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MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you. Is there any minutes?

MADAM CLERK: No minutes, Mayor.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Ladies and gentlemen, the resolution I'm about to read is a result of the combined efforts of every individual up on this podium here.

Back in, I guess a couple of years ago, in particularly when Commissioner Evans was the interim director of Public Affairs, he planted a seed that would have us combine the Township physician and the school physician.

And when I took over the department a couple of weeks ago I sat with the school board business administrator. We began to discuss how we're going to save tax dollars and what you're about to hear tonight is going to save us about \$40,000 in -- in tax revenue, I'm sorry, tax money.

Whereas, the Uniform Shared Services and Consolidation Act N.J.S.A. 40A:65-1 encourages financial accountability through the reduction of duplicative services among municipalities and school districts; and

Whereas, the Act provides that the parties may contract to jointly provide for public health and physician services; and

Whereas, the Township of Nutley, and the Nutley Board of Education, recognize the value and efficiency of

1 shared services as a way of reducing duplication and overlap  
2 of services; and  
3

4 Whereas, the Township and the Board employ  
5 physicians to provide health services; and

6 Whereas, the Township and the Board wish to join  
7 together and enter into a contract in order to share  
8 physician services, reduce costs and define the respective  
9 rights and obligations of the Township and the Board  
10 regarding the physician services.

11 Now, Therefore Be It Resolved, that the Township  
12 of Nutley be and is hereby authorized to enter into a Shared  
13 Service Agreement for physician services with the Nutley  
14 Board of Education in a form approved by the Township  
15 Attorney.

16 So moved.

17 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Second.

18 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

19 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: The second resolution involves a appointment of a Township physician. I wish to share with you that we had two Township physicians. One was the Township physician, and the other was an assistant, and I made a decision that all we needed was one.

I can tell you, that Dr. Giuliano, the former Township physician, served with great dedication and commitment and honor to this Township and we certain appreciate the service he gave this Township.

I'm going to move this resolution.

Be It Resolved by the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, County of Essex, State of New Jersey, that Dr. Maryann Alessio be appointed Township Physician effective August 3rd, 2012. So moved.

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COMMISSØNER EVANS: My last resolution is -- is a  
15 resolution that will be submitted to our State legislators  
16 calling for restoration of the energy tax -- taxes to the  
17 municipality according to the original agreement that was  
18 established several years ago in support of a league-wide  
19 effort to increase the State aid that municipalities  
20 receive.

21

Whereas, taxes on gas and electric utilities were  
22 originally collected by host municipalities to be used for  
23 local purposes and to compensate the public for use of their  
24 rights of way; and

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1 agent for these taxes, it promised to dedicate the proceeds  
2 to municipal property tax relief since, just as  
3 municipalities collect property taxes for the benefit of  
4 schools -- school districts, counties and other entities,  
5 the State is supposed to collect energy taxes for the  
6 benefit of municipal governments; and  
7

8           Whereas, for years though, the State budget makers  
9 have diverted funds from energy taxes to State programs; and  
10 instead of being spent on local programs and services and  
11 used to offset property taxes, the money has been spent as  
12 successive Legislatures and Administrations have seen fit;  
13 and

14           Whereas, while the State may need to have the  
15 right to override the statutory dedications of these revenue  
16 to local governments, in order to deal with emergencies,  
17 crises that may occur, the current State policy makers  
18 should not exercise that right automatically; and

19           Whereas, while that right should be an exception,  
20 it has become the rule; and

21           Whereas, by using tactics such as reducing CMPTRA,  
22 which is our true State aid, which is also comprised of  
23 revenues that should be returned to municipalities, State  
24 budget makers have been able to continue collecting energy  
25 taxes, while keeping additional revenues;

1 2005, to \$501 million in State fiscal year 2011, the State's  
2 diversion of energy taxes continue to grow; and  
3

4 Whereas, in 2008, 2009, 2010, funding for  
5 municipal revenue replacement was slashed by \$26 million in  
6 2008, \$32 million in 2009, and followed by losses of \$271  
7 million in 2010; and

8 Whereas, the cumulative impact of years of  
9 underfunding has left many municipalities with serious needs  
10 and burdensome property taxes; and

11 Whereas, local elected officials are in the best  
12 position to decide the best uses for these resources, which  
13 were always intended to fund local programs and services;

14 Now Therefore Be It Resolved, by the Board of  
15 Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, that we join with  
16 the League in calling for the immediate restoration of  
17 funding diverted from energy taxes intended for local use;  
18 and

19 Be It Further Resolved, that we respectfully call  
20 on State policy makers to end the diversion of our municipal  
21 resources to cover State spending and to provide us with  
22 this important tool to relieve the worst-in-the-nation  
23 property tax burden borne too long by the people of New  
24 Jersey; and

25 Be It Further Resolved, that copies of this  
Resolution be forwarded to the Governor of the State of New

1 Jersey, our Legislators, and the League of Municipalities.

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So moved.

16 to award a bid to AJM Contractors for the resurfacing of  
17 Passaic Avenue from the Clifton line to Brookfield Avenue  
18 which is funded through a grant through the New Jersey  
19 Department of Transportation.

20

Whereas, Bids for Resurfacing of Passaic Avenue  
21 Section V for paving of street, sidewalks and curb  
22 replacement were received and opened on June 26th, 2012; and

23

Whereas, AJM Contractors, Inc. 300 Kuller Road,  
24 Clifton, New Jersey was the low bidder; and

25

1 No. 3210 in the amount of \$240,000.00 from monies received  
2 via a grant from New Jersey Department of Transportation  
3 Local Aid Municipal Grant and Ordinance No. 3183 in amount  
4 of \$3,730.50 and certified by the Chief Financial Officer,  
5 said certification being attached to this resolution.  
6

7 Now, Therefore Be It Resolved by the Board of  
8 Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, County of Essex,  
9 State of New Jersey, that a contract be awarded to AJM  
10 Contractors, not to exceed \$243,730.50 and that the Mayor  
11 and Township Clerk are hereby authorized to enter into and  
12 sign said contract for the Township of Nutley. I move the  
13 resolution.

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Be It Resolved by the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, in the County of Essex, State of New Jersey, that renewal of Plenary Retail Consumption License be granted to Nutley Pub Associates LLC T/A Nutley Pub Associates, LLC 227-229 Centre Street, Nutley NJ 07110, Liquor License No. 0716-38-024-004 formerly the Nutley Pub LTD T/A Nutley Pub, effective July 1st, 2012 through June 30, 2013.

Be It Resolved, that the State of New Jersey, Department of Treasurer, Division of Taxation has provided a Tax Clearance Certificate for this establishment for this renewal period.

Be It Further Resolved, that the establishment has been inspected by the Board of Health, Fire Department and Code Enforcement Department of the Township of Nutley and are here satisfactory condition.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

1 the Board shall be allowed unless the Mayor, or presiding  
2 officer, or the majority of the membership of the Board,  
3 shall determine that the interest of the decorum and/or  
4 expeditious conduct of the municipal business are being  
5 adversely affected by such dialogue.

6  
7 Thank you, Jack. Yes, oh.

8 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Hi, there's three  
9 questions. Rogers, Mr. -- Commissioner Rogers, your  
10 proposal for the Township of Nutley Board of Education  
11 physician services (ph), could that be extended to our Town  
12 employees so within the next year with all this Obama care,  
13 their insurances would not rise above their -- our -- our  
14 Town worker's health.

15 In other words, you know, the rates are all going  
16 to go up all over the place. Is there any way this could be  
17 extended for them?

18 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: This -- this -- this savings  
19 is -- the savings is with salary and benefits primarily. As  
20 far as the Township employees, I'd have to talk to my  
21 colleagues about that. And, I don't understand the impact  
22 of Obama care so I really am not in a position to share  
23 that.

24 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: (Inaudible) just bring it  
25 up for you, and can it be looked in by the Commissioners. I  
think it would be an asset to the Town and an asset to our

1 employees (indiscernible) (7:34:31) just like all the  
2 (indiscernible) (7:34:35) on TV and we watch them. That's  
3 number one.  
4

5 Number two, while Mr. Evans, I know you worked on  
6 the (indiscernible) (7:34:50) tax law, and I want to thank  
7 you for your help with the, and this parking lot (ph) for  
8 working on that. Thank you again, and congratulations  
9 (indiscernible) (7:34:56.)

10 MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you.

11 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: (Inaudible.)

12 MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you, good job. Is there  
13 anyone else who would like to address the Board this  
14 evening?

15 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: (Inaudible.)

16 MAYOR PETRACCO: Excuse me, can you try to speak  
17 into the mic, it's hard to hear you.

18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Is this better?

19 MAYOR PETRACCO: Is that mic on?

20 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- the button now.

21 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Try now.

22 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: The button's over here.  
23 Hit the button.

24 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Try now.

25 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Better?

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UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: There you go.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Anyway, as you know, Roche tore down the buildings, and there has been a lot of speculation. I just want to know if anybody knows what's going on, and has the place, the environmental problems been remediated? Does anybody know anything about it?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I can -- I can field that question for you. We have met with Om (ph) Roche, actually today we met with him and we've been in talks with him since we got the news.

We also met with the states, the remediation process has started but they need to have, which is mandated through the legislation, to the -- by May, 2014, a plan with their remediation as known to date. And then that has to be approved by the DEP.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: May, 2014?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: That's the -- that's the plan.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: There's two phases -- there's two steps here. The specific property that you're referring to, which is the old Lamont (ph) property, which is not on the main campus, it's the south side --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- of Kingsland, that's the specific property. They have gone through their evaluation

1 of -- of that -- that property. The reason why the  
2 buildings were demolished is that they needed to do  
3 environmental testing, and so by eliminating the buildings  
4 they didn't have to do air quality testing, they only had to  
5 do soil testing.

6  
7 The predominant -- there is contamination on that  
8 property. It's predominantly historical contamination  
9 related to the incinerator from Lamont way back 100 years  
10 ago, so basically that's contamination in place. So  
11 whatever is easier to -- to address.

12 So the -- the final determination has not been  
13 provided yet by the State of New Jersey, but that's the --  
14 my understanding of what's been happening on that particular  
15 --

16 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So, in the meantime, we  
17 don't know what's going to happen to the property once --

18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No, the property is -- is,  
19 all the property is obviously up for, today, is up for sale.  
20 That particular property is -- is up for sale. There are  
21 deed restrictions and there has to be actually a subdivision  
22 that needs to happen before that parcel of land can be sold.

23 Right now, legal counsel in California has been  
24 working on what the deed restrictions are, and going through  
25 the paperwork to start to begin the process on that  
subdivision. That has been underway for the last year and a

1 half.

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3 So, it's -- it's well ahead of the -- what's  
4 happening as it relates to the campus, and that's where it  
5 stands today.

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UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you.

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UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Mayor, if I might --

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MAYOR PETRACCO: Please.

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10 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- just -- just one  
11 comment. I wouldn't be in favor of giving them any  
12 approvals, or any subdivisions, or any permits until we, in  
13 fact, get a plan buyer site, all right? Because quite  
14 frankly we have some information, but it is very sketchy.  
15 We don't have a detailed plan. We have conflicting reports  
16 coming out of Roche depending on who you're speaking to  
17 about what ultimately is going to happen.

18

19 And, based upon the meeting that we had with State  
20 representatives from the Department of Labor, from the  
21 Division of Business Advocacy, and the Governor's Office,  
22 there's a three prong approach, all right, that the State  
23 will be following that obviously, we're going to be tracking  
24 and taking our own direction on, all right?

25

26 Well, first is employment, a re-employment of the  
27 people that are losing their jobs, all right. The second is  
28 the constructive re-use of the property and that includes  
29 the remediation that Commissioner Evans and Mayor Petracco

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1 are talking about, and to what extent there's remediation  
2 because I'm not even sure that they filed a plan with the  
3 DEP yet, all right, or have a remedial action plan that  
4 they're going to be following. And then the third is the  
5 timing of all of this and what the impact will be on the  
6 municipal taxes.

7  
8 So, depending on where we are and who we're  
9 speaking to, unless there's more information that I'm not  
10 aware of at this point, we're not exactly sure what they're  
11 going to do. What Commissioner Evans is speaking to could  
12 be information that they passed on what, over a -- over a  
13 year ago concerning that subdivision.

14 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yeah, that -- that actually  
15 was the spring of this year, and it's -- it's -- it's fairly  
16 -- fairly current as it relates to that particular piece.  
17 But, as the Mayor alluded to, the Hoffmann-Roche is  
18 currently working on their environmental plan, and what they  
19 have to do for remediation.

20 It's not related to the closure, it's actually  
21 related to a State statute that basically has said  
22 manufacturing companies in the State of New Jersey need to  
23 put, to submit their plan to the State by May of 2014 in  
24 order to begin a process of getting approval on a  
25 remediation.

1 there was a statutory requirement that companies in New  
2 Jersey that were involved in manufacturing that had  
3 environmental implications, need to submit a plan by May of  
4 2014.

5

6 Once the plan is submitted for the entire campus,  
7 they will, you know, they're projecting that it will take,  
8 in effect, a year from when it's submitted to get a --  
9 actually a determination of action and approval for that  
10 before any transfers of property could actually occur.

11

12 So, basically as it relates to that point, that  
13 the --

14

(Gap in audio.)

15

16 MAYOR PETRACCO: -- so just a few additional  
17 comments regarding Roche, because I'm sure a lot of people  
18 are here this evening on that subject.

19

20 Just to let you know what the Board of  
21 Commissioners actions that we have taken. First, I'd like  
22 to say that we were notified about a half hour before the  
23 press was, so this comes as a shock to the Board as it -- it  
24 may to you.

25

26 We were very lucky, and I have to say Governor  
27 Christie's office did a great job. That day I was able to  
28 have Commissioner Tucci sit in with us. We met with Timothy  
29 Cunningham, who's the policy advisor. We met with Aaron  
30 Fitchner, who's in the Department of Labor and Workforce

1 Development. We met with Lauren H. Moore, who's the  
2 director of Office Business, and we -- and Matthew Watkins,  
3 was from Clifton. We also had the Clifton mayor sit in on  
4 this meeting.

5  
6 Well, and I don't have to tell you, the State was  
7 very helpful and they were very concerned about what this  
8 does to the Nutley budget. And I can tell you, we're all  
9 on it, and we're very -- I'm very optimistic. I'm thinking  
10 of it as more than, you know, I think it's a good  
11 opportunity for Nutley to come out of this, you know, with  
12 hopefully even more tax revenue and even more jobs than we  
13 currently have.

14 Today, Commissioner Evans and I met with -- now  
15 what is his name -- Tom Lyon from Hoffman-Roche, and he's  
16 the vice president of the Nutley site. And, he was very  
17 stern in saying to us that we have been a good neighbor to  
18 Hoffman-Roche, and they want to be a neighbor, continue to  
19 be a good neighbor on their exit plan. And, that they will  
20 take a, you know, a hand-in-hand relationship with us during  
21 this process to ensure that Nutley does not get hurt.

22 You know, they're very concerned about Nutley.  
23 They have an 80 year history here with us, and I, you know,  
24 we were in a two hour meeting today, and, you know, and they  
25 know our concerns and we talked a little bit about the  
possibilities of a new company coming in there, so forth and

1 so on.

2

3 They will not be vacating until December of 2013,  
4 so it gives us a little time, you know, to prepare for it  
5 and hopefully, you know, get a new company and there are a  
6 few different companies.

6

7 But, we feel that it's a very marketable piece of  
8 property being 13 miles away from Manhattan, so, we're, you  
9 know, again, I am, and the Board of Commissioners are,  
10 looking at this as a new beginning.

10

11 Is there anyone else tonight, or is there any  
12 other comments, gentlemen?

12

13 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: If I may, I -- I just want  
14 the public to know that the five gentlemen sitting up here,  
15 and -- and I've said this before, that I'm amazed at the  
16 skill and the talents that -- that are sitting here,  
17 especially with my colleagues.

17

18 They've taken care of this Town well, real well.  
19 I'm the new guy on the street here, and I'm -- I'm -- I used  
20 to be on the outside looking in, but now I'm on the inside  
21 looking at what's here.

21

22 And I share this with you, because these -- these  
23 fellows up here have worked very hard to keep a quality of  
24 life in this Town that we enjoy today. And, I share with  
25 you that, you know, we're Nutley-ites. I -- I always say  
we're Americans first, but we're Nutley-ites also. We have

1 never had a problem that we have ever faced in the history  
2 of this Township that, together, we haven't come out of.

3

4 And, so I just ask people, if you hear rumors,  
5 people are fearful, all of us have gotten phone calls from  
6 people who are concerned about their -- their quality of  
7 life in the future.

8 Please direct them to us. Make a phone call to  
9 any one of the five of us, but also encourage them,  
10 especially some of you ladies and gentlemen who have been  
11 here much longer than I have. You know the history of our  
12 Town, it's a great Town, and we're going to come out of this  
13 okay. But -- but please help us calm the nerves, because  
14 there's a lot of -- a lot of futures at stake, a lot of  
15 people's lives, their livelihoods are at stake here. And we  
16 don't want to add to that pain.

17 So, that's where we'll need your help. But be  
18 confident. You've got a good group up here, and thanks for  
19 all your good work. I -- I -- I know I say it, I can't say  
20 it enough being on the inside looking at what I see. Thank  
21 you.

22 MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you, Commissioner.

23 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thanks, Mayor. Just to  
24 echo some of my colleague's comments. I -- I do think this  
25 presents an opportunity for us, because I think what we are  
faced with was having Roche slowly decrease the footprint of

1 their property and have spot development all the way, along  
2 the way.

3

4 This way, we're going to have a big development  
5 which leads to better opportunities, I think, for Nutley and  
6 increase ratables as a possibility down the road. So,  
7 please be patient with us. It's going to be up to us to  
8 manage that, and from this point until the time that we do  
9 have any kind of redevelopment there, and that's going to be  
10 on us. And I promise you we're going to do a good job.

10

11 MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you. Miss, did you want to  
12 come?

12

13 MS. RUBINO: Joan Rubino, 48 North Road. Last  
14 month, I inquired about UN Agenda 21 and Mr. Scarpelli  
15 stated that he knew what it was. I would really like to  
16 know if all of the Commissioners, including you Mr.  
17 Scarpelli, if you actually do know what UN Agenda 21 is?

17

18 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Well, that was on -- it's  
19 on sustainability, Mrs. Rubino, and I may not know all the  
20 specifics of it, but I knew it's on sustainability. And  
21 your question was directed last month on, if we should be  
22 applying for a grant for a charging station.

22

23 MS. RUBINO: Right, but this has nothing to do  
24 with that, my question tonight.

24

25 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: But, that's -- that's  
what last week it was, and just a -- just a further

1 explanation on sustainability.

2

3 Being a sustainable community that we are  
4 registered with the State of New Jersey, also opens us up to  
5 DEP grants, and all of our DEP grants ask us, as part of  
6 that process, if we are registered with the sustainable New  
7 Jersey, and we get graded and rated on that -- that fact.

7

8 So, that's the reason that we're involved in that  
9 program.

9

10 MS. RUBINO: Yes, but it's more than just  
11 sustainability. That's as American as apple pie, and nobody  
12 would be against that.

12

13 But there are certain things in this Agenda 21  
14 that I'm wondering if you're aware of. And I'd like each  
15 one of you to let me know what you know about it.

15

16 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Mrs. Rubino, I, we -- we  
17 were discussing this some time ago, and I think we could all  
18 agree that we do know portions of it.

18

19 The portion that I know of it, and ultimately it's  
20 the United Nations allegedly attempting to take control of a  
21 lot of the -- of a lot of nations through sustainability,  
22 through the greening of our country. So, that's the basic  
23 nuts and bolts of it, the United Nations.

23

24 And -- and we did discuss this together after you  
25 left, so they do know portions of it, but we don't know --

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MS. RUBINO: Yes.

MAYOR PETRACCO: I don't know anything about it.

MS. RUBINO: Okay, thank you, that's honest. Most people don't. I'd like to know what the others know about it.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I -- I do not know.

MS. RUBINO: Okay, well I think you really -- I compiled a few sheets here that I will distribute to you to give you a heads up on what is going on with that, and I would like to tell you that it includes the redistribution of private property to public control.

The belief that private property is the cause of poverty around the world, government control of land use, redistribution of taxpayer money to other countries, heavy government regulation of housing and modes of travel which restrict our lifestyles, including where we live.

This is a very serious issue, and I think you should educate yourselves because the International Council for Local Environmental Initiatives is going to be at your doorstep, and I think you should be aware of it and know what they are about. And I will give you -- I'll give this to you --

MADAM CLERK: Yes, please.

MS. RUBINO: -- and you can distribute this to everyone.

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MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address the Board this evening?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Mayor, if I might just -- just one final comment. I -- I saw on one of the news stations where one of our former legislators was commenting on some of the services, and one -- one particular service that we provide here in Town.

And, I just want everyone to -- to be assured that we -- we are not dictated to by any State legislator. Any decisions concerning services that we, as a Board of Commissioners, provide to the people will come from us and not from outside of this community.

And, I'm sure that if we do begin to talk about services and how we provide them moving forward, there'll be a full discussion so that everyone can be involved.

It was just a comment that I did hear. I saw it on one of the news programs that a former assemblyman had made, and I -- I think he was just out of line, and -- and just misinformed.

MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you, Commissioner. Okay, that covers our -- sir?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: You know, may I, sir?

MAYOR PETRACCO: You may.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I -- I, you know, I don't get here too often anymore, so when I do I like to open my

1 mouth. Unfortunately, everybody doesn't like it, but that's  
2 life.

3  
4 I want to thank Commissioners in our town, from  
5 the American Legion 93-year-old post of the Town of Nutley,  
6 named after the Town of Nutley, sole reason that the World  
7 War I veterans that came back from Europe formed it with  
8 Teddy Roosevelt, on August 17th, 1919, the second oldest  
9 post in the United States.

10 And, we're historical -- historical in the sense  
11 that the only post that's named after a town, not after a  
12 veteran, the only town. Plus the fact I calculated by the  
13 number of members that they've had, that we've had over the  
14 past 93 years, that we have over 170,000 veterans that have  
15 deceased, except for the 150 we have right now.

16 And, I want to thank the Town from the bottom of  
17 my heart for their support, and any future support, because  
18 we've going to need it. Unfortunately, our young veterans  
19 don't know of our abilities to take care of them, and we  
20 don't get enough of them.

21 But, thanks to Mr. Petracco, and Steve, and Mr.  
22 Tucci and Evans, and Joe, we're going to be able to take  
23 care of that in the future, I hope very shortly.

24 But I think you should also realize, not only it  
25 being historical, we did things in this Town with that post  
and I have the historical papers on it, during the

1 Depression under Mr. Roosevelt that we were guaranteed  
2 monies by government to take care of veterans, veteran's  
3 wives that were -- deceased veterans, or helping form work -  
4 - form work hours. It's unbelievable it you read the whole  
5 operation.  
6

7 I -- I kept them because, unfortunately, a lot of  
8 times the younger generation just thinks, you know, scrap,  
9 scrap, scrap. And it didn't happen this time. So, again,  
10 thank you all for your support, and your help. God bless  
11 you.

12 MAYOR PETRACCO: Thank you. We will continue to  
13 help. Is there anyone else?

14 Seeing no one, we are going to continue this  
15 meeting, Madam Clerk?

16 MADAM CLERK: Mayor, we're going to go into an  
17 executive session. Upon exiting the executive session,  
18 we'll come back out into open session to close the meeting.

19 MAYOR PETRACCO: Okay, thank you.

20 MADAM CLERK: I'll read the resolution into the  
21 record whenever you're ready.

22 MAYOR PETRACCO: We are ready.

23 MADAM CLERK: Okay.

24 Whereas, the Board of Commissioners of the  
25 Township of Nutley, in the County of Essex, desires to  
proceed to a closed executive session.

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And, Now Therefore Be It Resolved, by the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, that the Commission shall now move into executive session to discuss anticipated litigation, attorney-client privilege.

Be It Further Resolved, that the time of such discussions may be disclosed to the public shall be when and such disclosure may be made without adversely affecting the Township of Nutley, pending and/or anticipated legal personal contractual matters, and other matters within the exceptions provided for by Statute.

I need a motion, please.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Move it.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Scarpelli?

COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Aye.

MADAM CLERK: Mayor Petracco?

MAYOR PETRACCO: Aye.

And before we go into executive session, I'd just like to wish everybody a happy Fourth of July. The Town

1 will have a lot for the youngsters to do tomorrow.  
2 Registration is from 9 to 9:30 at the Nutley Oval, and then,  
3 hopefully, we have good weather. The fireworks right now  
4 are scheduled to go off at dark tomorrow.  
5

6 So I wish everybody a very happy Fourth of July  
7 and hope to see you at the Oval. Thank you.

8 MADAM CLERK: Okay, Mayor, it is now 9:30 p.m. We  
9 have exited executive session, concerning anticipated  
10 litigation attorney-client privilege matters. I need a  
11 motion to adjourn.

12 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So moved.

13 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.

14 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Rogers?

15 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Aye.

16 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

17 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

18 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

19 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes.

Department of Public Works progress of work in the Road/Recycling Division for the month of April 2012 is as follows:

All Public works equipment was serviced and repaired by our Mechanics.

We picked up recycling throughout the township, consisting of plastic, paper, aluminum, mixed glass and clear glass and brought it back to the garage where it is separated and put into bins.

Once recyclables are loaded, they are put into large carting containers and brought to various places, such as:

Newspaper to Galaxy Recycling, Jersey City, NJ

Co-Mingled to Galaxy Recycling, Jersey City, NJ

This occurs several times a week.

Potholes around the township were filled in with hot asphalt. Also, large patches of asphalt were laid down, where needed.

Reflectors are placed on all dead end barricades throughout the township.

Dead end barricades were painted throughout the township.

On days and nights of very heavy rain, we work with the police Department on flooded streets so we may maintain all catch basins, clearing them of debris to prevent flooding of streets. This procedure is done all winter with the Police and during snow season also.

We assist the Police in vehicular accidents, cleaning up debris left by the accidents.

We try to assist the departments when we have the manpower. We pick up loose leaves and leaves in bio-bags, when required, all around the township, with the help from the Water

Department and the Parks Department. Commissioner Joseph P. Scarpelli--Page 2 Department of Public Works progress of work in the Road/Recycling Division for the Month of **April 2012**.

On Mondays and Fridays, we divided up the work load by picking up the recyclables at the condos, located at various areas throughout the town and doing work on our roads, such as filling in potholes, using winter mix, weather permitting cleaning off tops of catch basins and also inside them.

The Road Department also carts several containers of debris to Bergen County Utilities Authority, North Arlington, NJ for the Clean Communities Department and the Parks Department.

MONTHLY STANDARD PROCEDURES are as follows:

Newspaper is brought to Jersey City, NJ several times a week.

We empty litter baskets, every Monday and Friday located in all the parking lots, well area, town hall area and garages.

On Mondays and Fridays, we also send out our sweepers to clean around the Town Hall, Public Safety Building and Parking Lots.

We maintain the appearance of parking lots by picking up loose leaves and debris. Our sweepers are sent out every day to various areas in town to keep our streets as clean as possible. This also starts early in the morning.


We pick up all salt barrels.

Drivers and helper inspect trucks every morning, checking oil or broken lenses. When work is needed, the trucks are turned over to your Mechanics' Department for service.

RESOLUTION CALLING FOR THE RESTORATION OF ENERGY TAXES TO MUNICIPALITIES

WHEREAS, taxes on gas and electric utilities were originally collected by the host municipalities to be used for local purposes and to compensate the public for the use of their rights of way; and

WHEREAS, when the State made itself the collection agent for these taxes, it promised to dedicate the proceeds to municipal property tax relief; since, just as municipalities collect property taxes for the benefit of school districts, counties and other entities; the State is supposed to collect Energy Taxes for the benefit of municipal governments; and

WHEREAS, for years, though, State budget makers have diverted funding from Energy Taxes to fund State programs; and instead of being spent on local programs and services and used to offset property taxes, the money has been spent as successive Legislatures and Administrations have seen fit; and

WHEREAS, while the State may need to have the right to over-ride the statutory dedication of these revenues to local governments, in order to deal with emergencies and crises that may occur; current State policy makers should not exercise that right automatically; and

WHEREAS, while that right should be the exception, it has become the rule; and

WHEREAS, by using tactics such as reducing CMPTRA, which is also comprised of revenues that should be returned to municipalities, State Budget makers have been able to continue collecting Energy Taxes, while keeping additional revenue that should have been returned to provide property tax relief; and

WHEREAS, from \$72 million in State Fiscal Year 2005, to \$505 million in State Fiscal Year 2011, the State's diversion of Energy Taxes has continued to grow; and

WHEREAS, in 2008, 2009 and 2010 (SFY 2009, 2010 and 2011), funding for municipal revenue replacement was slashed by about \$26 million in 2008 and \$32 million in 2009, followed by losses of about \$271 million in 2010; and


WHEREAS, the cumulative impact of years of underfunding has left many municipalities with serious needs and burdensome property taxes; and

WHEREAS, local elected officials are in the best position to decide the best use for these resources, which were always intended to fund local programs and services;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, that we join with the League of Municipalities in calling for the immediate restoration of funding diverted from Energy Taxes intended for local use; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we, respectfully, call on State policy makers to end the diversion of our municipal resources to cover State spending and to provide us with this important tool to relieve the worst-in-the-nation property tax burden borne, for too long, by the people of New Jersey; and





# Unraveling the "Sustainability" Paradox

"Sustainability" flashes images of fresh air, clean water resources. Yet, Americans are discovering it also means loss of rights and value, reduced mobility and the loss of land. Because of "sustainable development":

thousands in EPA fines for building his dream home on his own ID property. EPA force citizens to accept solar farms few want.

Government is forcing 1500 homeowners from their property.

Court complaints attempting to win back lost property rights.

## Here is why a good idea like sustainability has such destructive outcomes:

Locally, most see sustainable development (SD) as a reasonable way to protect the environment. Globally, SD is much different. *It is a social, political and economic action plan that forces boilerplate solutions for real or perceived environmental crises on willing and unwilling participants.*

## Most citizens and public officials are not aware their local sustainable plan derives from the coercive global one. Here is how it happened:

- The term Sustainable Development came from a 1987 UN report called "Our Common Future" which concluded that developed nations, such as the US, were responsible for global warming and poverty, which in turn created an unsustainable planet. The solution was to limit property ownership and growth in the US, and transfer consumer wealth to developing nations. (Read, "Our Common Future" - Amazon)
- The 1992 UN Rio Earth Summit in Brazil codified the report, created a worldwide action plan called Agenda 21, and was signed onto by 178 nations including the US. (Search: "UN Agenda 21 Rio," "Rio Declaration")
- A 1993 executive order bypassed Congress to create the President's Council on Sustainable Development (PCSD) whose stated purpose was to "implement UN Agenda 21 in the US" via regulatory agencies. (Search: EO 12852; State Dep't. submission to the 5<sup>th</sup> Session of the Commission on Sustainable Development, April 1997)
- In 1998, J. Gary Lawrence, an advisor to the PCSD, recommended the term Agenda 21 and UN references be dropped to more easily implement SD in the US. Agencies and planners changed their terminology to Smart Growth and other environmentally friendly terms. (Search: "The Future of Local Agenda 21 in the New Millennium" p.5)
- By 2001, Sustainable Development/Smart Growth was part of the regulatory makeup of every federal agency and signed onto by the US Conference of Mayors, The National Governor's Association and several Leagues of Municipalities. It is now in your hometown. (Search: your town, state, and sustainable development)
- In 2002, HUD and other federal agencies funded the American Planning Association's, Growing Smart Legislative Guidebook 2 to incorporate Agenda 21 principles. This is now the standard planning apparatus throughout US communities. (Search for guidebook by name)

## UN Agenda 21 - Coming to a Neighborhood near You

Most Americans are unaware that one of the greatest threats to their freedom may be a United Nations program known as Agenda 21. The United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs, Division for Sustainable Development created Agenda 21 as a sustainability agenda which is arguably an amalgamation of socialism and extreme environmentalism brushed with anti-American, anti-capitalist overtones.

A detailed history on sustainable development, definitions, and critical actions can be found here. Section III of the Agenda 21 Plan addresses local community sustainable development. The Preamble and

Chapter 28 discuss how Agenda 21 should be implemented at a local level. The United Nations purposely recommends avoiding the term Agenda 21 and suggests a cleverly named alternative: "smart growth." The United Nations Millennium Papers - Issue 2 (page 5) says this of Agenda 21 and smart growth:

Participating in a UN-advocated planning process would very likely bring out many of the conspiracy-fixated groups and individuals in our society such as the National Rifle Association, citizen militias and some members of Congress. This segment of our society who fear 'one-world government' and a UN invasion of the United States through which our individual freedom would be stripped away would actively work to defeat any elected official who joined 'the conspiracy' by undertaking LA21. So, we call our process something else, such as comprehensive planning, growth management, or *smart growth* [emphasis added].

Undoubtedly, residents of any town, county, or city in the United States that treasure their freedom, liberty, and property rights couldn't care less whether it's called Agenda 21 or smart growth. A recent example of this can be found in Carroll County, Maryland, where a smart growth plan called Pathways was drafted by the County Planning Department. The plan, if enacted, proposed a breathtaking reshuffling of land rights:

- Rezoning of thousands of acres of beautiful, low-density agricultural farmland and protected residential conservation land into office parks
- Down-zoning of agriculture land to prevent future subdivision by farmers
- Up-zoning of low-density residential land around small towns into higher density zoning to permit construction of hundreds or possibly thousands of inclusive housing units, including apartments and condominiums
- Inclusive housing with placement of multi-family construction on in-fill lots within existing residential single family communities
- Endorsement of government-sponsored housing initiatives (subsidies) to ensure healthier, balanced neighborhoods

Carroll County, Maryland is one of 1,168 cities, towns, and counties worldwide that are members of the International Council for Local Environmental Initiatives (ICLEI) - Local Governments for Sustainability, which is an international association of local governments as well as national and regional local government organizations that have made a commitment to sustainable development. The ICLEI mission statement closely resembles that of Agenda 21. In fact, the ICLEI has Special Consultative Status with the UN Economic and Social Council and coordinates local government representation in the UN processes related to Agenda 21.

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
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
