Council Welcomes New Town Manager

At the September 14th meeting, the Plainfield Town Council welcomed new Town Manager Andrew Klinger, who started in his position that morning. Andrew follows long-time manager Rich Carlucci in the position. Rich retired in May, and the staff has been sharing duties to keep the Town going while the Council searched for a replacement.

Andrew comes to the Town of Plainfield from Cumberland, Indiana where he had been serving as Town Manager since 2013. Andrew has also served as General Counsel for the Indiana State Lottery Commission (aka Hoosier Lottery) from 2008 to 2012 and as the Deputy General Counsel for the Indiana Gaming Commission before that. He received all three of his college degrees -- BA in Political Science and Economics (double major), Master of Public Affairs, and Doctor of Jurisprudence -- from Indiana University and so is a die-hard IU fan.

"We are delighted to welcome Andrew to the Town of Plainfield," said Robin Brandgard, Town Council President. "Andrew's experiences as an attorney and in town government made him an attractive candidate, one whose unique skills will serve Plainfield well. We are confident he'll be successful in keeping us on the upward trajectory the Town has been maintaining through Rich's tenure and setting out his own vision of our future." Brandgard also stated he was confident Andrew would find that the Town has assembled an exceptional staff to help him accomplish his goals.

Andrew and his wife, Mandi, have two children, son Collin who is twelve and



daughter MaKenna who is five. "I'm honored to be able to serve Plainfield as your new Town Manager," Andrew said. "My family and I are excited about moving to Plainfield and getting involved in the community."

Heavy Trash Days October 3 and 10, Tox-Away October 17

If you've got stuff to get rid of, there's no better month to do it in Plainfield than October. The Town will have its Heavy Trash Days on two consecutive Saturdays, October 3 and October 10, followed by the Hendricks County Solid Waste Management District's final Tox-Away Day of the year on October 17.

"The Department of Public Works will have its usual services available on Heavy Trash Days," said Jason Castetter, Superintendent of Public Works. "From 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Plainfield residents may deposit *(continued)*"

acceptable heavy trash items in designated dumpsters at the Town garage located at 986 S. Center Street. Items accepted include just about everything except for hazardous waste, tires, building materials, or yard waste.” Castetter said it even includes furniture, although residents who bring mattresses will have to handle getting the mattresses out of their vehicle and into the dumpster on their own. For sanitary reasons, DPW staff will not handle such items.

“As usual, we’ll also have an electronics recycler on site,” he added. “Accepted items include televisions, computer monitors, fax machines, computer peripherals, DVD players and VCRs, camcorders and cameras, iPods/MP3 players, and many other types of electronic equipment. Satellite dishes and anything with a refrigerant will NOT be accepted. The recycler will charge for televisions (\$5), but most other items will be disposed of for free.”

Lastly, Castetter said that Ray’s Document Destruction will be back. “The shredder will be set up in the parking lot at the Plainfield Community Middle School, just down Longfellow Lane from the Department of Public Works garage,” he said. “If you have sensitive documents you’d like to get rid of, you can do it both Saturday during the same hours.”

Please note: the Town’s Heavy Trash Days are for residents only. Residents should bring identification with them that has their address on it.

Tox-Away Day:


The middle school will also be the setting for the Solid Waste District’s Tox-Away Day on Saturday, October 17. Any resident of Hendricks County is welcome to use it to get rid of their household hazardous wastes. Hours are from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. The Hendricks County Solid Waste Management District will be set up to accept (for free) a variety of solid wastes that includes acids, antifreeze, fluorescent bulbs, gasoline, diesel fuel, batteries, propane tanks, solvents and more. Latex-based paint will not be accepted. It can be disposed of with residents’ regular trash collection if properly dried. Please see

“Horseshoe” Portion of Reeves to Close on October 10

On Saturday, October 10, 2015, the Plainfield Red Pride Band Boosters along with the Plainfield High School will host the 2015 ISSMA Marching Band District Competition.
