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COMMISSIONER ROGERS: I'll be introducing an ordinance tonight that is focusing in on pet shops. Now, we don't have any in Nutley, but there have been thousands of communities across the country are actually passing ordinances like this to prevent pet shops from getting animals that have been in inhumane breeding conditions and have come from puppy mills, and cat mills, and it's going to heighten community awareness of animal welfare.

Mr. Larry Cohen is here tonight who helped -he's from the Humane Society, who helped author a good part

of this ordinance. So I'll be just introducing that tonight. That's all I have, Mayor.

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MAYOR SCARPELLI: Commissioner Evans?

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes. Steve, I have a couple questions on the ordinance that we can go over. But as far as my agenda items, I have three resolutions. One is a tax exempt status for Michael Walsh, who's met the requirements to be exempt from tax given military disability. And then I have two resolutions related to refunds, one for overpayment of taxes, the other one on an application fee. And that's what I have. I also have a need for us to be in executive for contract negotiations and personnel.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: Okay. Commissioner, do you want to address your questions to Commissioner Rogers?

COMMISSIONER EVANS: I can do that. Just that when I read the ordinance, I wasn't clear if -- are we -- which chapter or code section we're actually putting this ordinance in under. I think it needs to have it -- basically a designated (indiscernible). I didn't see that in the resolution itself.

I just had a question as well, I totally agree in terms of the welfare of animals. I'm a big supporter of that and the nature of what could happen with puppy mills and kitten mills. And I understand we don't have any pet stores in Nutley now. I was just wondering why we went from

allowing them to not allowing them completely. And maybe there is something -- if someone followed an ordinance that had requirements in it, would we be able to, in effect, have a pet shop so that --

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Sure they will.

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COMMISSIONER EVANS: -- the residents of Nutley, they can go there with confidence that this is a valid place. It's under -- it's being watched and it's following the rules. I was just curious, this particular ordinance would prohibit it. And I just -- and therefore if somebody wanted to open up a pet store, it would require them to incur the expense of a variance, which would be a use variance that would go before the Board of Adjustment. So aside from the application fees, the attorney's fees, and things like that, I was just wondering is there something a little bit more in the middle that wouldn't prohibit it, but would establish criteria.

And I wasn't -- the other question I had was, we say that it was going to reduce costs, and I appreciate that, but we don't have any pet shops. So what costs would we be reducing?

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Well, this is primarily to the -- for the consumers. It's to make sure that these pet stores are not bringing in animals from puppy mills. Many of them -- many pet stores around the country have had

animals -- have purchased animals from puppy mills and from very inhumane conditions. The consumer doesn't even know this. So the pet store owners are going to actually be prevented from bringing such animals in that are not well taken care of. So it's helping the consumers and it's something that is going on nationwide with regard to the care and treatment of animals. So it's to protect the consumer and to protect the animals.

absolutely agree with all of that. And the more we can do to make sure that the residents of Nutley and the general consumer can come to town and with confidence buy a pet that's going to give them all of the support of the love and care and so (indiscernible), that the consumer will care for the pup, or cat, or whatever that animal may be. I -- so let me just ask it a different way. Maybe I misread it.

Does this ordinance prohibit pet stores completely or just add restrictions that would create a confidence that a pet store in Nutley would not be from a -- they wouldn't be buying puppies or cats from any puppy or cat mill.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Yeah, it doesn't prohibit pet stores. It gives them guidelines with regard to the types of animals that are coming in and where they're coming from. So no one is being restricted. It's a good question. The pet store owner is not being restricted and neither is -

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- are the consumers. But it gives guidelines with regard to where they're getting these animals from. And it's good for the consumers to know and frankly, it probably would be a lot better off for these pet store owners because they may not even know where they're getting some of these animals from. They may be getting them through second or third parties.

So they'll be -- so it'll be helpful to everyone all around.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: I agree. Thank you for clarifying that.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: I was reading this as -- that it would prohibit pet stores in Nutley and I wasn't sure that was the direction we would want to go to prohibit a business that could actually do quite well given our population and so on. So between cats and dogs, we must give out 2,000 licenses a year. So there's a very significant membership of our community that are pet lovers and they should have that ability to be more confident in what they purchase is going to be from a place that we would all be proud of, like breeders and so on.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Yeah, that's right.

MAYOR SCARPELLI: I know that Commissioner Rogers has pulled one of his ordinance introductions, but are we going to hear from Mr. Cohen tonight? Mr. Cohen, do you want to come up and address the Board?

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COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Ladies and gentlemen, I'm going to table ordinance number 3368. It involves the protection of consumers and the protection of pets. Mr. Larry Cohen, you've been very patient. We've been talking a lot, but I have a couple of questions. But before I ask, can you please give the Board of Commissioners an idea of where we're going with this?

MR. CO HEN: Sure, absolutely. And I have some packets here for each board member that I think has some really great information that will help educate you on this situation.

Basically, towns across the country, as well as the State of California, one legislative step away from doing this, and the State of Massachusetts where this has been introduced, are looking to try and dry up the demand for dogs that come from large commercial breeders, mostly in the Midwest, referred to as puppy mills because of the conditions in which they are bred.

Unfortunately, in New Jersey, by law, pet stores must source their animals from USDA licensed breeders.

Henceforth, these large commercial breeders in the Midwest.

New Jersey only has two USDA licensed breeders. They don't sell to New Jersey pet stores. So despite what you may hear, pet stores in New Jersey can't source their dogs from hobby breeders or backyard breeders, anything like that. So to maximize profits, they go to these huge breeders in the Midwest.

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They are legislated by the Animal Welfare Act, which among other things, allows legally for the confinement of dogs 24/7 and allows dogs to be bred at their first heat cycle and every one thereafter. It does not mandate continuous water for dogs or socialization or human contact. It allows dogs, when a breeder is done with them, to be killed.

So you've got hundreds of thousands of dogs that are being bred in these terrible, inhumane conditions.

You've got dogs that are being used as, I guess, puppy slaves and then being killed once they're done with them.

And this is what's coming into the State of New Jersey. And people aren't aware of that.

And there are many problems very often with these puppies that don't arise until after somebody has bought the dog and brought them home. New Jersey has tried to legislate this. Something called the Pet Purchase Protection Act was passed a couple of years ago. But there are a couple of problems and one recent one that has made

this a critical problem. First, the pet stores had to be dragged into this transparency that they now tout. They will argue that they are the most regulated industry in the nation, that everything is above board. They fought this tooth and nail before it was enacted.

And then they had to be fined into compliance.

Six months after the Pet Purchase Protection Act was passed, the state went out and inspected the 29 stores at the time that were selling puppies. 26 of them were in violation of the law and they were all fined. And they pay these fines as a course of doing business.

The state has yet to go out again. There have been efforts to try and get the state to go out again. They don't have the time or the manpower, or frankly, in some cases, the will to do so. So the part of this law that was supposed to reign this problem in was the fact that these breeders -- these stores, I'm sorry, had to post in their stores cards which listed their breeders, where these dogs came from, and the history of these breeders, and most importantly, what these breeders' inspection reports looked like.

The USDA is supposed to go out and inspect these breeders. They don't do a very good job with it, which I can document.

In February of this year, the USDA, which had

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provided those inspection reports publicly, and that's what all kinds of groups, like the Humane Society and everybody else, used to keep these pet stores in check, the USDA wiped these inspection reports from its website. So when you try and get an inspection report now, you have to file a request. It takes -- this one took us three months. And this is what they look like now. You get nothing. Every single piece of information is redacted.

So there is absolutely no way at this point to know what is happening with any breeder that any pet store in New Jersey is using. And the fact of the matter is, and I have all of this in this packet for you, just about a year ago, the Humane Society did a thorough, investigative report of pet stores in New Jersey. And at the time, they were able to look up the inspection reports of their breeders. Pet stores have to submit a list.

As a former middle school teacher, I know that I run the risk of losing your attention once you start to look at this, but that's okay. Pet stores have to submit a list to their towns where they operate by May 1st of every year, listing all the breeders that they've used the previous year. I have a couple of these lists because it's public information.

This is from a pet store in Whitehouse Station.

So groups took these lists and cross-checked them against

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the inspection reports of the breeders. In 2015, 19 New Jersey pet stores purchased puppies from USDA breeders with multiple and severe violations, which state law prohibits. Now, we don't know what's happening because we cannot -- you cannot, nobody can access these reports.

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So the truth of the matter is if a store were to open in Nutley and decide to sell puppies, you would have no idea what kind of breeders they were sourcing those puppies from. You would have no idea if those breeders were in compliance with even the Animal Welfare Act, which has horrendous standards of care, or if they were violating it.

And unfortunately, when we say violating it, we are talking about very disturbing situations and if you open your packet, on the left side, you'll see the Humane Society's investigative report. That talks about a lot of these violations that these breeders were found to have been committing. Behind that, I've listed what the Animal Welfare Act allows. So you can see how minimal these standards are. And then behind that, I've given each of you some examples of actual breeder inspection reports that we were able to get before the USDA wiped them clean.

One in particular, which obviously we will all find horrifying is an inspection report where the breeder, a woman in Iowa, listed on her own program of veterinary care that the routine way that she euthanized her animals was

gunshot to the brain at close range. Those are her words on her veterinary program. And it's in the report. And the USDA inspector noted that in the report and at the bottom, they list what the resolution is. And basically what they said is, you have to stop doing this. There are not penalties. There are not fines for the most part. The USDA is not interested in prosecuting these horrible actors.

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They basically say, "when we come back in a year or six months, you shouldn't be doing this anymore". Now, the saddest part of this is even that horrendous report is not that much of an outlier if you look at some of the other ones. I mean, these reports are filled with things like dogs with jaw bones that are exposed. They're infested with ticks. Oozing wounds all over the place. It goes on, and on, and on.

And to give you an idea of where the pet stores are in this issue, first of all, the Humane Society and ASPCA petitioned the USDA and asked them to upgrade their standards of care in the Animal Welfare Act. Not one pet store signed on to that request. And the USDA to this point has done nothing about it, other than acknowledge its receipt.

But I think what's more telling is there are some pet stores that have started to follow us around to council meetings like this and they have tried to dissuade councils

from believing these things that we are documenting, that we are giving you. And when I bring this up about this breeder in Iowa who shot her dogs in the head, oftentimes, the pet store owner -- one of the pet store owners who bought dogs from this breeder has been present, and he has spoken, and he may speak to you, or you may hear from him via e-mail. You're probably going to hear from a lot of those people via

e-mail.

Never once has he ever said, "I condemn what this woman did or I was abhorred to find out about this. denounce her. I made a terrible mistake". Never. Not one word. In fact, at the last meeting in Clark, what he did do instead was he handed me a generic cease and desist order, "To Whom It May Concern," dated December 21st, 2016. So he had these business cards. And it basically said that anybody who says something about this particular breeder, in this lawyer's opinion is defaming them and legal action could ensue.

Mr. Cohen, I have a COMMISSIONER ROGERS: question.

Absolutely. MR. CO HEN:

I talked to some breeders. COMMISSIONER ROGERS: I talked to some trainers and they do support what you're doing here. But I have a question with regard to Section 2, the restriction on the sale of animals, which I see the

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intent. I'm going to read it. And maybe we could reword it, because I think there could be a misinterpretation.

It says here that, "No pet store shall sell, deliver, offer for sale, barter, auction, give away, or otherwise transfer or dispose of dogs or cats. And nothing in this section shall prohibit pet stores from collaborating with animal care facilities, rescue organizations, etcetera."

What comes out at me is it's almost saying to the pet store owner, you can't sell dogs or cats, period.

MR. CO HEN: Correct.

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COMMISSIONER ROGERS: All right. Now --

MR. CO HEN: That's the intent.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Okay. But if they're getting these dogs and cats within the guidelines that you have here from animal care facilities and rescue organizations, can they not sell them? In other words, what I'm driving at, is it going to hurt -- is it going to ultimately hurt someone's business?

MR. CO HEN: No. The answer to that question, I would say, is a resounding no. First of all, the pet supply industry is a billion dollar industry. Twenty four of the 25 largest pet store chains in the nation do not sell dogs and cats. The two biggest, PetSmart and Petco, have in their code of -- their mission statement, that they never will sell dogs

or cats because they believe in how wrong it is. And that instead, they will partner with rescue groups and shelters to provide space on occasion to do so.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Well, here's what I'm driving at. I hear what you're saying. I get it. But what if you got a breeder, a reputable, good breeder and he goes to the local pet store and he says, look, I've got my dog, but I'd like you to help me sell it.

MR. CO HEN: By law, he can't do that.

10 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: He wouldn't be able to do that?

MR. CO HEN: New Jersey law prohibits pet stores from sourcing their animals from anyone other than a USDA licensed breeder.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Okay. Okay. All right.

MR. CO HEN: This does nothing to harm a responsible hobby breeder. It has nothing to do with it.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Okay.

MR. CO HEN: You know, if you know of a responsible breeder, we would encourage you to go to them. You'll see in the packet, statements from breed clubs that are part of the American Kennel Club. Ninety six percent of those breed clubs say that they would not or do not sell to pet stores.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: I did talk to a trainer at

Petco and they confirmed what you said. They will not sell

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2 MR. CO HEN: Right. Neither will responsible

3 breeders.

4 COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Okay. I --

5 MR. CO HEN: Responsible breeders want to meet a 6 potential owner.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Right. So the intent of this law is to ensure that the animals are protected, that we're not getting animals that have been through some inhumane treatment from puppy mills, etcetera. We're heightening public awareness of the problem. It's not going to hurt businesses because they're not selling them anyway.

MR. CO HEN: Currently, there are 22 stores in the state that sell puppies. But the problem is, given this, there may be reversal of that trend because they know they can get away with whatever they want.

COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Okay. All right. Here's what I'm going to do. I advised my colleagues that we're going to table this. I'd like to go over with this with you. I like it. It's good. Everybody here's a pet lover, right? We all own dogs. You've got two. I've got a big one, German Shepherd that ate my Chihuahua. What do you think of that?

MR. CO HEN: I'd like to emphasize also that this is not about somebody who may have bought their dog from a

- pet store. If you bought your dog from a pet store, God bless you. I hope you love your dog. I hope your dog is healthy.
- COMMISSIONER ROGERS: Mr. Cohen, it's a good -- in my view, all right, it's a good law. Okay. It really -- I believe it helps the consumer from getting an animal that is ill. I've seen that happen over the years. It's good to protect the animals. I just want to refine it to ensure that all of our T's are crossed and I's are dotted. And make this so that we have its intent be fulfilled.
