure you I
10 didn't have any idea that they weren't audible. I thought
11 our minutes were posted the legal way. The one thing I can
12 say is that we will look into it.

13 MS. LANDRY: Thank you so much.

14 MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you for your time.

15 MS. LANDRY: Have a good holiday.

16 MAYOR PETRACCO: Is there anyone else that would
17 like to address the Board of Commissioners tonight -- this
18 evening? Seeing no one we need to move --

19 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Executive session. Thank
20 you.

21 MADAM CLERK: WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners
22 of the Township of Nutley, and the County of Essex, State of
23 New Jersey desires to proceed to close executive session;
24 and

25 NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of

1 Commissioners of the Township of Nutley that the Township
2 commission shall now move into executive session to discuss
3 litigation matters;

4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the time when such
5 discussions may be disclosed to the public shall be what is
6 such disclosure may be made without adversely affecting the
7 Township of Nutley pending and/or anticipated legal,
8 personnel, contractual matters and other matters within the
9 exceptions provided for by statute.

10 That was moved by Commissioner Scarpelli.

11 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Second.

12 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

13 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

14 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

15 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

16 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

17 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

18 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Scarpelli?

19 MR. SCARPELLI: Aye.

20 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Petracco?

21 MAYOR PETRACCO: Aye.







Ordinance No. 3274

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE CODIFIED IN THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF NUTLEY, CHAPTER 700, ENTITLED ZONING, PARTICULARLY ARTICLE III, TERMINOLOGY & ARTICLE XII, SIGNS,

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Nutley that Chapter 700 of the Code of the Township of Nutley, entitled Zoning, Article III, Terminology and Article XII Signs is hereby amended.

ARTICLE III
Terminology

Definitions.

As used in this article, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

DELETE

B. Definitions.

AWNING

A temporary or permanent roof-like cover attached to or projecting from a building, as an appurtenance to the building. It may function as a protection from weather and sunlight or may be ornamental

AWNING, RETRACTABLE

An awning which is manufactured to be rolled easily up or down. Lettering or logos on retractable awnings shall be included in the permitted surface display area for signs.

AWNING SIGN

A sign on any part of an awning, and shall be considered a business sign, and shall be subject to all sign regulations established in Article XII of this chapter.

ADD

B. Definitions.

ADVERTISING SIGN

A sign which directs attention to a business, commodity, service or entertainment, conducted, sold or offered elsewhere than upon the premises or not exclusively related to the premises.

“A” FRAME SIGN

An “A”-shaped temporary and easily movable ground sign with a message on two sides, for advertising commodities, services or entertainment, conducted upon the premises where the sign is located. “A” frame signs shall be no greater than two (2) feet x three (3) feet on each side and shall be constructed of material compatible with the building where it is situate. “A” frame signs shall be prohibited from being located in any Township, County or State right-of-way.

ANIMATED SIGN

Any sign that uses movement or change of lighting to depict action or the illusion of movement or create a special effect or scene.

APPLIED LETTER

A type of wall sign utilizing letters or a logo, individually mounted on the facade of the structure to form the sign message.

AREA IDENTIFICATION SIGN

A sign to identify a common area containing a group of structures, or a single structure, such as a residential subdivision, apartment complex or shopping center, located at the entrance or entrances of the area. Such signs may or may not consist of a fence or wall or archway with letters or symbols affixed thereto.

AWNINGS and CANOPIES

Roof-like coverings, either retractable or non-retractable, extending over a walkway, sidewalk or exterior place, supported by a frame attached to the building and/or ground with a surface made of fabric or a more rigid material, such as plastic or metal, and either retractable against the building or fixed in place.

AWNING SIGN

Any sign that is part of, attached to or printed on an awning, canopy or other fabric, plastic or structural protective cover over a door, entrance, window or outdoor service area.

BANNER

Any sign printed or displayed upon cloth or other flexible material, with or without frames. National flags, state or municipal flags or the official flag of any not-for-profit institution shall not be considered banners for the purposes of this chapter.

BEACON

A stationary or revolving light which flashes or projects illumination, single color or multicolored, in any manner which is intended to attract or divert attention; except, however, this term is not intended to include any kind of lighting device which is required or necessary under the safety regulations described by the Federal Aviation Agency or similar agencies.

BILLBOARD or OUTDOOR ADVERTISING SIGN

A sign which directs attention to a business, industry, profession, political candidate, groups of candidates for public office, commodity, service or entertainment not necessarily sold or offered upon the premises where the sign is located.

BUILDING MARKER

Any sign indicating the name of a building and date and incidental information about its construction, which sign is cut into a masonry surface or made of bronze or other permanent material.

BUILDING SIGN

Any sign attached to any part of a building, as contrasted to a freestanding sign.

BULLETIN BOARD

Any sign erected by a charitable, educational or religious organization or public body, which is erected upon the same premises as said institution, for purposes of announcing changing events.

BUSINESS SIGN

A sign which directs attention to a permitted business, industry, profession, commodity, service or entertainment sold or offered upon the premises where such sign is located upon the premises and which sign shall be deemed an integral part of that profession, office, business, commercial enterprise or industry. A "For Sale" or "To or For Rent" sign relating only to the premises on which it is displayed shall be deemed a business sign.

CANOPY

See "Awnings and Canopies."

CANOPY SIGN

See "Awning Sign."

CHANGEABLE MESSAGE

A sign or portion thereof with characters, letters or illustrations that can be changed or rearranged without altering the face or the surface of the sign, including, without limitation, electronic or digital message boards or tickers.

COMMERCIAL MESSAGE

Any sign wording, logo or other representation that, directly or indirectly, names, advertises or calls attention to a business, product, service or other commercial activity.

DIRECTIONAL SIGN

A sign intended to direct or point toward a place or which gives directions. Such signs shall carry no advertising copy describing the activities carried on at the premises where such signs are located.

DIRECTORY SIGN

A sign listing the tenants or occupants of a building.

DISPLAY SURFACE AREA

The net geometric area enclosed by the display surface of the sign, including the outer extremities of all letters, characters and delineations, the surfaces upon which they are presented, voids between elements of the sign or any element of the display that goes beyond the primary surface, whichever is greatest; provided, however, that display surface area shall not include the structural supports for freestanding signs; provided, further, that each side of a double-faced sign as defined shall be considered in determining the display surface area.

ERECT

To construct, build, raise, assemble, place, affix, attach, create, paint, draw or in any other way bring into being or establish, but not including any of the foregoing activities when performed as incidental to the normal maintenance or repair of a sign or sign structure.

ESTABLISHMENT

An economic unit where business is conducted or services or industrial operations are performed. More than one establishment could be located at a single street address.

EXEMPT SIGNS

Any sign which does not require a sign permit to be issued by the Township for their installation.

EXTERNALLY ILLUMINATED SIGN

Any illuminated sign whose illumination is derived from an external artificial source outside the display portion of the sign.

FACADE

The total wall surface, including door and window area, of a building's principal face. A mansard roof shall be considered as part of the facade.

FLAG

Any fabric or bunting containing distinctive colors, patterns or symbols, used as a symbol of a government, political subdivision or other not-for-profit institution.

FLASHING SIGN

An illuminated sign, the illumination of which is not kept constant in intensity at all times when in use. Illuminated signs that indicate the time, temperature, weather or similar public service information, without other ancillary advertising or information, shall not be considered flashing signs.

FLAT SIGNS

Any sign attached or erected parallel to, or painted upon, the outside wall, fascia, awning, canopy or parapet of a building and not extending more than 9 inches from such outside wall, fascia, awning, canopy or parapet.

FREE STANDING OR GROUND SIGN

Any sign supported by permanent structures or supports that are placed on or anchored in the ground and that are independent from any building or other structure, not exceeding five (5) feet in height.

ILLUMINATED SIGN

A sign which is lighted by a self-contained interior light or by lights projected or directed onto it.

INCIDENTAL SIGN

A sign, generally informational, that has a purpose secondary to the use of the lot on which it is located, such as parking, directional and warning signs, and signs reading "loading only," "telephone," "open/closed," "hours of operation" and other similar directives. No sign with a commercial message legible from a position off the lot on which the sign is located shall be considered incidental.

INTERNALLY ILLUMINATED SIGN

Any sign whose sole source of artificial illumination is contained within the display portion of the sign, including neon-type signs and internally and backlit signs.

MARQUEE

A type of canopy with a permanent roof-like structure projecting beyond a building or extending along and projecting beyond the wall of the building and possibly supported in part from the ground, generally constructed above an entrance.

MARQUEE SIGN

Any sign attached to, in any manner, or made a part of a marquee.

NAMEPLATE SIGN

A sign which states the name or address, or both, of the occupant of the premises where the sign is located and not exceeding 1 and 1/2 square feet in area.

NEON SIGN

Self-luminous electric signs usually constructed of glass tubing containing a vapor or gas configured to form a display or lettering.

NONCONFORMING SIGN

Any sign that does not conform to the requirements of this chapter.

OFFICIAL SIGN

Any sign, symbol or device erected and maintained by the federal government, State of New Jersey, County of Essex, the Township or a public utility for the purpose of informing or guiding the public or for the protection and promotion of the health, safety, convenience and general welfare of the public.

OUTDOOR ADVERTISING SIGN

See "Billboard."

OVERHANGING SIGN

A sign suspended from a building marquee, awning, canopy or a wooden or metallic bar where such sign is located within the public right-of-way or other than parallel to the building facade.

PENNANT

Any lightweight plastic, fabric or other material, whether or not containing a message of any kind, suspended from a rope, wire or string, usually, but not necessarily, in series, designed to move in the wind.

PERSON

Any individual, association, company, corporation, firm, organization, partnership, private or governmental entity.

POLITICAL SIGN

Signs advancing the candidacy of any candidate or group of candidates for public office.

PORTABLE SIGN

Any sign not permanently attached to the ground or other permanent structure, or a sign designated to be transported, including but not limited to signs designed to be transported by means of wheels; A-frame and sandwich board signs; balloons used as signs; umbrellas used for advertising; and signs attached to or painted on vehicles parked and visible from the public right-of-way, unless said vehicle is used in the normal day-to-day operations of the business.

PROFESSIONAL SIGN

A sign listing only the name, profession, degree and/or specialty of each practitioner.

PROJECTING SIGN

Any sign affixed to a building or wall in such a manner that its leading edge extends more than one foot beyond the surface of such building or wall. Projecting signs shall be designed of material compatible with the building to which it is affixed and is no greater than two (2) feet x three (3) feet if four sided or thirty-six inches (36") in circumference if circular or oval in shape

PUMP ISLAND CANOPY SIGN

A flush-mounted sign on the vertical surface and canopy, which is the ornamental or protective roof-like structure erected above the pumps of a gasoline station.

PYLON SIGN

Any business sign supported by uprights, braces or masonry wall which is attached to the ground and is not attached to any building, exceeding 5 feet in height to the top of the sign. Pylon signs are prohibited in all zones. An example of a pylon sign is a gas station sign.

REAL ESTATE SIGN

A temporary sign placed upon the property for the purpose of advertising to the public the availability for sale, rent or lease of said property.

REAL ESTATE OPEN HOUSE SIGN

A sign which directs attention to a business, commodity, service or entertainment, conducted, sold or offered elsewhere than upon the premises or not exclusively related to the premises.

RIGHT-OF-WAY

That portion of the highway intended for the use of pedestrians and utilities between the curb line of a roadway and the property line.

ROOF SIGN

Any sign erected, constructed and maintained upon or over the roof of any building with the principal support of the roof structure or parapet wall.

SETBACK

The distance from the property line to the nearest part of the applicable building, structure or sign, measured perpendicularly to the property line.

SHOPPING CENTER OR MALL

A building or group of related buildings of more than three units having a common entrance or with more than one entrance not on a public road or highway.

SIGN

Shall mean and include every object, device, frame, figure, character, mark, point, fixture, graphic design, picture, stroke, stripe, trademark, model, emblem, placard, symbol, display, light, logo or reading matter which is used or intended to be used to advertise, identify, display, direct or attract attention to an object, person, institution, organization, business, product, service, event or location by any means, including words, letters, figures, designs, symbols, colors, illumination or projected images, when the same is placed in the view of the general public, either outdoors or indoors. Any of the above which is not placed out of doors, but which is illuminated with artificial or reflected color or otherwise made visible from out of doors, shall be considered a sign within the meaning of this chapter, when placed in such a way as to be used to attract attention or convey information to motorists or pedestrians.

SIGN STRUCTURE

The method employed to support any sign except a window sign.

TEMPORARY SIGN

Any sign that is used only temporarily and is not permanently mounted, with the exception of "Open House" Real Estate signs, all temporary signs must bear the date of original installation affixed in the lower right hand corner of such sign.

WALL SIGN

Any sign that shall be affixed parallel to the wall or printed or painted on the wall of any building in such a manner as to read parallel to the wall on which it is mounted; provided, however, said wall sign shall not project above the top of the wall or beyond the end of the building. For the purposes of this chapter, any sign display surface that is affixed flat against the sloping surface of a mansard roof shall be considered a wall sign.

WINDOW

A glass area presented to the public for purposes of display.

WINDOW SIGN

A sign, pictures, symbol, or combination thereof, designed to communicate information about an activity, business, commodity, event, sale or service, that is placed inside a window or upon the window panes of glass or is hanging within 18 inches inside of the window and is visible from the exterior of the window.

EXEMPT SIGNS.

The following signs shall not require a sign permit to be issued by the Township for their installation and shall be permitted as follows:

- A. Temporary civic, cultural and public service window posters, when posted inside windows of commercial establishments, provided they are only permitted in one window per establishment and do not, individually or combined, occupy more than 20% of the total area of said window or 5 square feet, whichever is less. Temporary window signs are permitted on ground-floor windows only. Temporary civic, cultural and public service banners shall also be permitted to be posted on areas designated by the Township of Nutley Public Works Department as public areas. Any such banner shall comply with the requirements of this ordinance and may be erected up to two (2) weeks prior to the advertised event and must be removed *no later than five (5) days* following the advertised event.
- B. Temporary promotional or special sales signs in windows of a commercial establishment when advertising that commercial establishment, provided they do not, individually or combined with other window signs, exceed 50% of the total area of the display window or 16 square feet, whichever is less. Temporary signs advertising a business opening or change in ownership of a commercial establishment, located on the premises of the

commercial establishment, are also permitted, provided such signage is placed in only one window per establishment per street frontage and does not exceed 50% of the window or an area of 16 square feet, whichever is less. All temporary signs shall have the date of installation printed clearly on the lower right-hand corner, as viewed from the exterior, and shall be permitted for a period not to exceed 30 days. Temporary promotional signs are permitted on ground-floor windows only. When more than one establishment is located at a single street address, the aggregate size of the signs for all establishments permitted by this subsection shall not exceed 50% of any one window or 16 square feet, whichever is less.

- C. Temporary signs of a nonprofit or charitable organization located on the premises of such organization, provided such signs shall not exceed one per premises per event and do not exceed 32 square feet in area. Said signs shall be put in place no earlier than 60 days before the event and shall be removed within five (5) days after completion of said event.
- D. One bulletin board sign not exceeding 12 square feet in surface display area shall be permitted for a house of worship or private, public and parochial schools, provided that, if not attached to the facade of the building, it shall be located no closer than 10 feet to the street line and not exceeding five feet in height. Such signs may be illuminated by direct exterior lighting, provided that the latter is so screened that light is not directed or reflected toward any adjacent residence or street.
- E. Incidental signs, and signs posting property as "private property", "no trespassing" or similar signs, which do not exceed 2 square feet in area. No such signs shall be neon signs. No property or structure shall contain more than five (5) incidental signs.
- F. Temporary signs denoting the architect, engineer or contractor, when placed upon the site under construction, provided such signs shall be limited to one sign per site and shall not exceed 16 square feet in area per sign face. Signs shall be located not less than five feet beyond the front property line; shall not be illuminated, and shall be limited to a time period of 30 days from the start of said services. Contractor signs are allowed in all zoning districts and shall require a permit.
- F. Flags or emblems of religious, educational, civic or governmental organizations flown from supports on the building or grounds occupied by the organizations and the American flag, wherever flown in accordance with the laws and rules promulgated by the federal government.
- G. All signs located within buildings that are not visible to the public from the outside of said building.
- I. Banners and flags used to signify a "Grand Opening" or special occasion, provided such banners and flags which shall require a permit may be erected up to two (2) weeks prior to the event and are removed within 30 days of the date first erected.

ARTICLE XII
Signs

DELETE

Prohibited signs.

No advertising signs, projecting signs, flashing signs, moving or fluttering signs or signs with moving parts or roof signs shall be erected or maintained in any district created under this chapter. No signs shall be erected which have high reflection by the use of special preparations such as fluorescent paint or glass. The following signs shall be prohibited: signs which consist of banners, posters, pennants, ribbons, streamers, strings of light bulbs, spinners or other similarly moving devices. These devices, when not part of any sign, are similarly prohibited.

ADD

General Provisions.

Purpose. The attractiveness of the Township of Nutley (the "Township") contributes to the general welfare and economic well-being of its citizens, property owners and business enterprises. The reasonable control of signage promotes a desirable visual environment and enhances public safety. The purposes of the regulations and standards that follow are:

- A. To encourage the effective use of signs as a means of communication,
- B. To maintain and enhance the aesthetic environment and the Township's ability to attract beneficial sources of economic development,
- C. To improve pedestrian and traffic safety,
- D. To attempt to minimize the possible adverse effect of signs on nearby public and private properties values,
- E. To prevent unnecessary and dangerous vehicular traffic distractions,
- F. To enable fair and consistent enforcement of these regulations. This section is adopted under the zoning authority of the Township in furtherance of the more general purposes set forth in this chapter.

Applicability.

The effect of this section, as more specifically set forth herein, is:

- A. To require the continuation of the Township's existing permit system to allow a variety of types of signs subject to the standards and the permit procedures of its local ordinances;
- B. To allow certain signs that are small, unobtrusive and incidental to the use of the respective buildings on which they are located, subject to the requirements of this chapter, but without a requirement for permits;
- C. To provide for temporary signs without commercial messages in limited circumstances; and
- D. To prohibit all signs not expressly permitted by this chapter.

Prohibited signs.

The following signs shall be prohibited:

- A. Fluorescent signs.
- B. Neon signs or lighting, except when used in a window to advertise a particular product sold by the establishment seeking to install the sign, which shall be limited to no more than two such signs per street frontage.
- C. Marquee signs, except for uses that typically utilize such signs.
- D. Signs on roofs, dormers and balconies.
- E. Billboards, billboard signs or. No sign otherwise lawful under this section shall be prohibited because of this provision.
- F. Signs mounted upon the exterior side or rear walls of any building or structure, except as otherwise permitted hereunder.
- G. Animated, moving or revolving signs and signs using blinking, flashing, vibrating, flickering, tracer or sequential lights, which display movement or the illusion of movement, including interior signs visible from the exterior of the premises, except for clocks, temperature displays, or signs commonly known as barber poles used in conjunction with barbershops.
- H. Changeable message signs, except when utilized in connection with municipal, Township school or houses of worship property.

- I. Signs erected, painted or composed of fluorescent, phosphorescent or similar material.

Banners, strings of banners and pinwheels, strings or streamers of flags, pennants, spinners or other similar devices strung across, upon, over or along any premises or building, whether part of a sign or not. . These items shall not be affixed to public service utility pole, telephone utility pole or any other pole, street sign, traffic signal pole, tree or installation on or along any public street, public right-of-way or any other public property. or on any public building.

- J. Balloons and inflatable signs.
- K. Signs attached to vehicles. It shall be unlawful to use a vehicle or a trailer to display a sign in circumvention of this section. Printed signage on the sides of commercial vehicles shall not be precluded hereunder.
- L. A-frame signs, except as permitted herein.
- M. Signs painted on the exterior walls or facade of a building.
- N. Signs on accessory buildings or structures.
- O. It shall be unlawful for any person to erect, locate, relocate or maintain any sign which falsely identifies the premises or occupant of any premises or building, or which falsely advertises for sale on any premises or in any building any product or service not available therein.
- P. Whenever there is a change in occupancy of a building or premises, including any vacancy of such building or premises, the message of any sign or signs which identify or advertise an individual, business, service, product or other item that is no longer present or available in the building or on the premises, and any attendant or incidental supporting framework or signage structure shall be promptly removed.
- Q. Any other type of sign not otherwise permitted.
- R. Pylon Signs - Any business sign supported by uprights, braces or masonry wall which is attached to the ground and is not attached to any building, exceeding 5 feet in height to the top of the sign. Pylon signs are prohibited in all zones. An example of a pylon sign is a gas station sign

Lighting and illumination.

Any sign permitted by the provisions of this chapter may be illuminated as permitted in this section, except that real estate signs shall be non-illuminated. Signs may be externally illuminated, provided that they comply with the following standards. For the purpose of administering this section, an "internally illuminated" sign shall be defined as a sign that is

illuminated by a light source that shines through the letters or logos from the back of the sign. "externally illuminated" signs shall be defined as signs that are illuminated by a light source that shines directly on the surface of a sign or which shines on the wall upon which applied letters are installed, and which light source is designed specifically to illuminate only the sign or applied letters.

- A. Internally Illuminated Signs - Internally illuminated signs are allowable
- B. Externally Illuminated Signs. - Externally illuminated signs shall only be permitted where the sources of illumination are shielded in such a manner that light is not directed to the street or adjoining property.
- C. No sign shall be lighted by means of flashing or intermittent illumination.
- D. Floodlights or spotlights used for the illumination of signs, whether or not such lights are attached to or separate from the building, shall not project light beyond the sign. Gooseneck reflectors and lights shall be permitted; provided, however, that the reflectors shall be provided with proper glass lenses concentrating the illumination upon the area of the sign so as to prevent glare upon the street or adjacent property.
- E. In no instance shall the light intensity of any illuminated sign exceed 75 foot-candles measured with a standard light meter measured at any point in front of the sign at a distance that is no greater than the smallest horizontal or vertical dimension of said sign.
- F. All sign lighting shall be turned off no later than 30 minutes after the closing, except signs in residential zones shall not be lit beyond 10:00 p.m.

A-frame signs

A-frame signs shall be permitted as follows:

- A. The area of each signboard, single-sided, does not exceed six square feet;
- B. The signboard is constructed of building compatible material;
- C. Letters are painted, vinyl die cut or legibly handwritten;
- D. The sign shall not be located within the County, State or Township right-of-way, and sidewalks, and its location does not interfere with pedestrian or vehicular circulation;
- F. The information displayed is limited to daily specials and/or hours of operation; and
- G. The sign is removed at the end of the business day.
- H. No more than one (1) A-frame sign shall be permitted for use in connection with any structure

I. Signs in R-1A, R-1AA, R-1, R-2 and R-3 Zoning Districts.

In R-1 A, R-1 AA, R-1, R-2 and R-3 Zoning Districts, no sign shall be permitted except the following: a nameplate sign bearing the name of the residence or professional person residing on the premises and, in the case of a professional person, indicating his profession, provided that such sign shall not exceed 1 and 1/2 square feet in area; a temporary sign not exceeding 12 square feet in display area pertaining to the lease or sale of the lot or buildings on which it is placed. Not more than one nameplate for each dwelling unit or more than one "for sale" sign per lot shall be permitted. In single-structure multifamily dwellings, one identification sign shall be permitted for each multifamily dwelling. Such sign shall be a facade sign or a ground sign limited to eight square feet in area. If a ground sign, the sign shall be no higher than five feet above the ground and shall be set back 18 feet from the front property line.

Signs in B-1 and B-2 Zoning Districts.

A. In Zoning Districts B-1 and B-2, no sign or any portion thereof shall be permitted except the following business signs:

- 1) Flat signs which shall not project more than nine inches beyond the building facade.
- 2) Any illuminated flat signs, which shall not project more than nine inches beyond the building facade.
- 3) Projecting signs provided same are designed of material compatible with the building to which it is affixed and is no greater than two (2) feet x three (3) feet if four sided or thirty – six inches (36”) in circumference if circular or oval in shape.

B. The permitted total surface display area of business signs for a premises shall not exceed, in number of square feet, the figure produced by the application of the following formulas:

- 1) For premises not located on a corner lot, the maximum signage surface area shall be no greater than the building frontage width in linear feet multiplied by a factor of 1 ½.

Building Width x 1.5 = Maximum Square Footage

- 2) In the case of a corner lot, such square foot display area may be increased by the number of square feet equal to 1/3 of the product obtained by multiplying the number of linear feet in the length of the building that faces the secondary street by 1 ½. The increased display area shall only be utilized by the erection of a permitted sign on that part of the premises which fronts the secondary street on the corner lot.

Secondary Street

$$\frac{\text{Building Length} \times 1.5}{3} = \text{Maximum Square Footage for Corner Lot Secondary Street Display}$$

- 3) For premises on a lot abutting a public parking lot, the maximum permitted signage surface area shall be no greater than the building frontage width in linear feet for the primary street multiplied by a factor of $1 \frac{1}{2}$, plus the sum of the building frontage width in linear feet for the section abutting the public parking lot multiplied by a factor of $1 \frac{1}{2}$, then multiplied by a reduction factor of one third ($\frac{1}{3}$) which said increased display area shall only be utilized by the erection of a permitted sign on that part of the premises which abuts said public parking lot.

Building Width fronting

$$\frac{\text{Public Parking} \times 1.5}{3} = \text{Maximum Square Footage for Building Side Display Abutting Public Parking Lot}$$

C. In no event shall the maximum display area for a premises exceed 150 square feet.

Signs in B-1, B-2, B-3, B-3A, B-4 and M-O Zoning Districts.

- A. In Zoning Districts B-3, B-3A, B-4 and M-O, no sign or portion thereof shall be permitted except the following business signs:
 - 1) Signs permitted in B-1 and B-2 Districts.
 - 2) Ground signs not exceeding five feet in height, which shall not be erected within five feet of any property line and which shall have a maximum display area not exceeding 25 square feet.
- B. The permitted total surface display area of business signs, including ground signs, shall be the number of square feet determined by the application of the formula set forth above, including the exception for a corner lot and the exception where premises abut a public parking lot. In no event shall the maximum display area for a premises exceed 150 square feet. The total surface display shall include both sides of a double-faced sign.

Signs in M and M-1 Zoning Districts.

In Zoning Districts M and M-1, the controls governing signs shall be the same as those for the B-3, B-4 and M-O Zoning Districts, except that in no event shall the maximum display area for a premises exceed 200 square feet.

Private schools, clubs and permitted institutional uses.

Private schools, clubs and permitted institutional uses may identify themselves with one nameplate sign not exceeding nine square feet of surface display area, provided that, if the sign is not attached to the facade of the building, it shall be set back from the street line a distance of 18 feet.

Garden apartment and townhouse developments.

Bulletin board directory signs not exceeding 12 square feet of surface display area shall be permitted in garden apartment and townhouse developments, provided that only one such sign shall be maintained for each street frontage upon which the garden apartment or townhouse development fronts, that such sign or signs shall be set back from the street line a distance of 18 feet and that only backlighting shall be used to provide artificial illumination.

Termination of business.

At the termination of a business, commercial or industrial enterprise, all signs pertaining thereto shall be removed from the public view within 30 days from the date the premises are vacated. Removal shall include the face of the sign and any framing, brackets or supports. Any replacement signs shall require new sign permits. Responsibility for violation shall reside with the property owner, according to the latest tax roll's listing.

Location of signs using the colors red, amber or green.

Signs in which the colors red or amber or green are used in direct illumination or in high reflection by the use of special preparations such as fluorescent paint or glass shall not be located within 100 feet of any approved traffic light or other safety device using red or green.

Required signature on signs.

All applications for signs herein permitted shall be signed by the owner of the property or his authorized or designated agent.

Political signs.

- A. For purposes of this section, the term "political signs" shall be defined as signs advancing the candidacy of any candidate or group of candidates for public office; and any such signs posted or displayed on licensed motor vehicles in operating conditions; provided, however, that no such vehicle is parked or placed in any location for the primary purpose of displaying any such sign, it being the intention of this section to eliminate the distracting or unsightly condition created by the parking or standing of motor vehicles bearing signs at or adjacent to trafficked areas for the purpose of displaying such sign.
- B. Restrictions. [Amended 3-18-2008 by Ord. No. 30541]
- 1) No political sign shall be permitted on any public service utility pole, telephone utility pole or any other pole, street sign, traffic signal pole, tree or installation on or along any public street,[or] public right-of-way or any other public property. or on any public building.
 - 2) Any political sign erected on a vacant lot shall conform to the square foot limitations of political signs in the zone in which it is located and be set back from the street at least 10 feet, and there shall be no more than five political signs placed on any vacant lot or property
 - 3) Political signs in R-1A, R-1AA, R-1, R-2 and R-3 Zoning Districts shall not exceed four (4) square feet for each sign set at least 15 feet back from the property. No permit shall be required for any political sign in these zones.
 - 4) Political signs in B-1, B-2, B-3, B-3A, B-4, M-O, M and M-1 Zoning Districts shall not exceed sixteen (16) square feet and shall meet the setback requirements for temporary signs in those districts where the signs are posted. Each candidate shall be limited to twelve (12) signs in these zones (exclusive of signs at a designated campaign headquarters) located in the Township for which a permit shall be required. The number of signs on each property in these zones will be limited to the number of public offices available for each category. For example: if three Board of Education Seats are up for election ,three signs would be permitted regardless of the number of candidates.
 - 5) Any privately owned building or part thereof designated and serving as the campaign headquarters of any candidate or groups of candidates for election for public office, shall be permitted one or more signs not exceeding a total of thirty (30) square feet cumulatively in B-2, B-3, B-3A, B-4, M-O, M and M-1 Zoning Districts or a total of sixteen (16) square feet cumulatively in R-1A, R-1AA, R-1, R-2 and R-3 Zoning Districts.

- 6) No such sign shall be erected, posted or displayed more than 30 days prior to the date of the election to which such sign pertains, and any such sign shall be removed not more than five calendar days after the date of such election.
- 7) Political Billboards are prohibited.

Awnings and awning signs.

- A. Awnings are permitted in all zoning districts.
- B. Awning signs shall be permitted only in Zoning Districts B-1, B-2, B-3, B-3A, B-4, M, M-O and M-1.
 - 1) Awnings and awning signs which are located in a zoning district wherein awning signs are permitted shall be subject to the following minimum design standards:
 - a. Awnings and awning signs shall project no more than three feet from the facade of the building to which they are attached, but not farther than the awnings on the same side of the street within 200 feet on either side.
 - b. Awnings and awning signs or any other type of projecting sign which projects over a street right-of-way shall be subject to an indemnification and hold harmless agreement between the store or the property owner and the Township, in a form acceptable to the Township, such that the Township is not held responsible for the loss of or damage to property or injury to persons occurring in or about the premises of the property owner by reason of installation and presence of said awnings.
 - c. Any lettering or logos displayed on the awning sign shall be included in the permitted surface display area established in Article XII of this chapter.
 - d. The lettering or logos on awnings shall represent no more than 35% of the total permitted surface display area for signs for the subject premises.
 - e. No lettering or logo is permitted on the side of the awning.
 - f. Awnings that are lit by external lights that are intended to highlight the awning and are not for security reasons shall be considered an awning sign.

- g. Segmented lighting on an awning sign shall be prohibited.
- h. The surface display area of an awning sign shall include the area that has any lettering or logos displayed and any area which is lighted internally or externally, whether or not the lighted area has lettering or logos.
- i. The minimum height above the sidewalk for awnings and the awning signs shall be at least seven feet six inches at the lowest point of the awning, but not higher than the awnings on the same side of the street within 200 feet on either side. Awnings signs shall not extend over the second story, nor over 12 feet six inches above grade, whichever is less.
- j. Awnings and awning signs shall meet all requirements of the Uniform Construction Code.
- k. Awnings shall be limited to: tan, brown, hunter green, Navy blue, black, maroon.

Signs-Old Towne District.

- A. In addition to all signage permitted in B-1 and B-2 Zoning Districts, the following signs shall also be permitted in the Old Towne District:
 - 1) "A"-frame signs;
 - 2) Projecting signs provided same are designed of material compatible with the building to which it is affixed and is no greater than two (2) feet x three (3) feet if four sided or thirty-six inches (36") in circumference if circular or oval in shape.

For the purpose of this section, the term "Old Towne District" shall mean, that area of the Township (i) on Passaic Avenue from Chestnut Street to Nutley Avenue and (ii) on Chestnut Street from Park Drive to Passaic Avenue.

BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that all other terms and conditions and locations in Articles II & XII, Chapter 700 shall remain as heretofore set forth in the Code of the Township of Nutley, except where such a reading would not give meaning to and further the application of this amendment. In such case and in such event, the terms and conditions shall have a meaning consistent with the intent of this amendment; and

BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that the within ordinance shall become effective after passage and publication, pursuant to law.
