24	We're very pleased to welcome tonight Prism Capital
25	Partners They closed on the Roche property last week and

we welcome them there. And we'd like to bring up Gene Diaz and Ed Cohen to say a few words.

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MR. DIAZ: Thank you, Mayor and Commissioners.

We're very pleased to be here today, finally. It was quite an endeavor, spent over 22 months working very closely with Roche, with Hackensack, with Seton Hall putting together the pieces which we think are really anchoring the next 100 years for the Roche campus here in Nutley and neighboring Clifton.

We think there are a lot of exciting things that are going to come our way. We've got a great anchor in Hackensack and Seton Hall there that hopes to open first classes by August of -- fall of '18. So they're on a very rushed schedule to get moving.

We have a fair number of interested -- additional interested corporations now we're in discussions with that are looking at the campus and considering the campus as a possible location for their operations. That's going to take a lot of doing and working with the municipality, working with the state, the incentive programs, and continuing to court these corporations that we're looking to instill there and ensconce there for the long-term.

We've got a couple of goals in mind for the (indiscernible). First and foremost is to have a multi-user park so that the future never has -- for what's in the

future, never a Roche situation again where we have just one large company picking up and leaving. We've seen that devastate New Jersey and many other communities all across the state, and not just here in Nutley. But it's happened elsewhere.

So you're not unique. I don't mean to say that in a pejorative. But you're not unique. It's happening everywhere. And one of the cures is to create a multidisciplined park that's home for many different types of users and many different types of businesses that can weather the economic downturn and upticks with a much better degree of flexibility.

We're going to be working with the towns over the next 12 to 18 months (indiscernible) to look to design an overall master plan campus. It's going to take a lot of transparency with (indiscernible), a lot of input. We hope to hold lots of public meetings and public forums with the assistance of the commissioners and their professional staffs.

We think it's important that you get to see everything that we're doing as we go through the process.

It's your community. And, yes, we're a large owner in here now.

Yes, we're a large stakeholder, and, yes, we are a large taxpayer. But you've been here all your life and

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multiple lives and multiple generations, and we respect that. And we look forward to learning from that in terms of what's important to the community, what we can do special on this campus that will help long-term.

To that end, I think that there's a couple of things that we're going to do right away. We'll have a website up very shortly that will sort of describe the process that took place over the previous (inaudible) just to get everyone back up to speed and understand. It was announced, you know, more than two years ago that there was this deal in the works. And I think everyone kind of fell asleep wondering well, gee, what happened and what took place.

We're going to get everybody educated back up to understanding how complex a transaction this was, all the things that were required to happen and to make happen and were put in place. And it just took some time to do that. We're then going to have that as a forum and opportunity up there also as we begin to develop a master plan for future build-out and development on the campus (inaudible) opportunities.

We'll also be having that as a forum and for people to see what we're presenting to the town and our discussions with the township working along in its progress. We view it as a very collaborative effort. We think it's

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important that everybody has an opportunity to voice their opinions, voice their concerns. We hope you voice an awful lot of your applause as well. That's always welcome.

But that's going to be the process that'll unfold. You are not going to see work happening tomorrow. hospital hopes to start some demolition, Hackensack and Seton Hall, inside the building in the next month. But it'll be a while until we can get zoning and permitting (inaudible) and everything through the municipalities where everybody feels that they're getting what's happening here needs to be happening here.

That'll take some time. So don't anticipate a major change overnight. You're not going to see that. But what you are going to see is an awful lot of thoughtful and measured pace of our work and our efforts to make certain that what we do here we (inaudible). If you look around at Prism's other developments and the quality that we've brought (inaudible) and to some of these developments, I think you'd be very pleased at the end of the day to know that my partner, Ed, and I take an awful lot of pride of ownership really looking at the details, figuring out the problems and the issues and resolving them in, I think, that's amicable a process as we can.

Let me say this about your town. For 22 months, we've been working with the -- then it was Mayor Petracco.

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Now, Commissioner Petracco. Now, Mayor Scarpelli,

Commissioner Tucci, the other two commissioners as well and

your professionals. You guys are lucky. You've got a

great, great administration. I can't tell you enough how

many towns we've been in front of that don't have the kind

of genuine thoughtfulness, interest, and selfless interest

in (inaudible) their town happen for their town.

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Their professionals are outstanding, and we're looking forward to working with them. Our professionals have a high degree of respect for them. And on a personal relationship, I think it's been wonderful working with this commission. We look forward to it.

They're going to do this -- they're going to do Nutley very proud, and we're going to enjoy working with them. We really thank you (indiscernible).

MR. COHEN: During the sleeping period of 22 months or so, I can assure you that my partner, Gene, and I didn't get much sleep. We have been working at a feverish pace to make sure this golden gem of a property, you know, gets the proper attention. And we are -- we finally felt we were a caged animal for this long period of time. And now, the gates have been opened.

And I must tell you we are thoroughly excited about bringing this stellar project onboard for your town and the neighboring town. And we can't wait to get this

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1 going. And my partner covered everything else. Thank you.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Gene and Ed.

Appreciate your kind words. We look forward to working with you, filling those buildings that are empty as quickly as possible, redeveloping the site, replacing some of our rateables, boosting our local economy, providing job opportunities for our residents, and increasing our property values. So we look forward to doing it.

These are exciting times, and we look forward to that. I'm going to let the commissioners comment.

Commissioner Tucci?

COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Yes.

Obviously, I spent a lot of time with you folks, as did everyone else over the last 22 months. But it's nice to officially welcome you to Nutley now that everything is closed and legal and there are no longer any obstacles. We don't have to hear from Basil Switzerland (ph) anymore or anyone else.

It was a complicated deal. I think you guys mastered it very well. Your track record speaks for itself. As the mayor said, we look forward to many, many years with you here in Nutley providing opportunities for our citizens, helping to restore our tax rate, and just improving the township as a whole.

From the beginning, I guess Commissioner Petracco

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Just before I vote, you know, I'd just like to say a couple of words with, you know, what this is. And we tried with our HOPE Committee to really prevent this from happening.

It seems like our children, adults -- these pain pills are more prevalent, not only in Nutley, but everywhere. And I've never been a commissioner to sweep that under the carpet at all. It's a problem in Nutley as long as it is throughout our country.

Go to a doctor, and they want to prescribe pain pills, please do everything in your power to take Advil instead of a narcotic. Because it's unbelievable the people who pass through public safety who are professionals and the complete opposite of what you think a drug addict would look like. And they're hooked on these drugs.

And then as we all know, with the deaths that we have buried our own children in this town, which is disgusting, you know, the kids get on these pain pills for

some reason. And then when they can't afford to buy them, somehow they wind up on heroine, because it's a cheaper choice of drugs. So please, if you're having a problem, seek out help.

If you are going to a doctor that's prescribing them, try to get off them, because it does lead to other things. And it's really an epidemic, like I said. And it is here in our hometown for sure, and it's all over the country. So with a little luck from God and, you know, a good town, hopefully we could save some people from this terrible experience going forward.

I vote aye. Thank you.

Mr. Scarpelli, under the ordinance, you have the high and the low on the salaries. When Lucille and Evelyn were the town clerks, we had no problems getting information as far as the salary, the current position, if it was occupied or not. Last meeting, I spoke to the town clerk, and I submitted an OPRA at her request.

And the answer was there was no documents available. Do you think it's a lot easier to have somebody get their answers prior to the hearing or at the hearing?

It's not -- there's no time limit on it. And I can get up and ask a lot of questions, or I can get an OPRA prior to.

ALAN GENITEMPO: Mayor, I would like to address

ALAN GENITEMPO: Mayor, I would like to address that, if you would give me the opportunity.

MR. MOORE: Go right ahead.

ALAN GENITEMPO: Mayor Scarpelli?

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Go ahead.

ALAN GENITEMPO: Mr. Moore, your OPRA request, which I reviewed, for the clerk asked for documents that do not exist yet. You have the ordinance, proposed ordinance, which has salary ranges. You asked for the actual salary increases that were part of the range. You didn't want the range. You wanted the actual salaries.

Nobody's gotten their salary increased yet. The

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ordinance hasn't passed. No commissioners have raised anybody's salary. So the answer to your specific OPRA request was that the documents do not exist. And that is the truth.

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You don't have to smear the clerk because you didn't ask for something that -- asked for something that doesn't exist. She is diligently responding to all of your OPRA requests. You and I have dealt with the OPRA requests directly.

I counseled her on this particular OPRA request.

We checked with the treasurer. We checked with the different departments. No one has gotten a salary increase because of the ordinance change yet.

If that changes, if anybody gets a raise, we can provide you with those documents. But it hasn't happened yet. We'll --

MR. MOORE: When is it going to happen? Do you want to clarify the --

ALAN GENITEMPO: No, it's not my decision if the commissioners --

MR. MOORE: I didn't ask that.

ALAN GENITEMPO: Right now, the ordinance only adjusts the ranges of (inaudible). That's all it does. We do it every year. There have been no increases yet based on the changes in the range.

If the commissioners decide to do that, they will do that. And then you've already requested and we provided you in the past the list of the salaries of all the employees. There's nothing that we're hiding. So I think your statement is a little misleading, and I think to criticize the clerk on that is completely wrong.

I will always guide the clerk when she has a question. And she always comes to me if there's an issue that she (inaudible), specifically with the language of your OPRA request. So we're more than happy to review your request.

We always try to respond timely, which we did here. But the answer to your question was that those documents do not exist the way you framed the question.

Now, if you didn't get a copy of the proposed ordinance, you obviously, are entitled to that. I think you have it from last night.

MR. MOORE: I have it from -- I have it here.

ALAN GENITEMPO: Okay. So you can see that there are ranges. There are no actual salaries there. You asked for the changes in the salaries provided by this ordinance. The answer is the documents have not yet been created.

MR. MOORE: So according to you, if I understand you correctly, is that nobody gets a raise until the end of

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Page 35 1 the year? 2. ALAN GENITEMPO: I didn't say that, 3 Mr. Moore. 4 MR. MOORE: (Indiscernible). So it would suggest it's 22 23 not going to be done at least until the end of the year. 2.4 ALAN GENITEMPO: I didn't suggest anything. I told you factually what happened, actually why you got a 25

response that said the documents don't exist yet. You can believe anything that you want as to when (inaudible). But when they do, they will happen. Or that you'll make an OPRA request. If the document exists, we will produce it, as we do with every OPRA request.

MR. MOORE: (Inaudible) In here you, you also have and which my other (inaudible). I believe you have future positions which are not occupied currently.

ALAN GENITEMPO: As you know from the last time when it was (inaudible) be able to have positions of paid employees, there has to be an ordinance that provides that position (inaudible). It is done every year. It's done now to clean up some issues, from what I understand.

I wasn't involved in creating it. That's the purpose of it. We have to have an ordinance that has the ranges of the salaries.

MR. MOORE: And I'll put my other OPRA's in later on. Thank you very much.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Thank you, Mr. Moore.

MR. ALESSIO: Good evening. Carmine Alessio, 81
East Centre Street. Yeah, a couple of weeks ago, I came
here and discussed the issue about the gas leaks. And I
watched it unravel. I watched myself on Channel 42, and I
saw that I was speaking but my lips were flapping together
and no sound was coming out.

When I made my complaint about the gas leaks, I do specifically remember when my lips weren't flapping around that I said that, you know, why weren't the leaks attended to before the blacktop was being paved there. And I didn't hear that, you know, on Channel 42. So my main (indiscernible) about it was after the street was paved, it's not supposed to be touched for five years. So that's my understanding that the leaks should have been fixed before.

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So like I've got to come back here again and rebring (ph) -- state this stuff. And what I did was when my lips were smacking around -- this is like the third time I'm saying it, and I want to say it again about the five-year law that you're not supposed to rip up the street unless there is a gas emergency. I went to Nutley High School, and I spoke to Dennis, the principal.

I said, you know, these young guys like -- I'm looking at myself. And again, my lips are like going like this and no sound's coming out. And the Nutley Sun something which I feel is very, very dishonest. They're coming across with some quotes that I said, which I did say over the microphone that evening that the most important point was you're not supposed to rip up the street for five years, unless there's an emergency gas leak.

Now, I think that was a pretty good point, because

I'm saying to myself if this continues, like as the town's paved the street real beautiful and there's like gas leaks and they have to come back and rip up the street. Like my utility bill -- like how much more can it take as far as being like, you know, raised every year. That's like a burden on my utility bills. So, you know, that's another point there.

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But I'd like to know if this microphone is okay.

Because, you know, if you move around, you know, the important -- I could be like saying something and it doesn't come across. And then the media -- they could -- of course, they're biased towards somebody like me. And they're not going to actually say the right thing about the five-year not to disturb the blacktop, you know, unless there's an emergency.

So again, that's like the fourth time. So if you want to put it in the paper, put the right thing in the newspaper. Don't put a couple of quotes that mean absolutely nothing. But, you know, like I said, I'm glad that they came back the other day and resurfaced the middle of the street. Now it's back to its original form, which was a great thing.

But like I said, I can't imagine how high these utility bills are going to go in the future if it just continues the way it's continuing. And, you know, let that

go. I kind of like missed the resolution part. I thought that after the -- you know, after every commissioner reads their resolution then we go up and you can like, you know, have a -- if you have a question, you can, you know, ask the question. But I noticed that that is before the commissioners read their resolution.

Like Mr. Petracco read his resolution. I figured after he read his resolution, that I would, you know, come up and make a comment on whichever one that I wanted to make a comment on. And the one that I wanted to make a comment on -- Mr. Rogers is not here today -- in regards to the pest control.

This lady, Michelle, from Montclair -- she was very helpful. I have a problem or been having an ongoing problem with animals and pests like undermining my garage to the point where it's so out of control because down in the East -- on East Centre Street in that area, big tracts of land have been like rebuilt (indiscernible) on the Cyvex (ph) track the technical coding. And the park was renovated. And I'm over there, and I'm getting everybody's pests from groundhogs.

Like I don't just have one family in my yard. I have like three tracks of land of wildlife undermining my garage. So my question for the record to Mr. Rogers would have been is she just in charge of investigating like animal

- cruelty as this agenda says right here, or are they -- can
 you be able to call the town and if you are infested, like
 do it the proper way, have someone come down there and like
 just, you know, get rid of the pests?
- MAYOR SCARPELLI: Just as you know, obviously,

 Commissioner Rogers isn't here tonight to answer that

 question.
 - MR. ALESSIO: Obviously.
- 9 MAYOR SCARPELLI: You could give him a call, and
 10 maybe he can answer that question on what --
