1 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Madam Clerk, could
2 you please reread the Sunshine Notice?

3 MADAM CLERK: Yes, Mayor. Tuesday,
4 October 4th, 2011. Pursuant to the

6 Law, Chapter 231, Public Laws 1975,
7 notice of this meeting was published in

14 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner

16 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Here.

17 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Petracco
18 is absent/excused this evening.

19 Commissioner Evans?

20 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Here.

21 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

22 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Heree

23 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Cocchiola?

24 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Here.

25 MADAM CLERK: All present, Mayor,

1 with the exception of Commissioner
2 Petracco, who is absent/excused this
3 evening.

4 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Thank you. I'm
5 going to take one item out of order this
6 evening. I happened to, a month or so
7 ago, bump into Lou Riccardi and he told
8 me the story of what he did over the
9 summer which included going to the
10 Special Olympics in Michigan and winning
11 fifteen medals, thirteen of which were
12 gold. Two were silver, I believe.
13 That's pretty incredible, and I could not
14 wait to bring that information back to
15 the Board of Commissioners and wanted to
16 do something really special to recognize
17 Lou for his outstanding accomplishments.
18 It's really tremendous, and I'm just so
19 proud to know him and to know of him and
20 his family and what he has accomplished.

21 So, I'd like to take a moment to
22 read this resolution and we would like --
23 Lou, you can come up right after. We
24 want to take a photograph.

25 Whereas, Nutley resident Louis

1 Riccardi, Nutley High School class of
2 2008, participated in the Saginaw,
3 Michigan Area 22 Summer Special Olympics
4 of July of 2011; and whereas, Lou has
5 dedicated himself to rigorous training
6 prior to the Special Olympics by working
7 with a trainer; and whereas, once at the
8 Special Olympics, Lou participated in
9 numerous events including field sports,
10 swimming, relay swimming, archery and
11 weightlifting; and whereas, Lou performed
12 exceptionally in all of the events,
13 winning fifteen medals total, thirteen
14 gold and two silver; and whereas, Lou
15 should be recognized for his
16 accomplishments in the Saginaw, Michigan
17 Area 22 Summer Special Olympics as a role
18 model to youth in our community, state
19 and country; and whereas, Louis Riccardi
20 is commended for bringing attention to
21 the Special Olympics, an extraordinary
22 event where stereotypes about limitations
23 are overlooked, and young people with
24 disabilities can work hard to accomplish
25 great things; now, therefore be it

1 resolved, that the mayor and board of
2 commissioners of the Township of Nutley,
3 County of Essex, State of New Jersey,
4 hereby honor with great pride Louis
5 Riccardi for demonstrating that with hard
6 work and dedication, it is possible to
7 overcome obstacles and achieve
8 excellence

3 say a few words we would love to hear
4 from youe

5 (Pause for photo session)

6 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Making Nutley
7 proud once again. I should just
8 recognize also your mom and dad are here
9 this evening. So we thank you for coming
10 and we thank you for Lou. Do you want to
11 comment, Mr. Riccardi?

12 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: You're welcome.
13 It could be and so -- so are we.

14 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Great
15 achievement.

16 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Okay. Thank you.
17 Okay, we can get back to business with
18 approval of minutes.

19 MADAM CLERK: Yes, Mayor. I have
20 three sets of minutes this evening.
21 Board of Commissioner meeting minutes for
22 meetings held July 5th, July 19th, and
23 August 2nd.

24 I need a motion and a second,
25 please?

1 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Motion.

2 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Move it.

3 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: You want to

14 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Cocchiola?

16 MADAM CLERK: That's all for
17 minutes, Mayor.

18 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Thanks. We have
19 some correspondence from Holy Family, is
20 that what it is?

21 MADAM CLERK: Yes, Mayore I have an
22 item of correspondence or communication
23 from the Holy Family Church. On Friday,
24 September 23rd, they called the Town
25 Hall's office wanting to change their

1 festival dates due to the weather, and I
2 wanted the record to reflect the dates
3 I did call the entire board on Friday
4 afternoon and did receive approval.

5 The dates were changed to Thursday,
6 September 29th, Friday, September 30th,
7 and Saturday, October 1st. And I wanted
8 to read it into the record.

9 And that's all for communications,
10 Mayor.

11 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Thank you

12 Okay, Commissioner Evans -- reports?

13 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes, I have a
14 report for the code enforcement
15 department for the period April of 2011
16 through June 2011.

17 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Thank you

18 Bills, Madam Clerk?

19 MADAM CLERK: Yes, Mayore Bills of
20 Tuesday, October 4th:

23 from that figure we are removing --

24 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Evelyn, excuse
25 me. You don't have to remove it.

1 (inaudible) -- regular item --

2 (inaudible).

3 MADAM CLERK: Thank you,

4 Commissioner.

5 Revenue & Finance \$2,983,491.77,

6 Public Safety \$35,835.83,

7 Public Works \$94,454.84,

8 Parks & Public Property \$559,099.42,

9 Payroll as of September 30th,

10 \$705,469.31, for a grand total bill list

11 of \$4,512,013.77.

12 And that's all for bills, Mayor.

13 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: So move.

14 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Second.

15 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner

16 Scarpelli?

17 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Aye.

18 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

19 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye.

20 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

21 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

22 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Cocchiola?

23 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Aye.

24 MADAM CLERK: Thank you, Mayor.

25 Commissioner Evans, for

1 introduction?

2 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I have an
3 ordinance for introduction which I'll
4 read by title number 3180, an ordinance
5 to amend an ordinance codified in the
6 code of the Township of Nutley, Chapter
7 228, entitled Vehicles and Traffic,
8 particularly vehicles -- Article VII,
9 Section 29A, to add locations set forth
10 therein, for handicapped parking.

11 I move that this ordinance be passed
12 to a second reading and advertised in the
13 Nutley Sun together with a notice
14 required by law and that further
15 consideration of said ordinance for final
16 passage by the Board of Commissioners be
17 held at its second reading on November
18 1st, 2011. So --

19 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Second.

20 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner
21 Scarpelli?

22 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Aye.

23 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Evans?

24 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Aye

25 MADAM CLERK: Commissioner Tucci?

1 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Aye.

2 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Cocchiola?

3 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Aye.

4 And you have a public hearing?

5 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes.

6 Thank you, Mayor. We have a public
7 hearing tonight on ordinance number 3178
8 which is to add a handicapped parking
9 spot on Howard Place in Nutley.

10 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: This matter was
11 continued from September 20th, 2011, so
12 any member of the public that would like
13 to address the board this evening?

14 MR. SCAPERADA: Phil Scaperada
15 (ph.), 49 Howard Place.

16 MS. ANDO: Cathy Ando (ph.), 49
17 Howard Place.

18 MR. SCAPERADA: Apologies to
19 Commissioner Scarpelli and Mayor
20 Cocchiola. Some things may be repetitive
21 due to the absences of Commissioner Tucci
22 and Commissioner Evans.

23 We are speaking out against this
24 handicapped spot for a few reasons which
25 I will address shortly, but there's -- we

1 are disturbed since the last meeting. I
2 have now come to find out, and we realize
3 that this process is flawed and lacks
4 oversight.

5 According to Mr. Barry -- I want to
6 cover some key points before I go into
7 our reasons against -- Mr. Barry, he did
8 not verify the placard to see if it was
9 legitimate and had a valid expiration
10 date until after it was questioned. I
11 want to thank Mr. Harkins for providing
12 us with information and a prompt response
13 that we had requested. Thank you.

14 With that in mind, none of the
15 commissioners and the mayor has the
16 application, photos, and detailed
17 explanation on why Mr. Barry approved
18 this application. Commissioner Scarpelli
19 and Mayor Cocchiola still have the
20 picture that I submitted to you?

21 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: I don't have it
22 with me tonight, but I saw the picture.

23 MR. SCAPERADA: Okay. Do you have
24 an application?

25 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: I don't think --

1 MR. SCAPERADA: No? Okaye

2 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: -- but we -- Mr.
3 Scaperada, we wouldn't normally see that
4 in -- on a day-to-day basis anyway

5 MR. SCAPERADA: Okaye That is --
6 we're just pointing out that this is a
7 problem issue, and also the fact that the
8 commissioners and the mayor are not
9 required to inspect the sitee We are
10 disturbed by it because of the fact that
11 you are blindly voting on an important
12 issue without being properly informede
13 The process needs to change and model
14 that of the zoning board process for a
15 variancnee When I applied for a variance,
16 I had to submit eleven applications,
17 photos, and any other supporting
18 documentation in which the zoning board
19 would go and review the site itself and I
20 had to make a presentation. I feel that
21 is a model that should be adopted in the
22 future.

23 The reasons we're against it is
24 first, upon review, the application --
25 the reason for the handicapped space, the

1 applicant indicates the need for a flat
2 surface due to the inability to enter and
3 exit a vehicle on a sloped driveway.

4 This is the only reason that was given on
5 the application that I received. With
6 this reason given, the inspector failed
7 to evaluate and perform the proper
8 analysis or testing of the applicant's
9 property, which I'll explain shortly.

10 Second reason is the misuse of
11 public resources and money because of the
12 improper evaluation.

13 And, thirdly, I'm speaking on behalf
14 of my mother, who was paralyzed and
15 confined to a bed and a wheelchair for
16 twenty years, in which I was a caregiver.

17 It is great that there are amenities
18 that are forwarded to the handicapped
19 today to help improve their lives, but
20 oversight is needed to make sure that the
21 process is administered correctly. My
22 wife had a few questions -- I noticed Mr.
23 Barry was still here that were unanswered
24 from the last meeting. If you can, ask
25 Mr. Barry.

1 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Mr. Barry, are you
2 available?

3 MR. SCAPERADA: -- on this
4 inspection process?

5 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Up here, please.

6 MS. ANDO: When we were here two
7 weeks ago, I guess, my husband --

8 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Excuse me,
9 just -- I'm sorry. Before you do thate
10 Jack, would you enter your name into the
11 record and also could you also include in
12 the record your years of experience and
13 qualifications?

14 MR. BARRY: My name is John Barry.
15 I'm the traffic safety coordinator for
16 the Township of Nutleye I've been
17 employed by the township since September
18 6th, 1972. I was a police officer for
19 twenty-seven years, approximately twenty
20 of them I served as a traffic control --
21 a traffic safety officer, and I've held
22 the capacity of traffic safety
23 coordinator since 1999.

24 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Thank you.

25 MS. ANDO: These questions I think

1 are -- when we were here two weeks ago,
2 my husband had asked you a series of
3 questions so I'd like to kind of add to
4 some of the questions that were asked of
5 you two weeks agoe

6 When you went to the applicant's
7 house to review her application with her,
8 and (indiscernible)e, was she parked in
9 the garage or was she parked at the top
10 of her driveway?

11 MR. BARRY: I don't know if that's
12 relevante The question might -- my
13 review was merely the physical
14 observations that I made of the propertye

15 MS. ANDO: But this person indicated
16 that they had a need to park in the
17 street in front of their house -- that
18 they were unable to exit --

19 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: You knowe Let me
20 interject here, because I don't think it
21 should be that, you know, you ask him a
22 question.

23 Mr. Barry, let me ask youe Why
24 don't you just go through the process
25 that you through when you receive an

1 application and how you make a
2 determinatione

3 MR. BARRYe When people contact my
4 office in reference to a handi@apped -- a
5 request for a handi@apped parking space,
6 I immediately send them an information
7 letter that quotes the statute that says
8 that the munic@ipality may -- may install
9 the handi@apped spot at the request of
10 the citizene Two, a brief synopsis of
11 the ADA requirements -- they, for
12 example, they cannot be put on slopes
13 over two (break in audio) and that it
14 can't be put in locations that would
15 be -- otherwis@e be prohib@ited by lawe

16 I also instruct them that in order
17 to get -- to file their applicati@on, they
18 must have a valid New Jersey handi@apped
19 placard or identification card that on
20 that card lists the address as the same
21 as where they're re --

22 In this particular case, the lady
23 came into my offic@e I gave her the
24 applicati@on. She (indiscernible)e, she
25 gave me a copy of the valid ID card and

1 her application which included the
2 reasons on why she needed the
3 handicapped --

4 Contrary to what the gentleman said
5 before about me not checking beforehand,
6 that's not the case. Before I do
7 anything, I make sure I get the copy of
8 the valid ID card before I even go out
9 and look at (indiscernible).

10 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: I think that was a
11 question that arose at the last hearing
12 and that should be the answer to that
13 question.

14 MR. BARRY: After I receive the
15 documentation, I visit each site, I take
16 a look at it, and I make a judgment call
17 because nothing is finite (ph.). You
18 know, I tend to err on the side of the --
19 or not err, but I tend to go in favor of
20 citizens when it's a question of well,
21 yes, it could be, yes, it couldn't be.
22 You know, you take everything into
23 consideration -- the locations, the age
24 of the person, the handicap, what the
25 requests are, and then I view the entire

1 areae

2 And if I give my opinion and it's
3 appropriate, I mark out, I measure for
4 the appropriate ordinance, and then I
5 forward it to (inaudible).

6 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Could I ask you
7 a question, Mayor? Thank youe Mr.
8 Barry, we spoke earlier today because I
9 wasn't at the last meeting so I didn't
10 hear the conversation, and I do have some
11 picturese I don't know if these are the
12 pictures you were referring to. I have
13 reviewed them, and I've read all the
14 information that I do havee

15 Jack, can you tell me whether or not
16 the applicant meets all the criteria to
17 get a handicapped parking space in front
18 of her house?

19 MR. BARRY: Yese

20 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Okaye And then
21 is there -- and again, just for my
22 edificatiion, is there anything in the law
23 that speaks to a driveway or other
24 conditions that have to be met before a
25 space on the street can be granted?

1 MR. BARRY: One of the primary
2 conditions (inaudible) driveway is that
3 it's -- a flat surface. If the driveway
4 exceeds too (inaudible) a grade, then
5 obviously let's not take this particular
6 application but any application. You
7 can't have a handicapped spot on a hill.
8 Somebody get out with a wheelchair,
9 they'd roll down the hill. If the
10 wheelchair and then try to get in it, it
11 could roll away -- so ADA distinctly says
12 a -- more than two percent is out.

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Right. And
14 obviously, you're recommending this so
15 this exceeds the two percent grade?

16 MR. BARRY: Yes. Did I
17 physically -- did I get out and measure
18 it and do the calculations? No. My
19 experience tells me that's at least a
20 four percent grade.

21 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Is there any
22 reason why this application should be
23 denied?

24 MR. BARRY: Not that I'm aware of.

25 MALE SPEAKER: -- and that you're

1 aware of.

2 (Break in audio)

3 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Mayor, if I
4 might? Jack, can I ask one more
5 question? And I don't know if this is a
6 relevant question. I'm sure Mr. Harkins
7 will correct me if I'm wrong.

8 How old is this applicant?

9 MR. BARRY: Counselor, am I allowed
10 to say that?

11 MR. HARKINS: Yeah, I think it's
12 part of the application.

13 MR. BARRY: She's eighty-seven years
14 old.

15 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: And does she
16 have difficulty walking? Does she use a
17 walker? Does she use a cane?

18 MR. BARRY: She's been certified by
19 a doctor to the State of New Jersey that
20 she's a handicapped individual and has
21 (inaudible).

22 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Thank you.

23 MR. SCAPERADA: As continuing, we
24 contest this on the grounds that there is
25 an ability to park four cars in the

1 driveway and one on a flat surface in the
2 garage -- safest spot from snow, rain,
3 ice, cold and heat is right where the
4 applicant parks, which is in the garage
5 where the applicant enters the house.

6 This is what the applicant used to
7 do with their spouse, who was handicapped
8 with a walker. No one else lives there
9 and there are no other vehicles

10 In referring to the pictures, I
11 would like to resubmit the pictures. I
12 want to explain some additional detail.
13 Commissioner Tucci has pictures;
14 Commissioner Evans doesn't, I believe.
15 Mr. Scarpelli, do you need one? And the
16 Mayor, here. Miss, give this to Mr.
17 Scarpelli and Mayor.

18 First, I'd like to read the code
19 that was given to me by Mr. Barry and
20 then explain the picture if I could find
21 it. Bear with me.

22 On the handicapped parking spaces,
23 4-6-2 stated under location, accessible
24 parking spaces serving a particular
25 building shall be located on the shortest

1 accessible route of travel from adjacent
2 parking to an adjacent entrance. And
3 then 4-6-3, parking spaces -- accessible
4 parking spaces shall be at least ninety-
5 six inches wide.

6 In looking at this picture, garage
7 doors are a standard eight-feet wide.
8 This garage door is a standard eight-foot
9 wide garage; therefore, it's ninety-six
10 inches wide. That alone meets the
11 minimum requirement of a handicapped
12 parking space.

13 Now, in looking at the photo, I have
14 a similar house. I have two feet from
15 the exterior wall to where the garage
16 begins, including the thickness of the
17 wall. This garage is slightly bigger.
18 If you scale this photo down from the
19 eight-foot garage and measure that in
20 comparison to the exterior wall on in,
21 and take away another twelve inches of
22 the width of the wall on the inside,
23 you're going to have about three feet.
24 That constitutes thirty-six inches.

25 An Audi A4 is seventy-two inches

1 widee You take seventy-two inches from
2 ninety-six, that leaves you with twenty-
3 four inches. That's twelve inches per
4 side. Add the thirty-six inches of the
5 additional width within the garage. I
6 contacted Audi USA out in Oregon, and
7 Cindy (ph.) a customer service rep, in
8 consultation with a technician -- the
9 Audi A4 door opened to its fullest extent
10 extends out thirty inchese So therefore,
11 thirty-six inches and twelve, that's
12 about forty what? Eight. Therefore,
13 with the door fully extended and open,
14 there is no obstruction within the garage
15 for entering and exiting.

16 Therefore, this space in the garage
17 is ample parking that meets all the
18 requirements and then some. Furthermore,
19 should the garage door fail for whatever
20 reason, this driveway is over eighteen
21 feet wide. From my understanding, no
22 one's allowed to park in front of
23 someone's driveway except the homeowners
24 So should the garage be stuck, they could
25 just park right in front of their own

1 aprone There's no reason to take away
2 street from the public.

3 And, thirdly, what else I would like
4 to mention is the fact that as living
5 there since 2004, we have witnessed every
6 single evening the vehicle is parked in
7 for the night one hundred percent of the
8 time with the garage door shut. So,
9 therefore, the access is definitely
10 feasible to inside the house. During the
11 daytime hours the vehicle is in the
12 driveway or in the garage; it is never
13 parked in the street. Thirdly, I don't
14 know if Mr. Barry knows that the
15 applicant had also complained about
16 flooding of the sidewalk in front of
17 their stairs and stating that it freezes.
18 Mr. Barry is here and he can verify that.

19 This is a very important picture
20 because this is an obstacle that the
21 person would have to come upon, upon
22 going to their front stairs in inclement
23 weather. This photo says a lot because
24 the applicant, where age is not
25 a factor -- my mother was handicapped at

1 age forty, my brother's mother-in-law is
2 ninety-three~~e~~ drives a car and babysi~~s~~
3 her grandkidse It's irrelevant, the
4 age -- has no factor.

5 This individual is walking down on a
6 wet slope in the rain. Mr. Barry was
7 there~~e~~ but the most important factor is
8 this vehicle is not parked in the
9 street -- never parked in the street.

10 And then I'd like to conclude --
11 although Mr. Barry is approving this, I
12 would hope he would do the right thing
13 and withdraw and deny this applicati~~o~~n
14 from being voted on, the commissi~~o~~ners
15 and the mayor should not be subj~~e~~cted to
16 voting on an issue that was not properly
17 reviewed and analyzed.

18 This is an insult and an injustice
19 and a disservice to the Nutley citizens
20 who pay for the services that are not
21 being properly monitored and not being
22 properly administratede I ask the
23 commissioners and the mayor to show the
24 citizens of Nutley your awareness to
25 these oversights and misuse of public

1 resources and money and vote no to this
2 ordinance.

3 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Therefore, let me
4 ask you a question.

5 MR. SCAPERADA: Thank you.

6 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: I'm going to ask
7 you a question now. Eighty-five-year-old
8 woman who is disabled and handicapped
9 according to the laws of the State of New
10 Jersey applies for a -- one spot in front
11 of her home to be marked out for a
12 disabled persone How does that impact
13 you? Is it that you need that spot to
14 park your cars in or what -- what is
15 causing you to have done this much
16 research on an elderly woman needing a
17 handicapped spot? I'm looking at the
18 front of her house and I guess -- and I
19 know that this is your house next to her?

20 MR. SCAPERADA: That is correcte

21 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Two very well-
22 maintained homes right next to each
23 othere If that spot is carved out as a
24 handicapped spot, how does that impact
25 you? Is it because you need it? You

1 need to park in front of -- I'm trying to
2 get --

3 MR. SCAPERADA: Well, several
4 reasonse It's a misuse of public fundse
5 And, first of all, it's an over -- the
6 process is flawed. It's an oversight on
7 the processe How could you vote on
8 something blindly that you have no
9 information about?

10 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: No, what I heard
11 from an expert --

12 MR. SCAPERADA: But you're relyi@g
13 on -- I don't mean to debate you, but
14 you're relying on one individuale where it
15 clearly shows the accessibility is in the
16 garagee It's one hundred percent cleare
17 it's not even close like it's, you know,
18 three inches and the door's touchi@g the
19 walle It's -- it's been in use this way
20 for yearse

21 Secondly, due to the fact that I was
22 a caregiver for twenty years and I've
23 seen -- excuse me?

24 MS. ANDO: Go aheade

25 MR. SCAPERADA: -- I've seen the

1 abuses of people. And more importantly,
2 I've been in fact affected and impacted
3 by the conduct of the services provided
4 under another department and it just so
5 happens this fell right into our lap.
6 And I'm really dissatisfied with services
7 that are being applied incorrectly. I've
8 been impacted once, and now I'm seeing it
9 in another area and it strikes a nerve
10 with me because, as I stated, I had a
11 mother who was handicapped.

12 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: But are you
13 relating this to some other issue that
14 you have that might be bothering you?
15 Because, you know --

16 MR. SCAPERADA: No.

17 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: -- factually
18 speaking, if you were a trier of fact or
19 a hearing officer or a judge or whatever,
20 and you listened to someone who I would
21 consider a certified expert in their
22 field, say this complies with what the
23 State of New Jersey says it has to, I've
24 investigated this, I'm the person who has
25 the background in doing this. I work for

1 someone who's reviewed this, I'm
2 knowledgeable, I'm the person who is
3 supposed to make this determination and I
4 made this determination -- why would --
5 who are we to second guess that? I mean,
6 that's --

7 MR. SCAPERADA: But you -- you're
8 all intelligent people that can see
9 something that the individual may note
10 You can ask questions that are important
11 and it also can (indiscernible) oversight
12 to the situation.

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: That's why we
14 hold a public hearing -- do we?

15 Mr. Harkins, I have a question. If
16 we were to deny this, are we opening
17 ourselves up to a suit for not
18 accommodating somebody through the ADA
19 where looking for an accommodation?

20 MR. HARKINS: Potentially I think we
21 are because I think based on the facts
22 that Mr. Barry set forth, we have a
23 handicapped placard, the grade of the
24 driveway, all the different factors that
25 Mr. Barry spoke about, and when we

1 consider his experience and expertise --
2 his years of experience -- I think it's
3 up to you to rely on his best judgment to
4 some extent. You're here, you have a
5 public hearing, you hear opposition,
6 that's fine, but I think you have to take
7 everything into consideration and I think
8 some deference has to be given to Mr.
9 Barry's testimony.

10 I mean -- and I think, look, I
11 mean, you have expressed some ongoing
12 problems with your neighbors. I don't
13 think this governing body is here to pick
14 sides.

15 MR. SCAPERADA: We -- we did not
16 mention any ongoing problems. We're here
17 specifically for the interpretation of
18 the code --

19 MR. HARKINS: I understand that.

20 MR. SCAPERADA: -- and the services
21 that are being provided by the Township
22 of Nutley that we support.

23 MR. HARKINS: But there are ongoing
24 problems and they're not here to pick
25 sides (indiscernible).

1 MR. SCAPERADA: It's irrelevant just
2 as the age is irrelevant.

3 MR. HARKINS: That's fine. But I
4 just think that, you know, we have Mr.
5 Barry here and he works here for a
6 reason. These are fairly routine
7 requests and he's very good at what he
8 does. And you make your judgments based
9 on what you've heard.

10 MS. ANDO: I'd like to just say
11 something, too. When we were here two
12 weeks ago, I think Mr. Barry indicated
13 that if the person had the capacity to
14 park in their garage and there was
15 adequate parking that complied with the
16 requirements of the ADA and whatnot, that
17 he would more than likely not approve a
18 spot -- a designated handicapped spot?

19 MALE SPEAKER: That's correct.

20 MS. ANDO: And in response to the
21 mayor, what impact does it have to us?
22 It does impact us. We live in the
23 neighborhood, we have visitors that come
24 to see us and visit us at our house, and
25 if they're taking away street parking

1 where other people cannot park and it's
2 unnecessary, then I don't understand why
3 it would be approved.

4 MR. SCAPERADA: I have an elderly
5 father. She has elderly parents. When
6 they visit from (indiscernible) New York,
7 (inaudible) go both wayse

8 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Well, how many --
9 Mr. Barry, how many spots are in front of
10 this home? Is there room for a
11 handicapped and another in front of this
12 house?

13 MS. ANDO: It's just -- there's
14 only --

15 MR. BARRY: For clarification, there
16 was a statement that was made that's not
17 true. The gentleman stated that this
18 would be removing parking from the
19 public. That's one of the conditions of
20 all of our parking -- our handicapped
21 parking that applies to everybody.

22 This space is not for that
23 individual person. Anyone with a
24 handicapped parking placard can park in
25 any handicapped spot on their (inaudible)

1 don't -- we don't privatize them, as some
2 towns do, but we haven't -- we've never
3 done that just for that reason because we
4 (inaudible) that's my spot

5 The years I've been doing it we've
6 never had a problem with that.

7 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Let me ask you
8 another question. I think I can recall
9 being up here passing ordinances where we
10 remove handicapped spots. Do you have
11 like an ongoing monitoring process that
12 you check these spots and you -- when
13 it's time to remove them, you remove
14 them? How does that work?

15 MR. BARRY: Well, I don't check the
16 obituaries, but about six months, I did
17 send letters out to everybody that has a
18 current handicapped spot. And we did a
19 review, we eliminated about eight or
20 (inaudible) on the books that were no
21 longer (inaudible). I don't take them
22 out and put them in (inaudible) places.

23 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: And if, as Mr.
24 Scaperada said, if that spot is never
25 used, is that a reason to remove it or

1 not?

2 MR. BARRY: As long as the applicant
3 still resides there -- the issue for a
4 garage, in my opinion, is irrelevant,
5 because if she tries to do something with
6 her garage -- use it for storage, put her
7 lawn mover in there, and she can get her
8 vehicle in there, that's her choice.

9 But, again, based on the -- all the
10 information that I received, I made
11 (inaudible), I approved that application.

12 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Mr. Barry, just
13 a question. Based upon the points that
14 were raised by Phil Scaperada and
15 (inaudible), have you heard anything that
16 you would suggest to the board of
17 commissioners that your views on this
18 spot have changed in any way that would
19 cause us to basically amend this
20 application for any reason?

21 (Break in audio)

22 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Anything else, Mr.
23 Scaperada?

24 MR. SCAPERADA: May I ask you to
25 just review the words that Mr. Harkins

1 said, even though he is an expert, you
2 should consider it. It doesn't mean it's
3 a hundred percent and it's a hundred
4 percent correct. I ask you to do the
5 right thing for the citizens of Nutleye

6 Thank you.

7 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Is there anyone
8 else who would like to respect the board
9 with respect to this ordinance, which is
10 ordinance 3178?

11 Yes?

12 MR. CAPRIGLIONE: I'd like to
13 compliment the Board of Commissioners --
14 applicant, speaking as a veteran, I'm so
15 proud to be here this evening to see
16 freedom at work. And this is what our
17 services fought for and I'm here this
18 evening to see the -- at eighty-seven,
19 I'm here to see that freedom of speech is
20 being exercised.

21 Thank you.

22 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: That was Mr.

25 What's your house number? Mr.

1 Capriglione? House number -- your house
2 number on Whitford?

14 business portion of our meeting.

15 Is there any member of the public
16 that would like to address the board on
17 any other matter?

18 All persons addressing the Board of
19 Commissioners regarding community
20 concerns should approach the microphone
21 and provide their name and address for
22 the record. Unless further time is
23 granted by the board, each person shall
24 limit their comments to five minutes.
25 All remarks to the board and its

1 individual members must be addressed to
2 the mayor; the mayor may defer citizen
3 comments to the appropriate member of the
4 board. Dialogue between citizens and
5 others addressing the board shall be
6 allowed unless the mayor or presiding
7 officer or the majority of the membership
8 of the board, shall determine that the
9 interests of decorum and/or the
10 expeditious conduct of municipal
11 business, are being adversely affected by
12 such dialogue.

13 Mr. Scaperada?

14 MR. SCAPERADA: Phil Scaperada, 49
15 Howard Place.

16 MS. ANDO: Cathy Ando, 49 Howard
17 Place.

18 MR. SCAPERADA: We addressed
19 Commissioner Evans with such issues at a
20 prior meeting and then he wasn't present
21 at the last one. And we'd like to
22 address a couple unanswered issues to
23 Commissioner Evans.

24 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Okay.

25 MR. SCAPERADA: Mr. Evans, I was

1 written up for a violation for water
2 emitting through my weeping tube. I
3 fought this vigorously and requested
4 test -- a test on my pipe at least twice.
5 No one wanted to do it. Finally, it was
6 done. Mr. Berry is here now. He tested
7 the pipe with my neighbor present who
8 reported the violation, the alleged
9 violation. In front of the individual
10 who reported the violation, he stated
11 that we put a hose in it and indicated
12 that it is not a violation to my
13 neighbors. Yesterday, he indicated to you
14 that no water's coming out of the pipe,
15 so therefore that pipe is not in
16 violation.

17 My question to you is, when can we
18 receive in writing that the violation has
19 been ruled invalid and included on public
20 record?

21 COMMISSIONER EVANS: You -- one,
22 thank you for your commentary; two, David
23 Berry is here, he's our construction
24 official, and it's my understanding that
25 that violation will be (inaudible). You

1 should receive that in writing this week

2 MR. SCAPERADA: Thank you

3 Other issues that I pointed out to
4 you when you visited my house -- with
5 regards to a garbage can, you stated to
6 Mr. Berry to find out what Joe Petty
7 (ph.) is doing about it. A violation was
8 written in 2009 for debris and a garbage
9 can that was purposely put back after the
10 violation was issued. It was moved away
11 and then put back and it was sitting
12 there since 2000 -- April 2000 of --
13 2010e We haven't made any claims -- or
14 complaints, I should say And finally we
15 reported it to Dave Berry

16 Joe Petty eventually came out and
17 stated to my neighbor why the garbage can
18 is there and the debris in which I
19 witnessed it, because I was building my
20 front stairs -- she stated that until he
21 moves his garbage cans in his driveway,
22 which Joe Petty said are legal, then I
23 will move these garbage canse

24 And I would like to know what has
25 Mr. Berry found out and told you with

1 regards to writing a violation and taking
2 the individual to court, as the violation
3 stipulates for a repeated offense?

4 COMMISSIONER EVANS: The matter of
5 the garbage can -- David, you're here, so
6 would you please step forward?

7 MR. BERRY: Dave Berry with the
8 Township of Nutley, code enforcement
9 department.

10 COMMISSIONER EVANS: David, you I
11 know follow up on this. This is a matter
12 with the health department, but I know
13 you contacted Mr. Petty, so please
14 (inaudible) find out?

15 MR. BERRY: In reference to the
16 garbage can that is in the front side of
17 the address on 45 Howard Place, my
18 office, the code enforcement department,
19 with Joe Petty, the health inspector,
20 conducted an inspection on September 12th
21 and determined that today the garbage can
22 is not in violation, as it is placed on a
23 sidewalk adjacent to the side of her
24 home.

25 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Mr. Berry, where

1 is the garbage can that's in question?

2 I'm looking at the picture of her home.

3 MR. BERRY: Did I show you a
4 picture?

5 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Oh, you have a
6 picture of where the garbage can is? I'm
7 looking at the other picture that we got
8 with the care I don't get what the issue
9 is heree

10 MR. SCAPERADA: I'd like to provide
11 you, Mayor, with some of the pictures
12 There's objects we complained about when
13 the hurricane was approaching -- we were
14 concerned.

15 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: This upside-down
16 garbage can? This is the garbage cane
17 That's the side of her house --

18 MR. BERRY: That's where she
19 placed --

20 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Where she leaves
21 her cans and then she moves them out to
22 the -- this is not a violation, you're
23 saying?

24 MR. SCAPERADA: Again, we're
25 subjected to the moods of the handicapped

1 person for placing objects intermittently
2 over a duration of time. I was written
3 up for a violation for the garbage can in
4 the front of the bush, stating by Mr.
5 Thenell (ph.) that it was blight.

6 MR. BERRY: At the time the
7 violation was written to Mr. Scaperado,
8 the garbage can that we witnessed the
9 picture was on his lawn, and that's the
10 reason why a violation was issued.

11 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Mayor,
12 I think --

13 MR. BERRY: This picture shows that
14 the garbage can is on the slab, on the
15 sidewalk slab.

16 COMMISSIONER EVANS: So, this simply
17 stated is per your inspection and with
18 Joe Petty, who is responsible for this,
19 is the garbage can in a spot where it's
20 in violation?

21 FEMALE SPEAKER: There's not --
22 okaye

23 MR. BERRY: Well, as I said, the
24 garbage can is not in violation todaye

25 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Thank you.

1 MR. HARKINS: Mayor, if I could just
2 interject for a second. I think -- you
3 know, we want to extend every courtesy to
4 citizens who want to speak here, but I
5 think -- you know, we have to be careful.
6 We're not conducting hearings here
7 regarding things that have already
8 been -- maybe brought to court or
9 litigated or things that potentially
10 could be brought to court or litigated.

11 You know, speaking for myself, I'm
12 not an expert on a lot of these code
13 enforcement type of issues, and maybe
14 none of you are either. And we can
15 certainly extend courtesy to folks to
16 come up and, you know, express their
17 opinions and their views, but I don't
18 think we should get into some sort of
19 inquisition regarding placement of
20 garbage cans and things like that. Those
21 will and should be handled through the
22 code people --

23 COMMISSIONER EVANSe Great.

24 MR. HARKINS: -- and, you know, if
25 there's a violation that will go to

1 court.

2 MR. SCAPERADA: Mr. Harkins, I'm
3 here because we don't get prompt
4 responses from like July 28th.

5 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: It sounds to me
6 that there's -- your issues are being
7 responded to though, Mr. Scaperada,
8 correct?

9 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And that's just
10 the reason for (inaudible) is that, I ask
11 Mr. Berry to be here tonight because I
12 wanted to make sure that your questions
13 were being addressed. So, you -- as far
14 as the garbage can, as the code official
15 and as the health inspector did what he
16 did -- needed to do, it's my
17 understanding that the current placement
18 of that garbage can is not in violation.

19 MR. HARKINS: And I don't mean to
20 suggest if Mr. Scaperada has a problem
21 that we're slow in addressing things -- I
22 mean, that's fine. He can come and speak
23 to that. I just don't think we should
24 get into a hearing on, you know, where a
25 garbage can is located and whether that's

1 appropriate. That's something more left
2 to Mr. Berry and his (indiscernible).

3 MR. SCAPERADA: I make -- I make
4 requests for codes and so forth, and I
5 just -- it's two years for a code. I
6 just don't get responses. I have to come
7 to public meetings to finally get
8 responses. That shouldn't be the
9 services that are to be provided. What
10 do I have to do?

11 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Mr. Scaperada,
12 Commissioner Evans -- I'm going to just
13 ask that maybe you meet with Mr.
14 Scaperada separately because we do have
15 other people that want to address the
16 board this evening and I think that --

17 MR. SCAPERADA: I apologize to
18 everybody.

19 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: -- you'll make
20 yourself available, Commissioner Evans?
21 You --

22 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Absolutely.

23 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: It sounds like,
24 Mr. Berry, you have made yourself
25 available? I thank you.

1 MR. BERRY: Absolutely.

2 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Okay. Thank you.

3 MR. CAPRIGLIONE: My name is Anthony
4 Capriglione, 143 Whitford Avenue. I
5 guess they save the best for the last.

6 You want to make my presentation,
7 Mayor. I have something here that would
8 go nicely with your Italian Heritage
9 Month. I have a list of twenty-five
10 Italian American recipients of the
11 Congressional Medal of Honor: one, World
12 War One, twelve, World War Two, six,
13 Vietnam, and believe it or not, two,
14 Civil War and two, Korean. I'd like to
15 give this -- make a copy of it if you
16 wish to use it in the Italian Heritage
17 Month, it would be a good idea.

18 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: I'll take a look
19 at it.

20 Thank you, Mr. Capriglione.

21 MR. CAPRIGLIONE: I have two
22 important things on the agenda, if you'll
23 bear with me. One, I wish -- I'd like to
24 share with you a letter I received from
25 the mayor.

1 While we're very quick to criticize
2 and in my -- in the past decade, I no
3 longer speak (indiscernible)e. I got this
4 letter; I'd like to share the letter that
5 Mayor Cocchiola wrote to me: Dear Tony,
6 Seeing you in a parade reminded me to
7 follow up with you. I just want to make
8 sure I tell you that I'm so moved by your
9 love and devotion for your country and
10 for the township. I recently read some
11 old articles that my dad had and saw how
12 active you have been in our town -- town,
13 all for the good of the town. Honorable
14 men like you are hard to find these days.
15 Thank you. Include me in your flag
16 distribution for your caring so much so
17 (indiscernible)e

18 Now, my response was: Dear Joanne,
19 Thank you for your letter dated May 31st,
20 2014 (sic)e. Needless to say, your
21 confidence and appreciation was most
22 heartwarming. In my years of life, and
23 my eighty-seven years of life -- I was
24 eighty-six then but now I turned in July
25 eighty-seven -- eighty-seven years of

1 life I figured to (indiscernible) -- I
2 don't like to consider myself a war hero
3 The real heroes are the men who gave up
4 their lives and those veterans are at
5 peace with God now. They are the heroes.
6 My respect and admiration go out to you
7 and your (indiscernible) concerns. We
8 veterans applaud you right. Stay
9 forward. Actually, congratulations on
10 your courageous job you are doing as the
11 mayor of Nutley. The residents and the
12 town constituents are very proud of your
13 accomplishments. Good luck to you and to
14 the many many more years to come. Be
15 the very best that life has to offer. You
16 deserve. Thank you for being my
17 neighbor.

18 Always remember, it's not the
19 distance it matters, it's the first step
20 that counts. And I want -- I thank you
21 as my neighbor and I all -- and I'd like
22 to put it in, in that old cliché, old
23 Chinese proverb, learn from whoever you
24 want. Copy no one. And the second
25 Chinese proverb is, you never climb a

1 ladder of success with your hands in your
2 pocket.

3 Now I go on to my -- and thank you,
4 Joanne.

5 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Thank you. My
6 colleagues, I'm sure, join me in thanking
7 you for all your many years of service in
8 this community, Mr. Capriglione. Thank
9 you.

10 MR. CAPRIGLIONE: My second thing is
11 the most important thing. I need to
12 count on your help once again. Eight or
13 nine years ago, I had a personal fight
14 with the post office in Newark. I wrote
15 to the postmaster -- or rather in
16 Nutley -- I wrote to the postmaster
17 general and I wrote to the postmaster in
18 Newark, postmaster in Belleville,
19 (indiscernible) poor conditions in the
20 post office in Nutley. In my -- at that
21 time, I assume everybody experienced the
22 same thing.

23 Until I get -- I don't know whether
24 it was you, Joanne, or the -- by the
25 board intervened, so once you

1 intervened -- and I hate politics but I
2 had to go it -- you wrote a nice letter
3 to the postmaster general in Washington
4 or somebody there, and ever since then,
5 things have changed in that post office
6 as you would see. And it's not the best,
7 but it was hundred -- fifty percent
8 better than what it was.

9 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: We're lucky we
10 still have a post office, too.

11 MR. CAPRIGLIONE: And that's why --
12 that's why I come before you now with
13 another problem where I need your help.
14 I've been active in the AMVETS, when I
15 say active, it's over sixty plus years
16 active. I attended every meeting and I
17 held national office and held a state
18 office and all kinds of post office
19 (ph.) And you say to yourself, one of
20 the questions they would ask, why are you
21 here by yourself? Why aren't AMVETS here
22 with you? Well, because of the
23 conditions and because of our age,
24 (indiscernible) as offices to national
25 and state and local, we had 392 members

1 in AMVETS. Now, we're down to sixty-
2 eight, I think, or seven -- I'm not --

3 It seems that (indiscernible) and we
4 did -- we get no one other than one, two,
5 three, four people. Very discouraging
6 and right now, the AMVETS -- they're
7 concerned who are not (indiscernible)
8 some income to offset the cost of
9 their -- to maintain their building and
10 its membership programs.

11 Now, that's why I'm here for help
12 and now, as I told you, I am on the Essex
13 County Veterans Committee. I sat on the
14 committee to rename the Essex County --
15 the Essex County courthouse name,
16 Veterans Courthouse, and also the first
17 park in Newark in eighty-nine years,
18 2009, the Veterans Memorial Park. And we
19 got that the naming after veterans.

20 And at that time, I spoke to Joe, I
21 says, I told him my (discernible) and
22 what happened. My late wife is buried in
23 Glendale Cemetery and about five or six
24 years ago, I happened to be out there to
25 make a visit the veterans area, where

1 they put the flags up on Memorial Day. I
2 was shocked to see the condition of that
3 area there. All stones were unturned,
4 all walkways were all cracked. I
5 immediately went down to the
6 superintendent, which is Ms. Glenda
7 Cavanaugh (ph.), who happened to be --
8 became very close friends of mine because
9 of my frequent visits to the cemetery,
10 and I said, you ought to be ashamed of
11 yourself to let that veterans go in that
12 area. She said, Mr. Capriglione
13 (indiscernible). We do not own it.
14 Essex County owns it. Essex County owns
15 all our property. And that's
16 (indiscernible) about the problem. Tight
17 after the dedication on the Veterans
18 Memorial park, we will look into it.

19 Shortly thereafter the dedication,
20 and assistant, and we met with the board
21 of directors of the cemetery, and also
22 with the board -- and also with the group
23 of Essex County. And since then, that's
24 all --

25 Two years ago, (indiscernible) and

1 writing, no response. Finally, on August
2 30th, I sent a letter -- I faxed to Joe
3 and I'll read it to you. The purpose of
4 this fax is to get some response as to
5 the Essex County grave (indiscernible)
6 Glendale Cemetery in Bloomfield, New
7 Jersey. Two years have gone by since the
8 initial physical inspection was made by
9 your staff and members of the Glendale
10 Cemetery Board of Directors. Shortly
11 thereafter, you informed this writer that
12 upon the completion of Veterans Park
13 dedication, signs will be next on your
14 agenda. Two years have gone by and
15 nothing constructive has been done. With
16 the monetary assistance of all the
17 veterans organizations in Essex County,
18 this veteran project can be accomplished
19 with little or no cost to Essex County.
20 This writer will make a personal donation
21 of 1,000 dollars to move this project and
22 to perpetuate the accomplishment of same.
23 Joe, as a special favor to this eighty-
24 seven-year-old veteran who has a great
25 deal of respect and gratitude for all the

1 dedication you have displayed over the
2 years by naming the Veterans Courthouse
3 and also the Veterans Memorial Park, with
4 the few years I have left before my
5 demise, please make my dream and wish
6 come truee It is common knowledge that
7 throughout this state and county of your
8 dedication to the veterans and I never
9 will forget (indiscernible) the same.

10 And as long as I am county executive, the
11 veterans will never be forgottene

12 Please, do not abandon us now. I will be
13 honored to serve on any commi@tee that
14 you choose me to serve. Your response
15 will be greatly appreciatede Your
16 friend, Anthony Capriglionee Copy of
17 which was sent to Glenda Cavanaugh,
18 director and supervisor of Glendale
19 Cemeterye

20 This is dated August 3rd -- August
21 30the Here it is October 3rd or 4th --
22 no responsee I'd like to get the
23 township to help us -- veterans in
24 township -- to get this thing on the
25 ball.

1 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Mr. Capriglione,
2 why don't you let me speak with you
3 either later or tomorrow and I'll try to
4 set something up with the county
5 executive and we'll try to work through
6 this together.

7 MR. CAPRIGLIONE: Okay.

8 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Okay?

9 MR. CAPRIGLIONE: There's one other
10 thing. I'd like to --

11 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: So I'll follow up
12 with you on that.

13 MR. CAPRIGLIONE: Yeah. Okay. I'd
14 like to circulate the pictures to you of
15 what the area -- oh, that's all right --
16 the area --

17 (Break in audio)

18 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Okay. So we'll
19 meet on this or we'll discuss this. I'll
20 try to get to you tomorrow maybe. Kathy
21 will help me out with -- maybe we can
22 find Joe?

23 MR. CAPRIGLIONE: (Indiscernible),
24 Joanne.

25 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Well, I'm going to

1 work on this with you tomorrowe I want
2 to get some more information -- I want to
3 talk to the --

4 MR. CAPRIGLIONE: (Indiscernible).

5 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Yes. Yes. No
6 problem. Andy, you're here on the same
7 matter?

8 MR. VININSKY: My name is Andrew
9 Martin Vininsky (ph.) III -- Andy
10 Vininsky. I'm right here tonighte I'm
11 representing the Nutley Veterans Council.
12 We were informed through the mayor's
13 office that one of Nutley residents who
14 served in Afghanistan passed away, and we
15 brought it up on discussion at our
16 meeting that we would like to get -- or
17 propose to have a monument or a boulder
18 be erected for the war on terrorism,
19 because it's going to go on for a long
20 time. And we do have a town to put on
21 it. With the town's approvalē we'd like
22 to have the monument placed in an
23 appropriate site and add as hopefully no
24 more names added to this monument at this
25 pointe

1 That's my proposal. Any questions
2 on it?

3 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Commissioner
4 Tucci, do you want to work on that?

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: You're looking
6 to just add a name, Andy? Or you're
7 looking to establish --

8 MR. VININSKY: I'm sorry.

9 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: -- a brand new
10 memorial?

11 MR. VININSKY: We'd like to have a
12 brand new memorial, and we do have the
13 one name on the -- for it to be put on
14 there. And we don't -- we know where we
15 would like it, but it would be with the
16 town's approval to put it by the World
17 War Two monument with the other monuments
18 for the Cold War -- people that were
19 killed in the Cold War. You know, with
20 your approval and, you know, with our
21 cooperation and with your cooperation.

22 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I'm sure we
23 can -- I'm sure we can work this out.
24 Before we leave this evening, I'll just
25 take your number --

1 MR. VININSKY: I'll give you my
2 telephone number.

3 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I know where
4 you live, but I don't want to come
5 knocking on your doore I'll just call
6 you on the phone.

7 MR. VININSKY: No problem. I'll be
8 retired after the 14th of October, so
9 I'll be -- I'll have free time during the
10 day.

11 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Okay. Fine.
12 And then I'll share that information that
13 we go over with the mayor and the rest of
14 the board and I'm sure we'll have an
15 appropriate monument placed.

16 MR. VININSKY: Thank you for your
17 time, for me to talk in front of youe
18 Thank you very much.

19 MR. NIVACO: (Indiscernible) Nivaco
20 (ph.)e, 160 Park Avenuee Number one, Mr.
21 Tucci, thank you very much for assisting
22 me over all these years with the boys
23 state from Nutley. We always come out on
24 top as far as the boys go. I also didn't
25 know, if you knew, that Christie was a

1 boys state graduate, and I saw your
2 picture -- I saw you on TV behind him
3 when he was politicking -- you looked
4 very good, by the waye

5 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I think I was
6 just observing but thanks.

7 MR. NIVACO: You know, speaking of
8 this monument. We had our Veterans
9 Council meeting and all of the members
10 there feel very sorry of having to ask
11 the town to put up a monument that is
12 going to be, unfortunately, used for the
13 war on terrorism. If we had the money,
14 we'd do it ourselves. As far as putting
15 it with the World War Two arrangement, I
16 think that's a little iffy. I think we
17 prefer closer to the town hall, because
18 most of the people that are going to be
19 on it, I hope to God, are not as many as
20 we lost in World War Twoe

21 What our plan was -- it was a
22 monument to be large enough, fortunately,
23 to add names to it in a (indiscernible)
24 form. If we please said, we'd sure
25 appreciate it -- it's the longest war

1 this country has ever fought. And
2 unfortunately, we're not fighting a war
3 like anything we've ever fought. I can
4 tell you that from a grandson with the
5 two deployments. Fortunately, other
6 young men are various posts up and over
7 there.

8 Every one of our posts, VFW, AMVETS,
9 American Legion, have young men that have
10 served Vietnam, and this war, call it the
11 terrorist war. And I think they deserve
12 to be recognized by our town.

13 Unfortunately -- fortunately, it's the
14 first one that we've had to put on that
15 monument, but, you know, God only knows
16 what's going to come.

17 Thank you again, and I sure would --
18 I know I personally would appreciate that
19 monument for these kids. They deserve
20 it -- they deserve it more than a lot of
21 other wars that we fought.

22 Thank you.

23 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Thank you, Jack
24 (ph.).

25 MR. PORTER: Richard Porter, 24

1 Cathedral Avenue. I'm the commander of
2 VFW 493 here in Nutley. I want to thank
3 the support of all of our veterans and I
4 just want to echo our support for this
5 monument I think that these -- our young
6 men and women who are fighting now in
7 Iraq and Afghanistan and the other places
8 on the war on terror, need to be
9 recognized and the town needs to do
10 whatever it takes to put a monument up
11 for them.

12 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Thank you. Is
13 there anyone else that would like to
14 address the board this evening?

15 MR. BERNARDO: Mayor, Commissionerse
16 Marty Bernardo (ph.) from 47 Dana Court,
17 Nutley. I'm here with my neighbors,
18 Milly Alessandra (ph.) and Linda Milano
19 (ph.)e from 43 Dana Court and 49 Dana
20 Court. We're coming here tonight to ask
21 your help and see if you could do
22 anything to help us to further our
23 application for the buyout on Dana Court.
24 It's basically broke our backs, this last
25 storm. We need some serious help. I

1 don't know where we're going for this. I
2 know Commissioner Scarpelli's been
3 working on this for quite a while now and
4 we do appreciate everything he's been
5 doing and now he's gotten quite far.
6 But, we need a big push.

7 I don't know what the answer is. We
8 can't continue to live like this. It's
9 been a mess. I know the last storm --
10 the whole town was in a mess but they
11 didn't go through what we went through.
12 Okay? We can't go through it again. We
13 can't keep repairing. It's beyond
14 repairing anymore. It's the basic
15 necessities of life; it's washing
16 clothes, it's being able to flush your
17 toilet, take a shower. It can't go on.
18 I mean, I don't know why we should have
19 to put up with it. I'm not blaming
20 anyone here. It's no one's fault. We're
21 just asking for help. We don't know
22 where to turn. We don't know how to go
23 forward.

24 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Commissioner
25 Scarpelli, you want to update?

1 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Well, Mr.
2 Bernardo, as we've been in contact with
3 the -- you and your neighbors for, I
4 guess, it's three years doing this
5 application with FEMA.

6 MR. BERNARDO: We've been going
7 through this for -- how long? Twelve
8 years.

9 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: I
10 understand how long you've been going
11 through it. But when I was elected and
12 we had flood soon after I elected, I told
13 you I was going to do something to help
14 you. We have -- we approved in the
15 application process. The appraisals have
16 been done on your property. As of today,
17 this afternoon, we got approval from the
18 government to release those appraisals to
19 you, so Mr. Ferrarro (ph.) will be in
20 contact with the three homeowners this
21 week to arrange a meeting to give you the
22 appraisals. So, unfortunately,
23 government does not move as quickly as we
24 would like, and especially when you're
25 dealing with the federal government. So,

1 although the process is taking long, I
2 think that from where we started, we're
3 down the road and getting to a conclusion
4 to thise That's where we're at.

5 Today the approval came from the state to
6 release the appraisals to youe

7 MR. BERNARDO: Well, Joe, like I
8 said, I appreciate all you're doing and I
9 know you've been up on it and we've had
10 numerous talks about it. But as time
11 goes on, these storms are getting worse;
12 they're getting more frequent, and we're
13 getting less help from the Town of
14 Nutleye Years ago, I used to have the
15 commissioners, the mayor -- they used to
16 come down and find out what was going on,
17 what our needs weree Now we haven't seen
18 anybodye So -- the last time, we haven't
19 seen anybodye

20 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: That's not
21 really true, Mr. Bernardoe

22 MR. BERNARDO: The only one we did
23 see is you the day before the storm and
24 you the day after the storme Okay? I
25 called. I asked for certain things, if

1 we could possibly get a truck to get rid
2 of some stuff -- a dumpster. And the
3 reply is, who's going to pay for that?
4 Okay? We asked if something could be
5 done with maybe pumping out our pools.
6 We all own in-ground pools. I was told
7 that we're not in the pool business. I
8 asked if we pumped out our pools and
9 cleaned our pools, could they fill our
10 pools with the fire hydrant? And they
11 said no, that's going to make the water
12 dirty. I mean, that's not really helping
13 your neighbor out, you know. We'll pay
14 for the water. We needed help. We can't
15 pump out a pool and leave it dry, if the
16 pool pump out of the ground. We're not
17 asking for a lot, you know. You know
18 what we're going through.

19 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Well, I
20 wasn't aware -- I not aware of any of
21 those requests --

22 MR. BERNARDO: When you have four
23 feet of water around your house -- a lot
24 of water.

25 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: I'm not

1 aware of any of those requests after the
2 storm to the Department of Public Works,
3 that I'm aware of, so I --

4 MR. BERNARDO: Well, I didn't -- I
5 didn't call you on them. I called other
6 departments on them. The reason I was
7 here -- I'm here tonight because
8 yesterday we had called Sal Ferrarra and
9 Sal Ferrarra said he wasn't getting any
10 response from Trenton either by e-mail or
11 by phone.

12 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Well,
13 just -- I mean, just to be fair to
14 Trenton and the federal government,
15 they've been quite busy the last couple
16 of weeks.

17 MR. BERNARDO: I'm sure they were,
18 but like I said, this has been --

19 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: And I
20 understand -- I understand your -- I
21 appreciate your patience that you've had
22 and I guess that I can't move government
23 any quicker than they move. And that
24 they've been quite busy, I think, with
25 the hurricane and tropical storm that

1 came after that, with some of the
2 neighbors that, unfortunately, got more
3 damage than we got, in Fairfield and
4 Wayne and other parts of the state. So,
5 we did receive, like I said, approval
6 today to release those appraisals, so
7 we're one step further than where we were
8 yesterday.

9 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Mr. Bernardo, did
10 you file the FEMA claims and aside from
11 the bailout of the homes -- did you file
12 any FEMA claims for personal items,
13 because to the best of my knowledge,
14 people who were doing that were getting
15 relief right away. FEMA was coming right
16 in and inspecting the homes. Did you do
17 that? Did anyone --

18 MR. BERNARDO: Yes, we did.

19 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: And did they come?

20 MR. BERNARDO: I had -- FEMA they
21 had the insurance companies there and
22 this is -- this is our fourth time. This
23 is our fourth time. I mean, we're
24 getting to the point where -- poor Linda
25 doesn't have hot water and heat. I mean,

1 we're losing the bare necessities we need
2 here all the time. You know, they -- I
3 can't believe they're even talking to us
4 at this point.

5 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Still don't have
6 hot water?

7 MR. BERNARDO: Well, she does as of
8 Friday. I put in a water heater for her.

9 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: How long --

10 MR. BERNARDO: But it's crazy.

11 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: You don't know how
12 long --

13 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: At this
14 point, we're --

15 MR. BERNARDO: I mean, we're living
16 down there with --

17 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: -- at this
18 point, Mayor, the appraisals will go to
19 the homeowners. This is my understanding
20 of the processe And they can either
21 accept or reject it, and if they reject
22 the appraisals, then they have to go out
23 and on their own dime get an appraisal
24 from a certified appraisale Then it's a
25 matter of the difference between the

1 appraisals and going --

2 MR. BERNARDO: The only thing I
3 could ask is if we have another storm in
4 the meantime -- I don't know how long
5 it's going to take -- if we could be
6 checked on down theree There's no reason
7 why human waste has to lay out on the
8 street for a week.

9 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: We'll --

10 MR. BERNARDO: Okay?

11 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Mr. Bernardo, the
12 morning of the storm I actually was there
13 with -- I think it was Deputy Chief
14 Caphone (phe) or Mike Lezy (ph.ə), one of
15 them took me down -- you couldn't even
16 get down the street. We had a homeowner
17 who was trapped in a house and needed to
18 get out, and her nephew or somebody was
19 there to try to get her oute I saw what
20 the street looked like. It wasn't -- you
21 couldn't even get down to your homes.

22 MR. BERNARDO: Yeahe And I know we
23 weren't the only ones that went through
24 it in the town; I know what the town
25 looks like. I've lived here for a long

1 time, fifty-nine years, and I own a
2 business in town. And none of us got on
3 the phone right away to call for any help
4 for anything. But after a week goes by,
5 we shouldn't have to be calling to clean
6 the street and not getting it done and
7 getting the answers that I was getting.

8 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Well, I think that
9 you do need to call us though because
10 after this storm, it was so, you know --
11 it was a mess all over the place.
12 Everybody was responding or trying to --

13 MR. BERNARDO: I understand that.
14 But that kind of a mess, that's what we
15 go through just on a bad storm. That's
16 what we go through.

17 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Well, it sounds
18 like you're getting closer to resolving
19 buyout --

20 MR. BERNARDO: Joe -- excuse me --
21 Joe, I wasn't aware of today that what
22 you're telling me.

23 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: That's --

24 MR. BERNARDO: Like I said, two days
25 ago, Sal said he wasn't getting any

1 response.

2 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: -- I said
3 that's probably after 4 o'clock today.

4 MR. BERNARDO: I mean, the only
5 thing we could do is jump and down in my
6 shoes

7 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: After 12
8 o'clock, Sal got an e-mail.

9 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Would you have him
10 touch base with the homeowners tomorrow?
11 Okay.

12 Let's see, you know. Check with us
13 and in two weeks we'll see how quickly
14 it's moving along.

15 MR. BERNARDO: All right, Joe, we're
16 going to try and sit tight. Thanks.

17 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: All we can
18 do.

19 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: Hope there's no
20 more rain.

21 Thank you, Mr. Bernardo.

22 MR. SENATOR: Mark Senator (ph.), 39
23 Race Street. I don't know if I have as
24 big a problem as what's going on and I
25 heard tonight. There's a lot more

1 important things than that, but I'm here
2 to talk about the rec (ph.) football
3 this year.

4 I coach and volunteer my time for
5 eight or more years, three of which I had
6 no child. From (indiscernible) -- I'm
7 not a smart college guy nor am I perfect
8 or an angel. Everyone knows that who
9 knows me. But I see what's going on. On
10 September 23rd, we approached the coaches
11 after the game because the playing time
12 wasn't fair. C-split level, which I
13 know, because of coaching, everybody's
14 supposed to play half the game. Even if
15 they're not good, which you're not
16 supposed to tell a child, but I got this
17 from the rec department about five years
18 ago. Stick them somewhere he don't get
19 hurt or he don't hurt someone else, but
20 he has to play after the game. And we
21 did that. We were told to do that as
22 coaches, which is fine. But I talked to
23 the coaches and the league rep and they
24 said they would take care of it. Mr.
25 Harkins was there and he understood, it's

1 thirty-five kids, and me and him agree.
2 It's hard, it's hard for the coachese
3 Okay. So we called Mr. Bendolfe (ph.)
4 and he said he would take care of it and
5 he did send a message down, and it
6 probably came from his boss, Mr. Duchy
7 (ph.)e but I don't know how it works.
8 Okay.

9 But this Saturday, I wasn't there, I
10 was working, but my wife had called me.
11 She was upset. I really couldn't talk
12 because I was on a union floor pouring a
13 lot of concrete, but that's my business.
14 And she said that it got worse, that the
15 time was really limited. I don't know --
16 I'm just taking her word. I did talk to
17 a few neighbors that have children on the
18 team and they said their son played less
19 than my son. So it's -- not everybody's
20 lying. So I put a -- I don't know what
21 she said, but she got called -- we got
22 called for a suspension today. We have
23 told we were both suspended. Mine's
24 separate -- I'll tell you in a second.

25 But because of harassment because

1 she went up to the head coach, which is
2 Ralph Chemento (ph.), and he said I'm not
3 the head coach and he kept walking away.
4 And she did not walk on the field; she
5 stayed in the stands of Verona, because
6 you can't go down on the stand -- on the
7 field. You have to walk. So they said
8 she was on a field so there's a lot of
9 lying going on but I don't know where
10 it's coming from.

11 And she said that I'm not the head
12 coach of the C-split, so don't talk to
13 me. There's nothing -- there's
14 nothing -- there's not a damn thing I can
15 do about it. And he walked away And
16 I'm sure -- I know my wife, you know my
17 wife -- she probably got a little loud.
18 She don't curse though because you really
19 don't curse at home anyway. She's not a
20 curser. And, so, they -- so she called
21 because she drove home from Verona, all
22 the way home, and Joey -- my son's a nice
23 kid, he's a smile-er -- crying. It broke
24 her heart as a parent -- crying all the
25 way home. Why didn't I play? Why didn't

1 I play? I even -- he was patting on one
2 of the coaches, I don't know who it was
3 Maybe Mr. -- I can't remember -- Higgins
4 (ph.), no not, whatever his name is --
5 anyway. Can I get in? Can I get in?
6 and usually he don't do that, but she
7 noticed that today -- that time because
8 he felt that it was in his -- that he
9 wasn't getting fair enough timee We
10 don't talk to him about it. This is
11 between parent and Mr. Tucci's office and
12 coachinge We don't say, Joe, you know,
13 you didn't play because of -- I don't let
14 him even hear that nonsense, you knowe

15 So, anyway, she called the office
16 and left a message, and Krissy got back
17 to her because she heard her her crying
18 like over the -- over the messagee She
19 felt bade She goes, is this Joanne with
20 the black hair? Oh, I'm so -- what's the
21 matter? I'll tell Mr. Bendolfe. Okaye
22 So anyway, this was -- I get harassed at
23 job from my wife, of coursee Could you
24 go talk to Mr. Duchy, could you --- I
25 know not to bother him at his personal

1 business, but I did go there and I left a
2 phone number. I don't know if it's right
3 or wrong, but I just said to his
4 daughter, just have him call me, please.
5 That's it. And I left the store.

6 I didn't get a phone call, which I
7 didn't think was nice because I am
8 friends with him and his family for a
9 long, long, long time. But that's
10 besides the point.

11 Let's see -- I'm sorry, but I had to
12 write this down because I need to get it
13 off my mind and I don't want to forget
14 anything. All right, so --

15 He's like -- Joey never realized --
16 like he's not a complainer. He lost
17 probably all his wrestling matches,
18 smiled while he got pinned. He's just a
19 nice kid. Everybody calls him Smiling
20 Joe, he's a good kid. But that hurts,
21 like when he said, I don't think I'm
22 getting fair time, to his mom. So he's
23 realizing -- he's eight years old, what
24 does he know about that -- so if he's
25 realizing it's happening, because I know

1 he's not a liar, so I'm like, why should
2 my wife get suspended because you wanted
3 to talk to a coach? I mean -- and they
4 called it harassment -- harassment is
5 like if I followed you every day maybe,
6 maybe for a couple of days. Not one
7 question. I don't see that being
8 harassed.

9 And then, like, it's only like a one
10 side of the story, so how do you -- how
11 are you supposed to say what I want to
12 say, like, how me and my wife supposed to
13 say, protect us -- like our word's not
14 credible. Only what Frank DeMayo (ph.)
15 says and this is how it's going. I see
16 that's how it's going. So I like -- I
17 figure I want a hearing. I don't -- is
18 there a hearing board we can go to? I
19 don't know.

20 Okay. So I would like that. Okay.

21 As for me, I'm suspended because
22 Joey brought a football to the Brauner
23 (ph.) game and was playing on the side.
24 And the whole time I seen him playing.
25 He wasn't getting no passes -- throw it

1 to me, throw it to me, throw it to mee
2 Nothi@ge Go over there, hand off, he
3 didn't run the ball, not -- he didn't
4 caree He was still havi@g fun. Then some
5 more children camee Happened to be Frank
6 DeMayo's son which didn't do a thing --
7 little DeMayo didn't do a thing but he
8 was holdi@g the balle So I came over
9 there and he start picking teams and I
10 seen that kid go over there and I said go
11 over there and -- Joey wasn't picked and
12 it's another child. Joey starts crying.
13 So, I'm going to go down as a parente It
14 had nothing to do with the football gamee
15 Nothing to do with the football gamee
16 They're sidekicks. I went over there --
17 what's the matter? He didn't pick me and
18 he got my balle Okaye Can I have his
19 ball? Sure, I go, because that's not
20 nice and this is what I said -- I said,
21 Joe, they're selfish, because their
22 parent taught them to be like that maybe.
23 I said, so give me the ball -- go play
24 somewhere else. Don't worry about what
25 they do. As I walked up, Mr. DeMayo was

1 on the sidelines, turned away, and
2 said -- I guess he thought I was yelling
3 at his kid but I really -- because I know
4 his little son wasn't even involved in
5 the whole thinge He just got there and
6 happened to have the ball.

7 I said, Frank, I wasn't talking to
8 your son. He goes, yes, you weree Well,
9 if you said he's selfish because I told
10 him, so you're telling me I'm selfish.
11 Frank, I didn't say thate He's yelling
12 at mee I'm on the top of the stands
13 minding my own businesse A policeman
14 came -- this is what I get todaye I
15 heard I get escorted from the Verona
16 police -- I get escorted. The police
17 (indiscernible)e, is everything all right?
18 I hear the guy yelling at -- no, no, it's
19 not. And I said, he's a coach, I know
20 him. I said it's nothienge He walks off.
21 So -- but we got -- I got escorted from
22 the Verona policee That's the rumor
23 todaye

24 So, I mean, how do I get suspended
25 for going to help my little son? Had

1 nothing to do with football? How am I
2 suspended? Like I said, I'm not an
3 angele Mr. Tucci knows I did do some
4 crazy things and I did take my suspension
5 and I admitted it. I never lie; if I
6 cursed, I cursed. If I run on the field
7 and grab a coach by his throat, I grabbed
8 the coach by his throat. I take the
9 suspensione But I didn't do anything
10 I'm just -- I don't knowe I don't know
11 what to do. I don't know what to do. I
12 don't know what to do. I mean --

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Maybe I -- can
14 I shed some light on this? And Mark, you
15 know I think the world of you.

16 MR. SENATOR: I know, I knowe I
17 love you.

18 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: You're a good
19 guye I mean, we all lose our tempere
20 Every now and then --

21 MR. SENATOR: I'm not here to
22 slander anybody either I just don't
23 want to be suspended for the whole year
24 away from my children -- two childrene
25 And they said if I go to the field, they

1 get thrown off the team So I'm going to
2 stand out on Franklin Avenue, right,
3 because that's a public sidewalk, right?

4 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Let me
5 address -- no. We don't want to do that
6 again. We don't want to do that again
7 this year.

8 MR. SENATOR: All right. Come on,
9 tell me what to do.

10 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Number one, we
11 have -- and you know this because you've
12 coached. I mean, and you've been around
13 and you've been volunteering your time
14 for years. We have on the C-split team
15 which is a developmental squad thirty-
16 five children -- thirty-six children?

17 MR. SENATOR: Thirty-five kids I
18 had a (indiscernible)e.

19 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: It is humanly
20 impossible for all of the children to
21 play half a game. There's not enough
22 time in the game. Maybe if we played two
23 games we could get them in, all right?
24 But our objective was and always will be
25 to get all of the children in, all right,

1 and to have all of the children play. I
2 respond to reports that I get, okay. And
3 I don't want to get into what the reports
4 were, but, yes, there is a hearing
5 process and fortunately, we have the
6 benefit this evening, all right, of the
7 person who was actually keeping track of
8 who was playing and who wasn't playing.
9 It was Mr. Harkins, who is also one of
10 our volunteers and also very involved.
11 So, without having a long protracted
12 discussion about this, there is an avenue
13 for you to present your case, okay? You
14 can bring that case to the oversight
15 committee, all right, and you can lay it
16 all out for them as to exactly what your
17 side of the story is versus what the
18 other side of the story is. There are
19 three independent people: Yolanda Merit
20 (ph.), Tom Grecco (ph.), and Mark Feister
21 (ph.), three very fair people who have
22 been involved with us for years and
23 years. All right. But the one thing
24 that you do need to know is we would
25 never ever intentionally or

1 unintentionally, all right, hurt any
2 child or keep any child from
3 participating, let alone your kids. You
4 have good kids. I know your kids --

5 MR. SENATOR: I know.

6 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: -- I know your
7 family for years and years. Mayor, if I
8 might, can I ask Mr. Harkins -- Kevin,
9 can you shed a little more light as to
10 the playing time?

11 MR. HARKINS: Yeah, Commissioner.
12 First of all, Joe is a great kid. He's a
13 happy kid, he's always smiling. I agree
14 with you on that.

15 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: He's a good
16 boy.

17 MR. HARKINS: You know, because
18 we've talked about it, and I don't know
19 if this is the appropriate forum but I'm
20 going to go ahead anyway. It's very,
21 very challenging for the coaches to try
22 to play over thirty kids in a football
23 game with running time. You might have
24 twenty plays on offense, twenty plays on
25 defense, and the coaches do the best they

1 can to make sure everybody plays equallye
2 I can tell you, and sometimes parents
3 don't realize this -- this past Saturday,
4 two kids we asked, come on, you're going
5 to go in the game? You want to carry the
6 ball? What do you want to do? They
7 don't want to go in the game. Their
8 parents don't know that. The people in
9 the stands maybe don't know that

10 MR. SENATOR: Yeah. I went through
11 that

12 MR. HARKINS: And we don't want to
13 necessarily embarrass the child either
14 because, you know, his dad may say, why
15 weren't you in the game? He's probably
16 going to say, I don't know, Dad. But
17 some kids don't want to go in -- they're
18 not ready and that's fine. I mean, you
19 know, we work with them, we practice with
20 all of them. We try to treat them all
21 equally. I can tell you that. It's just
22 it's very difficult when you have running
23 time -- you know, there's games are very
24 short -- to get in that amount of kids
25 for a significant amount of time. So

1 they'll all get in and, you know, as
2 fairly as we can do it. We have a
3 process now that we've only gone to the
4 past few games, where we actually have a
5 chart of kids by positions so that we can
6 get them in -- okay, they've been in five
7 plays, let's give five more kids in. Is
8 it perfect? Probably not, because you
9 have kids who say I don't want to go in,
10 another kid has to go to the bathroom --
11 there's a lot of things that happen with
12 little kids. But we do the best we can
13 and, you know, it's -- you know, you
14 enroll your child in a town-sponsored
15 event and you have volunteer coaches.
16 It's not easy; we do the best we can.
17 And I'm sure I'm speaking on behalf of
18 all the coaches. Is it perfect? No.
19 but everybody's really trying their best
20 and I think that sometimes parents, you
21 know -- and again, I don't want to get
22 into specifics either, but, you know, if
23 you have a question or disagreement there
24 are certain ways you can handle it. And,
25 you know, that maybe are a little bit

1 more appropriate than others. You know,
2 you've told me you've coached and I think
3 you understand the challenges there.

4 So it's not even about the playing
5 time. It's really more how you handle
6 it. I mean, I'm happy to talk to any
7 parent if they -- we did. So far this
8 year only one parent -- they said, can I
9 talk to you on the side? And they did
10 and we resolved it. Out of over forty
11 kids in that C program.

12 MR. SENATOR: But like when you're
13 on the outside instead of coaching
14 because then -- you know -- you notice a
15 lot, so you notice that a parent -- I
16 mean a coach that's also a parent, you
17 know, will notice that his son is going
18 to be on the team or on the field more
19 than others. So it's not like it's an
20 illusion, it really -- it's happening.
21 As when I was coached, with coaching, my
22 kid would be the first one off the team.
23 That's enough time -- you got to go. I
24 always did that and I remember Nate
25 Rivera (ph.)^e which was a good coach at

1 the timee He did the same time. You
2 know, our kids were always the first one
3 off because I know how it is. Because
4 that's when people see -- they ain't
5 going to come and tap me and say your kid
6 played more than minee Because I didn't
7 want that, so I would always say, Nick,
8 come on -- and he was good. He's the
9 best -- one of the best on the team. I'm
10 not saying he's the best, but that's
11 fair. Now I don't see thate I see this
12 very selfish coaching season, very
13 selfish, and they were my friends, but
14 now I don't consider them as my friends
15 because I see what they're doing. And
16 that's how I feel. And I'm not the only
17 person, but now that we got suspended --
18 and of course everybody's got their
19 (indiscernible), so the parent -- we had
20 talked it today, he goes, I'm not
21 complainig, because I don't want -- I
22 got to see my son lay. So that's not --
23 you're not going to hear any more
24 complaiats because now the Senators are
25 the example, which I didn't want it to

1 be, but I don't see how I'm thrown off by
2 telling my son to go and getting a ball
3 from someone. I didn't say anything. He
4 yelled at me and there was no cursing
5 involved. He said I cursed -- if he said
6 I cursed, it's because he wants -- what's
7 another way to get me off the thing. So
8 you said cursing's not -- that's it, no
9 challenge. And I didn't curse at him. I
10 didn't curse at anybody. I'm not going
11 to curse at his little son, that's for
12 sure.

13 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Mark, let's do
14 this. Number one, you know, I think you
15 know me well enough, I am not a proponent
16 of daddy ball. All right. If you --

17 MR. SENATOR: I know. I wrote that
18 here. I didn't tell you that.

19 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: If your father,
20 your mom's involved, that child should
21 not get preferential treatment over any
22 other one. Do I know that it exists
23 every now and then? Yes And do we
24 address it? Absolutely, we do. But why
25 don't we set something up and I'll call

1 first thing tomorrow morning, all right,
2 to set something up with the oversight
3 committee and you can sit down because
4 there may be some misinformation here
5 because your story differs greatly from
6 the other side of the story and as in
7 every instance, the truth always lies
8 somewhere in between.

9 MR. SENATOR: All right.

10 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: So let's get to
11 the truth.

12 MR. SENATOR: All right. Please.
13 Thanks so much. I really do. I
14 appreciate it.

15 MR. HARKINS: Commissioner, just the
16 year's experience as a volunteer and a
17 coach, it may be something you want to
18 think about. I have one rule as a coach
19 We don't talk about the game on the day
20 of the game. You want to call me twenty-
21 four hours later, we can talk about it.

22 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Exactly.

23 MR. HARKINS: Because emotions get
24 in the way of both coaches and the
25 parents. So I may be something you might

1 want to think about -- a twenty-four
2 hour --

3 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Absolutely.
4 Point well taken.

5 MR. HARKINS: -- cooling-off period.

6 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: You're
7 absolutely right.

8 MR. SENATOR: I thought -- I thought
9 it would be a good idea and someone said
10 they mentioned it to this year, parents
11 should not coach their childe You either
12 go -- step down or move up. And it
13 worked in Bloomfield; I was there for two
14 years that way and it really worked, it
15 really worked. Again, it's less -- it's
16 bettere And your sons learn moree

17 MR. HARKINS: I totally agree with
18 you and where we can do that, we do, but
19 unfortunately, due to the economic
20 climate out there and a lot of other
21 things that are going on in everyone's
22 homes, we don't get the number of
23 volunteers that we once did. But
24 wherever we can, I absolutely agree with
25 youe I think it makes the whole process

1 a lot fairer. Not that I think it isn't
2 fair, but it can always be improved upon.

3 All right.

4 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Let me call
5 tomorrowe We'll set something up. We'll
6 move this along.

7 MR. SENATOR: Thank youe I
8 appreciate it. And I'm sorry to bother
9 everybody. Thank you so much.

10 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Thank you,
11 Mark.

12 MAYOR COCCHIOLA: No, thank you for
13 waiting all night to address us. Thank
14 you.

15 Is there anyone else who would like
16 to address the board this evening?

17 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Move to
18 adjourn.
